## Tahoka Chamber Hears Reports

### Summer Pre-School Wilson Honor Students Named To Start June 1

The Tahoka Schools will operate a summer program for certain six year old children who will enroll in the first grade in the Fall of 1970. The School will start June 1, 1970 and run through July 24. Classes will meet Monday through Friday from 8:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. A morning snack and a full noon meal will be served each day. A bus will pick up and deliver children living in town.

The purpose of the program is to help children get ready for school. First grade work will not be taught but readiness and motivating material will be used. Since there is no grouping of classes in Tahoka schools the experience of a summer pre-school is very beneficial to enable a child to take their place in a heterogeneous classroom.

Two students have been named by Mr. Kenneth Baker, Principal of Wilson High School, to receive coveted academic honors as members of the school's 1970 graduating class. Recognized as class valedictorian is Steve Meador, son of Mr. and Mrs. Weldon Meador of Wilson with a scholastic average of 93.31. Salutarian honors go to Miss Betty Shaw, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Shaw of Wilson, with a 92.019 scholastic average.

### Kindergarten To Begin In Fall

The Tahoka Public Schools will offer a kindergarten program to eligible children beginning August 24, 1970. The Texas kindergarten program, a part of House Bill 240 in the 1969 Legislative regular session, provides for gradual introduction of the program. Only educationally handicapped and economically deprived children will be taken the first three years, and all attendance is voluntary. Not until the 1977-78 school year will all five year olds be eligible to attend Public School kindergarten.

To be eligible to attend kindergarten during the 1970-71 school year, the law states that a child must have been born on or before April 1, 1965 and on or after September 2, 1964. Children must also meet one, but not both, of the following two requirements:  
1. A child must have difficulty speaking and understanding the English language, or  
2. A child must come from a family whose income is \$3,000 or less a year.

U.S. Sen. Ralph Yarborough and State Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler were upset victims in the May 2 Democratic primary to Lloyd Bentsen and State Rep. Robert L. (Bob) Armstrong.

Some of political action now shifts to the general election where Bentsen faces Republican Senate candidate George Bush. Gov. Preston Smith, unopposed in the Democratic primary, is confronted with GOP Paul Eggers. Bush and Eggers won nominations easily over Robert Morris and Roger Martin in the Republican primary.

Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin won third term nomination handsily over Judge David H. Brown and faces Edward M. Hurri, GOP, in November. Democrat Ben Ramsey had no difficulty with Connie Lawson who is unopposed in November. Truman Roberts defeated Earl W. Smith for Court of Criminal Appeals. James G. Denton appeared to be the Supreme Court contest winner over Matt Davis and Hawthorne Phillips. L.L. Gov. Ben Barnes, unopposed in the Democratic primary is challenged by Byron Fullerton GOP, in November. Four other GOP candidates will take token campaigns for statewide office.

**EDUCATION POLICY - APPROVED.** State Board of Education adopted the policy that contributions of ethnic and racial groups should be taught.

Board also proclaimed that literature books must be free of offensive language and that life sciences texts will present evolution as a theory rather than a fact.

Per capital state aid to local districts was increased from \$114.40 to \$117.65 per student for the current school year. Board authorized application for \$1.8 million in federal anti-poverty funds to help train 900 migrant workers for city jobs, approved a \$2 million special vocational program for poor students and empowered the Texas Education Agency to seek a \$50,000 federal grant to continue technical assistance to school districts with desegregation and other ethnic problems.

**APPOINTMENTS.** Governor Smith named Preston H. Dial Jr. judge of the vacant 175th district court in San Antonio after Dial was nominated for that post in the Democratic primary.

Randall B. Wood, native of Edom, is new director of elections in the secretary of state's office, succeeding Mrs. Mary K. Wall who retired.

Governor Smith has named R.L. Thornton Jr. of Dallas to board of regents of Texas Woman's University and Dr. Paul C. Witt of Abilene to State Board of Examiners in Basic Sciences.

Robert A. Hansen of Sioux City, Iowa, will become superintendent of Texas School for Blind on June 1.

Fifteen-member state textbook committee has been picked and held its first meeting May 8 to begin a five-month series of hearings on new textbooks.

President Nixon appointed Byron Fullerton of Austin to national advisory council on education professions.

**ATTORNEY GENERAL RULES** State Credit Union Commissioner cannot enter a proposed truth in lending liaison agreement with the Federal Trade Commission, Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin held in a recent opinion.

In other rulings, Martin concluded that:

State Comptroller can write rules by which Texas Tech University art works can be temporarily exchanged with other universities and museums.

Texas Tort Claims Act does not cover school districts except as to motor vehicles, but limitation does not apply to Junior College districts.

## Bill Griffin, County Agent, Says....

Bagworms, damaging insect pests of evergreens and occasionally of broadleaf plants, are beginning to make their springtime appearance.

Evergreens should be closely examined and if newly hatched bagworms are found, control measures should be applied.

The worms immediately spin a bag of silk around themselves and attach bits of foliage to the outside of the bag as they feed. The larvae carry these bags wherever they go with only the front part of their bodies protruding for feeding and movement. The bags enlarge as the bagworms grow. A heavy infestation, can completely strip the plant of its foliage. When this happens, the plant can be lost.

The effective "Camouflage" presented by the bags makes the insects hard to detect and damage may be extensive before they are noticed. They are much easier to control while they are still young.

If bagworms were present on a particular plant last year and control measures were not applied, chances are very good that an application of insecticide will soon be needed.

Details on bagworm control are available from the county Extension office.

By specious arguments cause the breakdown of the old moral values and virtues; honesty, sobriety, continence, faith in the pledged word, ruggedness. "8. Cause the registration of all firearms on some pretext with a view of confiscating them and leaving the population helpless."

Forage Sorghums Can Produce Top Quality Silage

With the many excellent forage sorghum hybrids and varieties available today, producers must make careful selection of the proper maturing type in order to obtain maximum silage production.

If early forage production is desired or late planting becomes necessary, then early maturing sorghums should be selected, explains County Agricultural Agent Bill Griffin.

Griffin encourages producers that still use Red top cane and Hegari varieties to use hybrids containing these varieties in their parentage where they are available.

The sweetness of the various forage sorghum hybrids depends largely on their parentage. Due to apparent animal preference and increased palatability, hybrids with both a sweet male and sweet female parent have become more popular in recent years.

Proper plant population is another important aspect in producing a good quality forage crop, Griffin points out.

on dryland and 50,000 to 80,000 under irrigation.

Seed size among the different hybrids and varieties is such that from 14,000 to 20,000 seed make a pound. Thus, producers should consider the number of seeds planted per foot of row rather than pounds per acre.

Planting smaller seed would require fewer pounds of seed for the desired number of plants per acre while a higher planting rate would be required with larger seed.

Griffin emphasizes that good quality silage just doesn't happen. It requires careful attention and good management from planting time until it reaches the feed trough.
