CENTRAL BAPTIST CHURCH IN EAST PART OF LYNN COUNTY

This church was formed by the consolidation of the Grassland and Magnolia churches, two school house churches just four miles apart, in the east part of Lynn county. For the benefit of other school house churches over the South Plains, we will relate briefly the circumstances leading up to the organization of this church.

During the early part of 1921, the Missionary, Rev. J. F. Curry, of the Brownfield Association, residing in Tahoka, was acting as supply pastor for both the Magnolia and Grassland churches. At the suggestion of Bro. Curry, each of them planted a 50-acre cotton crop in order to start a building fund. Suffice to say both of these crops yielded well and netted after all expense were paid, around \$1750.00. As the crops were gathered and it became evident that a nice sum would be realized from each of them, the question of the two churches consolidating and building on half-way-ground began to be agitated. As a result, Central church today has a building of her own valued at \$6000.00, which stands as a monument to Rev. Curry, and the progressive citizenship of the Grassland and Magnolia, two of the most wide-awake neighborhoods in Lynn county-communities where they do things worth while. This modern church edifice is located on the main highway between Tahoka and Post,

ROBBED ON RATES

Plains people are being robbed annually of hundreds of thousands of dollars on freight rates on coal, according to a statetment issued from Plainview. Investigation disclosed according to the report, that Plainview is compelled to pay \$6 a ton freight charges on coal originating in Colorado while Dallas, more than 200 miles farther by direct line, is paying only \$4.88 a ton. The arbitrary ruling of the I. C. C. is to be thoroughly investigated and action taken to see if the discrimination cannot be removed. On a large car of coal Plainview, it is pointed out, pays \$54 more a car than Dallas, though oftentimes a car of coal for the latter place travels 400 miles farther thru Plainview.-Lubbock Avalanche.







CARS IN ELEVEN MONTHS

Every Month Sinch March Totals Above 100,000-All Records Broken This Year.

According to a statement issued by the Ford Motor Co., deliveries of Ford cars and trucks to retail buyers during the month of November totaled 106,327.
