

President Declares Nov. 11th Legal Holiday

Washington, Nov. 5.—A proclamation setting aside Nov. 11, as a legal holiday "as a mark of respect to the memory of those who gave their lives in the World War, as typified by the unknown and unknown identified American soldier who is to be buried in Arlington National Cemetery on that day," was issued tonight by President Harding. It follows.

"Whereas the nations of the earth are on that date joining with the United States in paying respect and homage to this unknown soldier; therefore, be it

"Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America. In Congress assembled, that the president is hereby authorized to issue a proclamation declaring November 11, 1921, a holiday, as a mark of respect to the memory of those who gave their lives in the late world war, and the president is respectfully requested to recommend to the governors of the various states that a proclamation be issued by them calling upon their people to pause in their pursuits as a mark of respect on this solemn occasion."

"Now, therefore, I, Warren G. Harding, president of the United States of America, in pursuance of the said joint resolution of Congress, do hereby declare November 11, 1921, a holiday, as a mark of respect to the memory of those who gave their lives in the late world war, as typified by the unknown and unidentified soldier, who is to be buried in Arlington National Cemetery on that day; and hereby recommend to the governors of the several states that proclamations be issued by them calling upon the people of their respective states to pause in their usual pursuits as a mark of respect on this solemn occasion."

"And in order that the solemnity of the occasion may be further emphasized, I do hereby furthermore recommend that all public and church bells throughout the United States be tolled at intervals between 11:45 o'clock a.m., and 12 o'clock noon of the paid day, and from 12 o'clock noon to two minutes past their hour. Washington time, all devout and patriotic citizens of the United States indulge in a period of silent thanks to God for these valuable, valorous lives, and of supplication for His divine mercy and for His blessing upon our beloved country."

"In witness whereof, I hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the seal of the United States to be affixed."

"Done at the City of Washington, this fourth day of November, in the year of our Lord, one thousand nine hundred and twenty-one, and of the independence of the United States of America of the one hundred and forty-sixth."

TAHOKA—LAMESA—BIG SPRING OFFICIAL COLORADO HIGHWAY

The towns of Slaton, Post and Snyder have met in mass meetings of late with regard to routing the Gulf-Colorado Highway through their towns. At a recent meeting of the highway association in Lubbock, the route was officially marked through to Tahoka, Lamesa and Big Spring, and tourists will be routed in this direction. The Chamber of Commerce of Tahoka and Lamesa have had made a huge sign, which will be placed at the intersection of the Tahoka-Slaton road south out of Lubbock, and the remainder of the route in Lubbock, Lynn, Dawson and Howard counties will be plainly marked. These towns were represented at the above highway meeting, hundreds strong, while the town of Sweetwater, Snyder, Post, and Slaton had no delegates at the meeting. At a recent meeting in Snyder, the blame for this action was laid on Lubbock, while this city had nothing to do with the routing of the highway. Lubbock was interested only in the highway going through that city, but since the high officials designated that the highway should run through Tahoka, Lamesa and Big Spring, Lubbock will eventually mark the route in this direction. Lynn county now has one of the very best roads leading north and south, east and west through the county to be found in West Texas. This fact will be certified to by the hundreds of tourists that pass this way. It is the intention of the county officials to keep these roads in the best condition at all times.

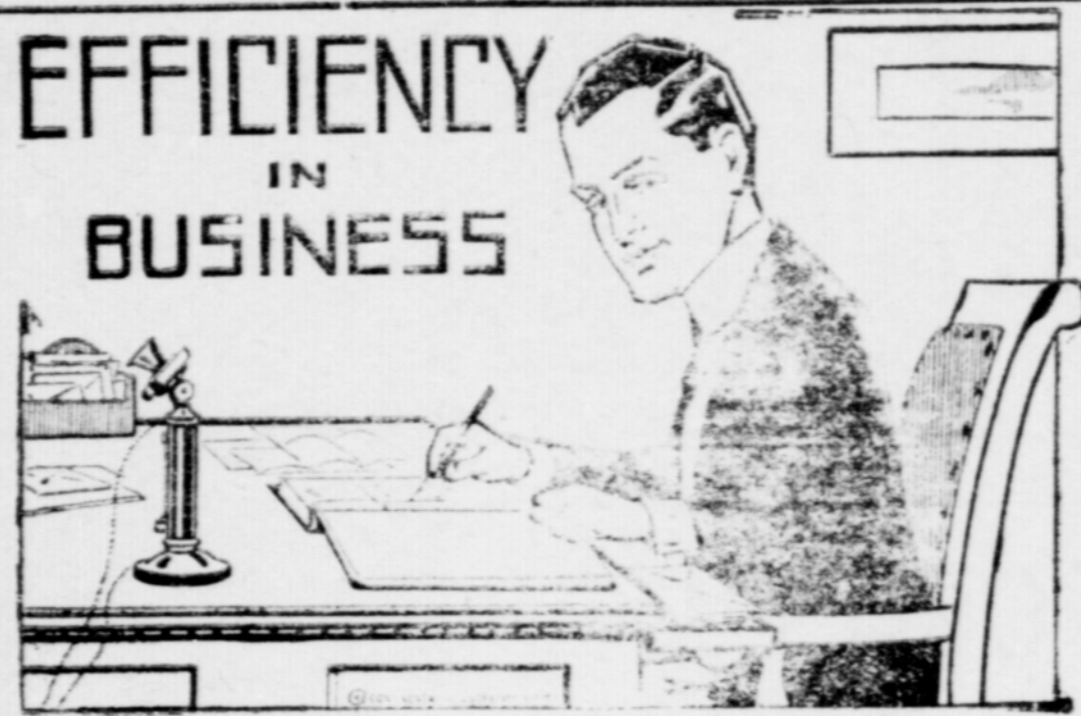

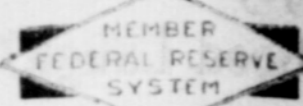
The deceased is a cousin of our fellowtownsman, A. R. McGonagill, and is well known to many of the old timers in this section of the state, as well as other portions of the United States.
