## Primary Elections Are Slated For This Saturday

Saturday is election day and voters will be marking ballots in the Democratic Primary, electing candidates in local and state races, and deciding the fate of three proposals.

The lengthy ballot lists a field of 10 candidates seeking the bid for governor. Three are listed for the Lieut. governor's seat.

Closer to home, voters will decide three races. Candidates are listed in the race for Lynn County Sheriff,

Commissioner, Pct. 1 and Commissioner, Pct. 3.

The sheriff's race shows more voter interest with four candidates seeking that position. They are Norvell Redwine, Russell Moore, Carl Spears, incumbent and Reid Parker.

Three candidates have filed for the Commissioner, Pct. 1 position and voters will decide on Clifton Hamilton, C. O. McCleskey, and Frank Greathouse.

Roy F. Smith and Paul M.

Sherrill are the candidates seeking the position of Commissioner, Pct. 3.

The referendum propositions facing the voters concern liquor by the drink, horse racing with pari-mutuel wagering and the creation of the Texas Dairy Commission with the power to regulate and fix the retail and wholesale price of milk.

Liquor by the drink and pari-mutuel betting have received more discussion locally than the milk price fixing proposal.

Clint Walker was emcee for the banquet, offering introduction of guests and coaches. James Hollars presented musical entertainment preceding the address.

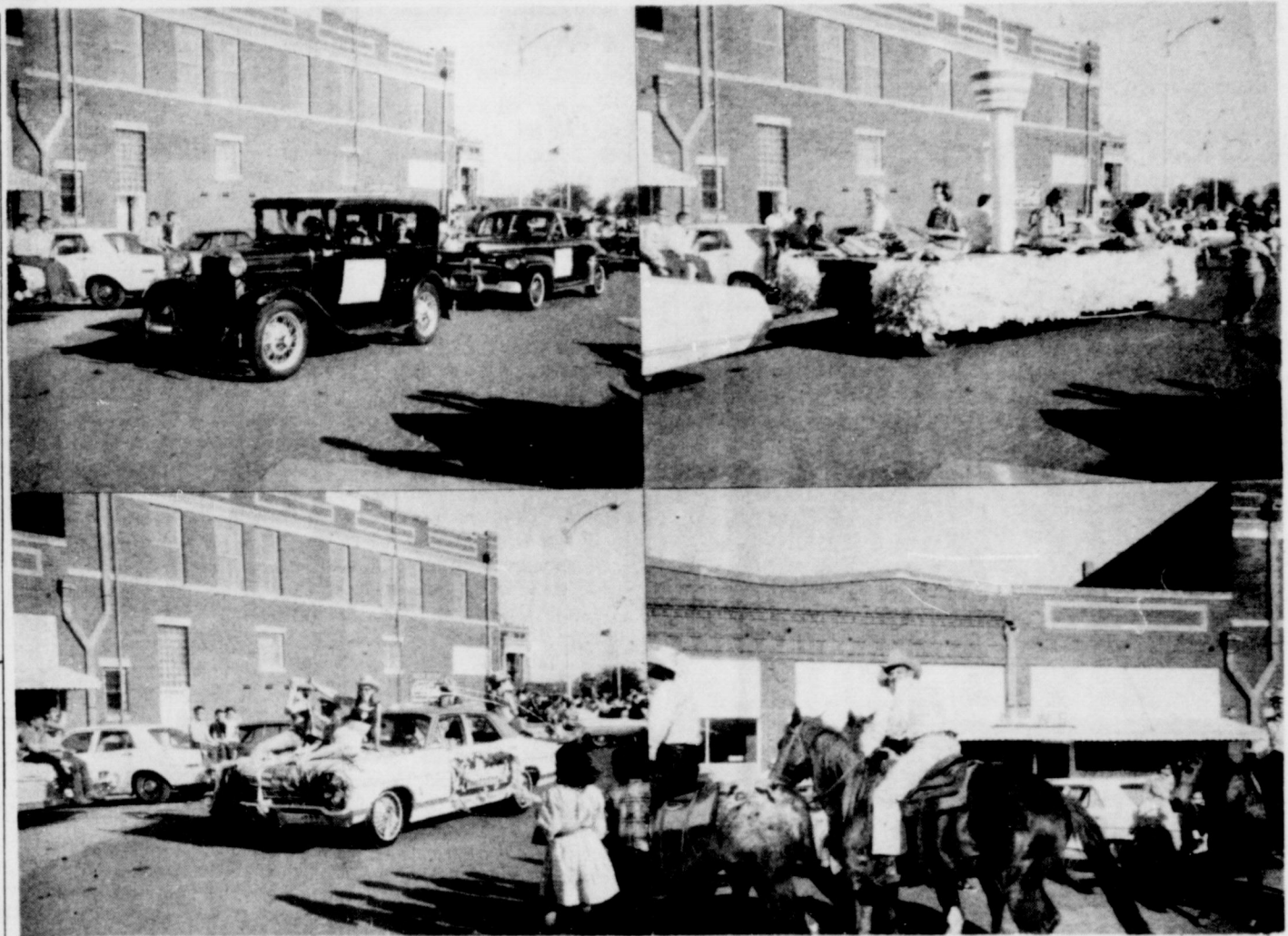
Awards for outstanding performances were presented to athletes in sports activities. Recipients of the awards were voted upon by the team members. Coaches Jerry Tay-

