INTERNATIONAL

Jan. 1—War between Russia and Finland began over alleged Finnish aid to Karelian rebels.

ROBBED ON RATES

Plains people are being robbed annually of hundreds of thousands of dollars on freight rates on coal, according to a statement issued from Plainview. Investigation disclosed according to the report, that Plainview is compelled to pay \$5 a ton freight charges on coal originating in Colorado while Dallas, more than 200 miles farther by direct line, is paying only \$4.88 a ton. The arbitrary ruling of the I. C. C. is to be thoroughly investigated and action taken to see if the discrimination cannot be removed. On a large car of coal Plainview, it is pointed out, pays \$54 more a car than Dallas, though oftentimes a car of coal for the latter place travels 400 miles farther thru Plainview.—Lubbock Avalanche.

Better wait until the legislature passes on the bill, then there is ample time for a location. Many Chamber of Commerce meetings are being held over the western portion of the State in the interest of the college.

HOME TRADE

The following article on "Home Trade" won second prize in a contest held recently by the firm of Small & Clayton. A number of these articles will be published in the News.—Editors Note.

Did you ever stop to think of the hundreds of dollars that goes out of our county each year by people who do their shopping away from home or patronize the mail order houses? If this money was spent at home it would be astonishing to note the rapid development of our town and community, for the dollars that leave our town going to other towns and cities, rarely ever come back, and we are helping to make a better town both civically and socially.

Home trading causes better roads to be built, leading into the home town, because the more trade the home merchants get the better they are prepared to meet the demands of their customers. More people will go to the home town from every point of the county to do their trading, as the quality of the merchant's goods become known. Therefore better roads leading to the home town will cause a greater volume of trade, thus helping the merchants and the town also.

The more money brought into a town will cause more money to be on deposit in the banks, and nothing shows up better for a prosperous country than a large deposit in a bank. When anyone comes to a new country with an idea of locating he will always go and see how much surplus money is on deposit in the banks; if there is a large surplus on deposit he will think that the country is in a prosperous condition and that the citizens of that county trade at home.

A good town calls for progressive citizens and business men, but if the people of the county do not co-operate

with them by patronizing them they cannot make an attractive town, which calls for paved streets and larger business houses, for the more merchants there are in a town the more business houses there will be that go up, and the quicker the town will have the other attractions that go to make a progressive town.

One cry of the producing class of people today is for better markets, but the producers, who are also consumers, cannot expect the merchant of the town who buys their products to give them the top price for a bale of cotton or any other product if they are not going to spend their money with the merchants at home, but go to some neighboring town and buy what they need, or go home and get the catalog and make out an order.

When we trade at home we can see what we are buying. If anyone goes off to some other town to trade it will always appear in the paper, and when the people see this they think the merchants of the town from where the "customer" has come do not carry a good stock of goods.

Another thing to be considered in home trade is, the home paper, as this is one of the greatest boosters for the home town and home trade that we have today. Merchants carry an advertisement in each issue and people may find a bargain in each issue of the paper. Therefore, if everyone in the county would take the home paper they are helping the home trade and home merchants as well as the editor of the paper.

So I think it is the duty of every enterprising citizen in the county to trade at "Tahoka" and help make the roads leading into the county seat better, have more paved streets, have a larger and better schools, better churches and thus make TAHOKA one of the leading cities of the great South Plains.

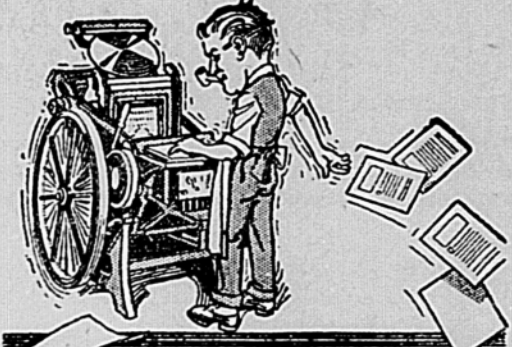

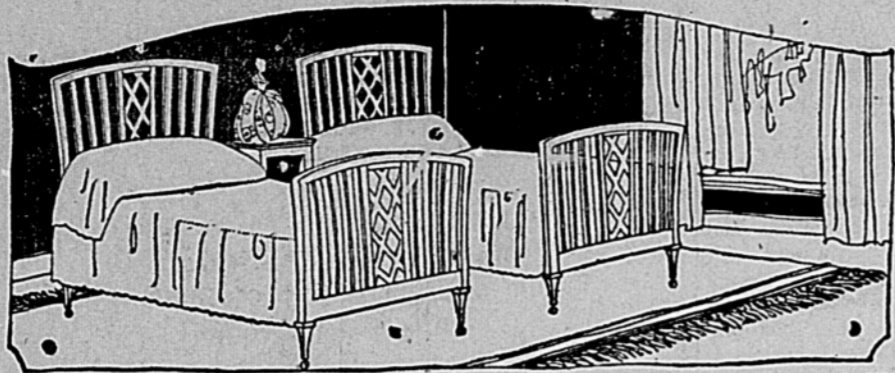

FORD SELLS 1,200,000 CARS IN ELEVEN MONTHS

Every Month Since March Totals Above 100,000—All Records Broken This Year.

According to a statement issued by the Ford Motor Co., deliveries of Ford cars and trucks to retail buyers during the month of November totaled 106,327. This is a new high sales record that has never before been approached by the company at this season of the year and one which stands out in marked contrast to the November, 1921 retail delivery figures which totaled slightly over 58,000 cars and trucks.

