If they didn't get perfectly clean, externally,-assuming that they were not already so —it was their fault, for they were invited to a swim, free of charge each day in the splindid Amarillo natatorium. The meetings were held in Amarillo's magnificent municipal auditorium and the Mission Theater. On Thursday the press gang were escorted to the "Devil's Kitchen" in the Palo Duro Canyon fifteen miles southeast of Amarillo. The people of the Panhandle section are seeking to have this canyon con verted into a state park. Taught In Schools

TEMPLE, Texas, June 25-Within another year or so the proud American who wants to be patriotic on July 4 and takes his family out to see the big Parade, may find one of his children nudging him and whispe ing to him to lift his hat with his right hand and place it over his heart as the American flag comes sweeping by in the procession.

That observation was made here on June 14th by Dr. W. M. Sherwood State Commander of the American Legion, who has been advised that standard flag rules are to be taught in the public schools, of Texas as of the course in civics. Under the leadership of Commander Sherwood the Texas Department of the Legion carried on the campaign to bring about teaching of the flag etiquette in the schools of Texas.

"It will be a glorious day for Texas," said State Commander Sherwood, "when all of our children learn the accepted rules for draping and paying proper respect to Old Glory on all occasions, and just as soon as they begin their studies of these rules in the public schools they will put their newly acquired information to good use by assisting torch-bearers of enlightenment and of their elders in decorating floats and buildings for patriotic occasions.

"All of us are loyal citizens. We would fight for our country at the drop of the hat. ifnecessary. But few of us have ever been told that we should lift our hat and place it over our heart as the national colors come . in parade, and t at is the reason so few of us do it.

"If I could send a Fourth of July message to the people of Texas I would say, let us begin now to help our children learn the flag rules they are going to study in school later When the flag comes by in parade the man should lift his hat and place it over his heart. The woman sould place her right hand over her heart. All should remain quiet un til the colors have passed"

Making Application For New Rural Route

A petition has been circulated and signed and much data collected and forwarded to Washington, praying for the establishment of another rural route out of Tahoka. The proposed route runs about eight miles up the Lubbock road, thence turns west two miles and north by Dixie school house, thence westward about twelve miles pass ing by New Home and back through the T-Bar ranch to Tahoka, entering the city from the west. The new route if granted, will serve 195 families from the start. Of course there will be many other families on the route after the country settles up. There is not a creek nor a bridge to cross on the entire route while only three small and insignificant lakes lie in the pathway. This route is much needed and much desired, and it is to be hoped that the Department at Washington will find it possible to grant the petition.

County and Demonstration Agents Plan Auto Tran to College Station Lynn County to be Advertised

County Agent A. L. Robertson and Miss Milie M. Halsey Home Demonstration Agent are organizing an Automobile Train to go to the Farmers Short Course, which is to be held at College Station, Texas, July 28th to August 2nd. It is their plan to take a camping outfit and to start five or six days before time and advertise Tahoka in every town on the way down. Literature in regard to the Lynn County will be distributed to every person on the way by the Club boys who are to represent Lynn County in the state meet.

The following statement concerning this meet was given out by Mr. Robertson Tuesday.

"This gives one a wonderful opportunity to combine business and pleasure. Make this a vacation period. Visit your State Agricultural College and learn how they are prepared to assist you in solving your farm and home problems. Time well spent is a profitable investment.

"This Automobile train will stop at designated points in order to give the Stock Judging boys an opportunity to work over Live Stock.

The Short Course is planned to meet the needs of men, women, boys, and girls who desire to make farm life more profitable, comfortable and attractive.

"Agriculture work will be offered in the following Departments: Animal Husbandry, Dairy Husbandry, Poultry Husbandry, Agronomy, Horticulture, Entomology, Plant Dissases, Rural Sosonology, Agriculture Ecomonics, and Agricultural Engineering.

"There will be an exhibit of the most modern farm machinery and home equipment on the grounds.

"Several courses will be offered in Home Demonstration work, especially adapted to the needs of girls and women from rural communities. The work will consist of lectures and demonstrations in health, Work in meal planning and table service, clothing, home improvement and poultry.

"A special feature of the course will be a poultry judging contest, a grain judging contest for the Cameron Lumber Company Loving Cup, and a live stock judging contest for the Progressive Farmer Loving Cup.

"All State Contests for Home Demonstration Club girls and women will also be held at this time. "The evening programs will be

devoted almost entirely to instructive lectures and entertainment. In addition, some time during the day the day will be devoted to special forms of entertainment. Insofar as possible, the entertainment will be of educational value.

"Automobile Camp Grounds will be provided for ahead of time and a definite schedule will be arranged. Further information may be obtained by calling the Chamber of Commerce office or by seeing either of the Demonstration Agnts."

COUNTY AGENT GIVES INFOR-MATION ON DESTOYING MITES

BY A. L. ROBERTSON County Agent of Lynn County

Mites differ from lice in several ways. Instead of remaining on the floor removing the litter and trying fowls at all times and making the body their habitat, they only use the hen as a host to obtain blood. Being equipped with biting mouth parts they can suck blood. When Morged they return to the roosts or nests where they remain and the eggs are laid. In some instances mites may be found on the hen but that is only isolated cases where the fowl had left the coop before the mite

had satisfied its appetite. All the eggs are laid in cracks or crevices in the roosts or nests. When first hatched they are equipped with six lgs but after going through the first change acquire eight legs,

In the first stage of development they live on dirt, filth and decayed wood. One can realize from this the utter folly of trying to keep them under control by treating the hens. At the time that one applies the material the mites are hidden in the house and are not affected. The one chance that is offered lies in keeping th eggs from hatching and consequently controlled in this way.

A house that is badly infested car be detected by the grayish flaky residue that one notices at all points where the roosts and cross pieces join or are nailed. All roosts that are counter-sunk into the cross piece are advised because of ease in cleaning. If one had all the parts securely nailed there is very little likelihood of that part being torn out for treating but will remain as a breeding place for the mites All the roosts and nests should be removed before treating.

It is only in unusual cases that any d nand attention. When the house has been badly neglected one will find that mites are in the walls but that is due to carelessness and lack of attention. Even in uch cases proper attentionto the roosts will help because the mites must be in that place before they can reach the hens. At this season of the year one must watch for an invasion because the mites seem to thrive and multiply most rapidly in hot weather.

There are two materials that are most commonly used. They are carbolineum and waste oil from a crank case. Although other materials such as kerosene have been used, they are not as satisfactory because of more rapid evaporation. When kerosene is applied the mites on the surface may be killed but the kerosene effect rapidly disappears and one must repeat the operation about

A material such as carbolineum or waste oil will penetrate into the wood, prevent the eggs from hatching, because of the saturation. and keep them under control. That is the condition that should prevail.

The carbolineum should be used as a paint and not sprayed. After removing the roosts and nests to some shady spot, one can thoroughly apply the material with a paint brush and have the job completed for about year, Remember that if the roosts and nests are free from mites an application of whitewash will care for the rest of the building. The arrangement and construction of these two pieces of equipment is a great help in cleaning.

Waste crank case oil can be used in the same way or applied with a spray pump. This material can usually be obtained from any garage without cost and a little more waste in applying is not of so much importance.

There is also another form of mite that one often finds affecting the leg of mature stock. This is known as the scale leg mite and burrows down under the scales of the leg. With the accumulation of material the legis