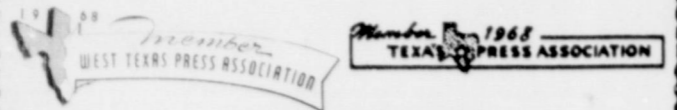

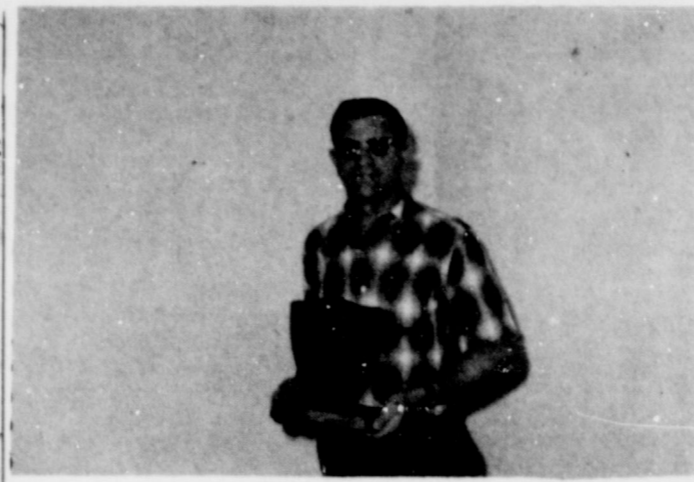

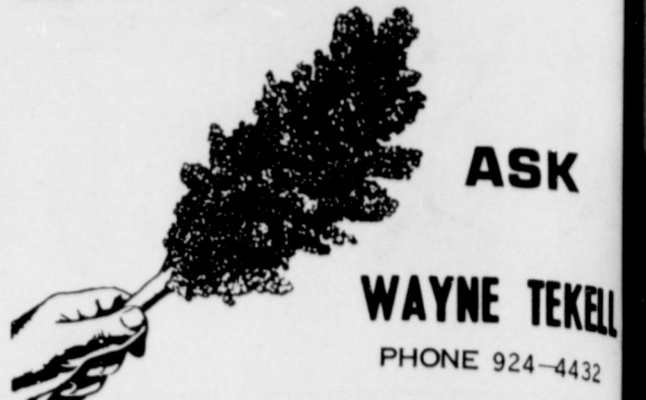

A total of \$6,130,750.00 in funds has been used in Lynn and Garza Counties to support family farms since July 1, 1964. Billy H. Stewart, supervisor for the rural credit agency said today.

Approximately \$1,894,720.00 was advanced in 1967. Currently 216 rural families in Lynn and Garza Counties are using the supervised services of the Farmers Home Administration.

