## Jerry Simpson is Dead.

Witchita, Kan., Oct. 23.-Jerry Simson died at 6:05 o clock this morning.
Ex-Congressman simpso arfe born in New Burnswick on Sty si, $18+2$. At 14 he began life as $n$ sailor and during 23 years following that pursuit he commanded many great vessels on the great lakes. In the Civil war he served in the twentith Illinois infantry. He came to Kansas in 1878. Originally he was a republican, but later became a greenbacker and populist. He was a member of congress from 1891 to 1895 , and from 1897 to 1899, being nominated the last time by both democrats and populists. After he left congress he moved to Roswell, $\mathrm{N}, \mathrm{M}$., where he was engaged, up to the time of his death, in stock farming.

## Texas Game Law.

The Texas game law on seasons are in part as follows;
Tarkey-Unlawful to kill between Feb. 1 and Nov. 1.
Doves-Uulawful to kill between Feb. 1 Nov. 1 .
Prairechicken or pinnated grouse -Unlawful to kill between Feb. I and Nov. r .
It is unlawful to kill or destroy more than 25 birds or fouls in one day. It is also unlawful for any person at any time to hunt game by aid of a hunting lanp or any other light used for hunting at night,
Other sedtions of the game iaw prohibit the catching, or killing or ensnaring or havingig in posession, living or dead, of any wild bird other than game birds; the purchasing offering for purchase transporting within or without the state for purchase, wild turkey, geesf grouse, prarie chicken, pheasa partridge, quail, dove, pige ${ }^{\text {S }}$ plover, snipe, jacksnipe, or burlew. Netting or irapptng of wild birds is prohibited and it is unlawful to shoot wild foul other than by ordanary shotgun placed to shoulder.
Section 10 of gome laws also prohibits a common carier transporting game without affidavit that game is for personal use and not lor sale. English or European house sp rows, hawks, crows, buzzards, black birds, rice birds, and owls can be killed at any time.-Ex.

## SOON TO LAUNCH WARSHIPS

Navy Department Announces Vessels Are Almost Completed - Nineteen Other Craft Under Construction.

Washington. - Thirteen first-class battleships will soon be added to the United States navy, several of which are nearly ready to be placed in commission, and 19 other vessels, including armored cruisers, protected cruisers, torpedo-boats and torpedo-boat destroyers, are under construction.
The first class battleships will be placed in commission within the next six months.

The bureau of construction and repair the other day prepared a statement showing the progress made on the vessels during the month of August, and how near completion are these ships. The most progress, four per cent., was made on the Mississippi, which is being constructed by the Cramps at Philadelphia. The percentage of completion of the battleships is: Rhode Island, 93; Virginia, 92.89; New Jersey, 89.3; Georgia, 86.44; Connecticut, 86.15 ; Louisiana, 86.4; Ne braska, 79.58; Minnesota, 71.16; Vermont, 61.4; Kansas, 60.1; Mississippi, 38.71; Idaho, 33.66, and New Hampshire, 18.12.

## Snake Head Kills Dog.

William English and Milton Davis, of near town, were out hunting on the farm of J. D. Powers, at Perry, Mo., a few lays ago and they shot a large rattlesnake, shooting off its head and about four inches of its body. The severed head was hurled by the discharge against the bird dog of Mr. English. It bit the dog and he died within a few minutes.

## TOOK KEELEY CURE MUCH.

Ian Escapes from That Institution Who Had Been Treated Nineteen Times.

New Haven, Conn.-The police of this city arrested a man who gave his name as Charles $B$. Fleming for being under the influence of drink. He said that his home was in New York.
Two men who said they were doctors from the Keeley institute at West Haven, called at police headquarters and asked Sergeant Cook to release Fleming, and they would see that he was cared for all right. They said they would take him to his home in New York. The sergeant turned Fleming over to the strangers.
Later a man, who said he was \& private physician, called at police headquarters and asked for Fleming The man who was with him, he said, was Fleming's valet. The doctor said that Fleming was a very wealthy Naw Yorker, and that he had been 19 times in Keeley institutes part of the time in Europe. He was very much chagrined to find that Fleming had been re leased.
Upon inquiry at the Keeley institute in West Haven he learned that the two men who had called for Fleming were only keepers in the place, and not doctors.

ICE THIRTY FEET THICK.
Remarkable Discovery Made by Connecticut Man Seeking Cold Water in a Well

New Haven, Conn-The people up in Coventry have been astonished to find this year in the early summer a well in a farm yard which is still frozen to the depth of 30 feet. Nothing like this has bcen known in Connecticut in years, the heavy ice banks of 1888 having receded by this time of year.
So"fishy" did this story seem that a Hartford reporter, exceptional for his veracity, personally looked the matter up. He found that the well had not been used recently, and that when the farmer on whose premises it was thought he would like a drink of cold water tried to draw it his bucket strfe a hard substance.
Getting into the well, the fatcy found that the top of the well wa. thick with ice, which reached at least 30 feet in a solid chunk to the bottom The well has performed unusual feats in keening ice in recent years, but nothing so remarkable as this.

