Last year 20,378 handicapped people received help from the Texas Society, Small explained. But the costs of providing ex. pert professional care are ris. andleader Lawrence Welk, ing, and more money than ever will be needed, he said.

> Funds help support 20 centers in Texas, where crippled children and adults are treated, regardless of their ability to pay. Walkers, wheelchairs and related services are provided to those who cannot provide for themselves.

"Since 1929 the people of Texas have always responded to our needs, and I feel certain they will make it possible to increase Easter Seal services to crippled Texans throughout the coming year,"







Some 19 million acres of graz. ing lands need only improved grazing use. This is land that has been grazed too closely but still has a stand of desirable grasses; all it needs for improvement is better manage. ment.

About 13.2 million acres need both rest and better grazing use to let the base grasses im. prove in vigor and increase soil cover.

In addition to the 22.3 million acres of other grassland that need seeding or sodding. There are also 1.1 million acres of cropland and 1.3 million acres of former cropland that need to be planted to permanent vegetation. This totals 29 million acres fo land in Texas that need planting to grass or trees.

The inventory breaks the state's 35 million acres of crop-

land down into dry cropland; irrigated cropland; and other cropland, such as orchards and land formerly cropped. Some 22.3 million acres of cropland needs treatment.


Garland Thornton, President of the Lynn County Hospital District spoke to the Club on February 11 concerning the new County Hospital.

Leadoff speaker will be Dr. T. D. Tanksley, associate professor of animal science at Texas A&M University. He will present an overall outlook of the hog situation and will discuss the economic feasibility of pork production in West Texas.