The supply of Farmers Home Administration credit, which supplements the credit supplied by banks and other sources is one of the reasons recommended by President Johnson to provide

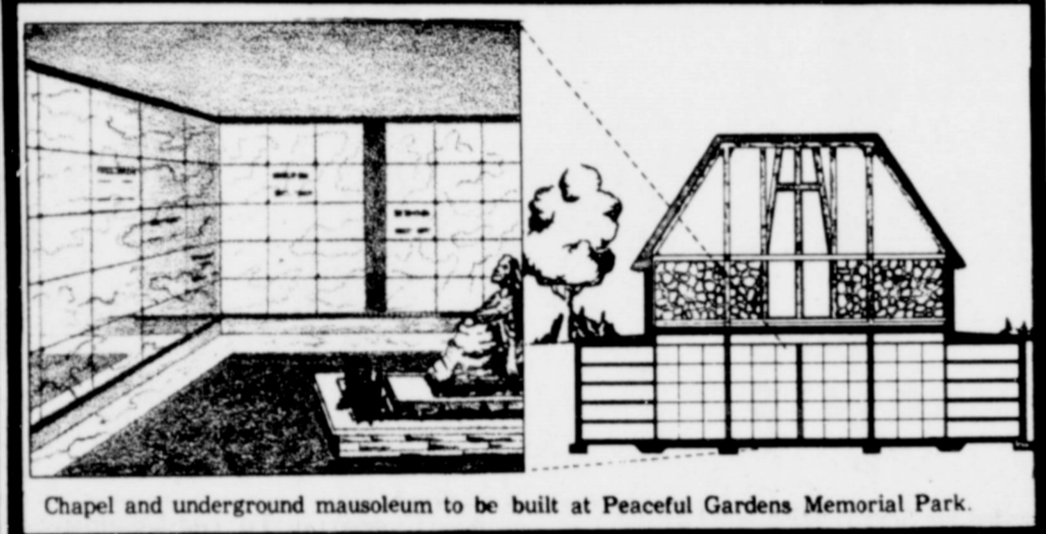
family farmers an opportunity to earn parity of income. "These loans have enabled farmers to stay in business who would otherwise have had to give up and go to the city. They have helped young farmers get established. They have enabled farmers to keep going after excessive rainfall, hail, and early freeze," Stewart noted.

Farmers Home Administration loans can be used to buy

land, refinance debts, acquire livestock and equipment, pay fertilizer and fuel bills and pay other expenses connected with acquiring, improving, and operating farms.

Loans are made only to families who are unable to obtain adequate credit from other sources. The program is tailored to individual family needs and loans are accompanied by technical assistance in farm and money management.

The Lynn County office is located at 1626 Ave. J in Tahoka.

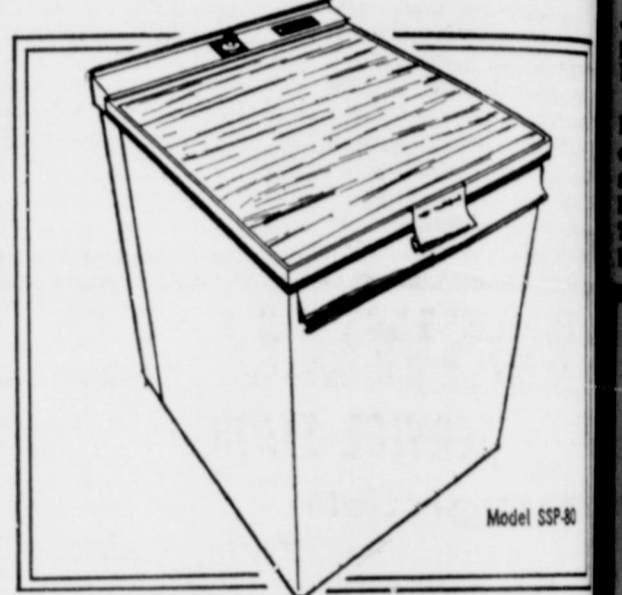

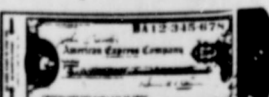