Wednesday morning L. T. Lester as chairman of the right-ofway committee received a tolegram from Tallmadge and associates at Chicago, requesting that said committee complete its work not later than Nov., 1o. The committee was also notified that the survey out of this town could be secured by application to Avery Turner.
As this work requires at the hands $0^{-}$the committee clear title deeds to the lands meluded in said rightof way and the necessary pledges or cash to secure them, it will be observed that it, the committee, 5 no sinecure, but rather a tough on its docket. The conmittee AEting on the correct principle that getting the necessary cash subscribed is the first step is bending its energies in that direction, but as yet it has fallen short of the estrmated cost, which is $\$ 5,000$
Now, as the News has previously stated, it is up to the people of both town and county to say whether or not this committee appointed by our citizenship and now working in their behalf, shall fall down or not
On this proposition at least giving the right-of-way-now wever is the time for action.
The right-of-way as finally adoped from the town south to the cot nty line is outlined as follows:
I eginning on the Pecos Valley tricks west of the depot and also of t'he water tank; thence in a curve with concave east between the residences of G. W. Palmer, and T. B. Ketner and rumning east of the Lee Vansant residence and west of C. T. World's pasture lot into the W. F. Heller home section; theuce through said Heller section No. 62, west of the residence and to, and
across the northwest corner of sec tion 67 ; across the S. W. corner of No. 66, and through sections 95 98, 128 129, 1, 14, 2, 3, 4, 5, 46, $45,44,5^{8}$, and 59 , to it's south line which is also the north line of Swisher county. This terminal point is $3 \% / 3$ miles east of a direct line drawn south from canyon city. GUTYER PBOCESS DT WOREDES CARGEST PLANTE.

## Averages 55,000 Pounde of Buttere Day-Twenty Thousand Farmere <br> Bend Gream - Gream Alone

 Nota $\$ 250,000$ a IIonth.Topeka, Kan.-In what is reputed the wurli's largest creamery, enough niter is made dally to provide a pat of it for $5,040,600$ people. Fifly-fre bcusad poutds is the average tially utput of the Continental creamery sere. This quantity, In one-pound olls lald end to end, would make a dring five miles long. In one 24 -hour rus the concern turned out 92,000 ounds.
Five years ago the Continental was uilt and put into operation on an enrely new plan. Instead of recetving te whole anilk it gets only the cream. Le farmer patron has a hand separator. As soon as the millk is drawn rom the cows it is run through this rachine.
The skim milk is fed at once to igs and calves, warm and sweet. orth almost as much for feed as beore the cream was removed. The ream is gathere: by the representare of the creansery, and hauled or iipped to the factory
Uader the old syatem, the farmer's wife irdiged at the entire process of intter mahing. Now the men do the milking and separating-the factory lees the rest.
The farmer used to market his but er at the country store at low pricce or gromerics and calicoes at a high price. Now the cream is made into 4 higheiass article worth twice as much in the market as country buter, and brings the farmer nearly twice 15 muen money as he used to get from is cows.
The Continental creamery plan is very popular among farmers. It has unshed out along all rallroads, even o the western borter of the stato some cream is hanled 400 miles. The ompany has its own refrigerator cars or handiing eream and butter
If has 500 crean-recefing station its patrons number 20,000 Kan as 3250 ,00 wer receive an 3ggrezate of lividuals fer month, altiongh as in lozen cows. Farmers are than a ball ozen cows. Farmers are pleased with no sjatsm and are gracuanly ineroa he semimonthly proluction. Tiey flad he semimonthly check ecrivenfent to have, esprcially during dull sea ons. In the factory everything is done accurately. An expert examines each an of cream as it comes in grales it into first and second class, or reects it entirely. From the receiving vat the cream goes to the Pasteurizer, where it is :eated to 180 digrees, then ooled to 70 degrees for ripening.
Ripening is important. It controls the flavor of the butter. Fiavor is caused by bacteria and a starter containing bacteria that gives a desirable flavor is added to the cream at the beginning of the ripening period.
A record is kept at every step and feature in the operation-the hour the eream is received, the amount of butter fat it contains, it + aeldity and grade. During the ripening procoss ircquent chemical tests are made for acidity and when sour enough it is cooled to the proper temperature and charaed. These records are all handed to the butter maker, and he knows fust how much and what kind of butter he will get; also how much salt and color to add.
The buttermilk is drawn off and the casein extracted, dried and sold to paper manufacturers to be used as a sizing a aterial. The butter is cosied down, prizted, wrapped in sealed packages by neatly dreased girld, an. placed in storage to await shipment.