For eight consecutive months beginning with April 1st of this year retail deliveries have exceeded 100,000 Ford cars and trucks each month, the accumulated total for the first eleven months of 1922 being approximately 1,200,000. While the company points out that this not unusual for Ford retail sales to exceed the 100,000 mark during the spring and early summer months when the demand is at its peak, the manner in which business has held up throughout the balance of the year is without precedent.

Credit for this remarkable showing is attributed by the Ford Motor Co. to the many improvements which have recently been made on Ford cars and particularly to the new low level of Ford prices, recently put into effect.

Although the Ford factories have been operating at full capacity for the past eight months, sales have equaled production and judging from unusual manner in which orders have come in this season of the year Ford dealers will be unable to accumulate an adequate stock of cars during the winter months for delivery next spring.

In the opinion of the Ford Motor Co., November sales are an indication that many prospective purchasers, are beginning to anticipate an unusual spring demand and are therefore placing orders during the fall and will continue to do so throughout the winter to avoid disappointing delays in delivery later on. While this will relieve this situation to some extent, it is pointed out that the steadily increasing demand for Ford cars is nevertheless sure to create an acute shortage as the season advances.

Accordingly, the Ford Sales Organization is urging prospective purchasers to arrange for delivery during the winter months in order that the demand next spring will be relieved as far as possible.

THE COUNTY OF COWS

BY PHEBE K. WARNER

Swinging over the Arcadian Avenue at the Waukasha County line, in the State of Wisconsin, is this sign: "YOU ARE NOW ENTERING WAUKESHA the COUNTY OF COWS, Home of the World's Greatest Holstein-Feisian Sires. Waukesha County Holstein Breeders Association."

And painted on the sign was the picture of one of the county's famous cows.

Thousands and hundreds of thousands of tourists have been introduced to Waukesha County and her industries through the medium of that sign and other like signs at the entrance to the various state and national highways to that county. Can you think of a better and cheaper way to advertise your county than to have a sign swung high over the entrance of every road as it enters your county? First of all, think what it would mean to the tourists to KNOW what county they are passing through. Millions of people are on the go Winter, Summer, Autumn, Spring and not one in a thousand of them know where they are. Have you idea what counties they have passed through after their trip is over. They need these signs at the entrance of every county as a geographic lesson if nothing more. Especially do we need such signs now in the days of so much auto travel within our own States. And would it not be wonderful to have such signs up at the State lines for the education of the inter-state tourist?

A few years ago we were going from Fort Worth to El Paso over the T & P. Railroad. Along about two o'clock in the afternoon a lady from Pennsylvania leaned over the back of the seat we occupied and said: "Will you please tell me when we cross the line into Texas." We answered her as politely as a Texan could under the circumstances. "Why, lady, you are a little late finding it out. You have been riding through Texas since daylight this morning. But there is still 600 miles of West Texas for you to look at." She had entered the State at Texarkana and had come through both Dallas and Fort Worth, but had not yet discovered Texas.

Swing a county sign over the entrance of every highway that enters your county. First to teach the people where YOUR county is and what its name is. But more important than the name of your county is the outstanding industry. Let the people who pass under the sign know what to expect. Let them know in a few simple words what your county is good for and they will be looking for it. Are you proud of your county? This is a good way to let the rest of the world know it. Is your county a cotton county, a wheat county, a red hog county, a white faced cattle county, a turkey county, a kaffir corn, sudan grass, oil, corn, fruit,

good roads county? How about your schools? Would you dare advertise in the name of your schools? Nothing else would draw more new people to your county than for everyone who entered it to know at once that it was noted for its good schools. And nothing would inspire more people to go home and build likewise. What is your county especially good for anyway? Has it any outstanding feature. Counties are just like folks. They must have some individuality if they are ever to be noticed.

And next to your county should come your farm. What is the difference between your farm and your neighbors? Is there any way for a tourist to know as he goes by your place what it is good for? Suppose the town folks never put up any signs. And you had to go into every place in town and look around to see whether it was a dry goods store or a bank or a shoe shop or a peanut stand? How much time would you waste? You are wasting a lot more time and money by not letting everybody who goes by your place of business know what it stands for. What have you for sale? In town if a man has a business that represents no more than \$150.00 he will have a big sign up to let everybody know where it is and what it is. But thousands of farmers have a business that amounts into the \$100,000 column and people drive by it by the hundreds of thousands and never know it is there. Where does all the stuff come from that is advertised for sale in the towns and cities? It all comes originally from the soil, the source of all wealth.

Let's put on a sign campaign in our county for 1923. Let's give the sign painter something to do or do it yourself. Maybe you have an advertising artist in your own family and do not know it. Let's let the world know what our county and our farm is good for, as it passes by. Think how many more people pass your home in a year now than did in the anti-auto days. And where do all those people come from and where are they all going? Let's educate them as they go by. How much more interesting it would be to drive through a country and read the signs at each home. This farm produces registered White Faces; the next registered red hogs; the next registered White Leghorn chickens; next registered turkeys; next nothing but scrubs here. How long do you think that man would stay in the scrub business? This is a dairy farm. Why, before you could go five miles through such a country every child in the car would be looking a mile ahead to see what the next farm would be. And the city tourist might go home knowing better from whence came his food and what his country produces. Let's put up more signs in the country and let the world know as it drives by what is going on there.

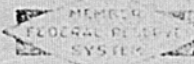
