West Tex. Technological College Location Should be on the South Plains

BANQUET HELD AT LUBBOCK WEDNESDAY EVENING IN THE INTEREST OF LOCATING THE COLLEGE. TAHOKA PRESENT TWENTY-TWO STRONG.

"Don't Knock any Town, but Boost the South Plains," was one of the slogans at Lubbock when the Chamber of Commerce of that hustling city tendered a banquet Wednesday evening to hundreds of citizens from all over the South Plains. Tahoka was represented at the banquet some twenty strong, and since Tahoka or Lynn county is not an applicant for the Technological college, which matter was recently decided upon at a meeting of the Tahoka Chamber of Commerce, represented by several of the business and professional men of the town. After considerable discussion on the matter, it was unanimously decided to throw our influence and support toward locating the college on the South Plains and Lubbock was considered the most logical point in this section, since it is the only place that fills the requirements to secure the school.

Every town and hamlet represented at the meeting held at Lubbock with the exception of Post, were unanimously agreed that Lubbock was the town to locate the college on the South Plains. Post stated that although she was an applicant for the college, if same was not located at that point it was their desire to see the college placed upon the plains, since the major portion of their trade territory is located on the plains. Plainview was not represented at the meeting, it being understood that will make an effort to secure the school. Lamesa was unable to send a delegation to Lubbock owing to the heavy rains in Dawson county late Wednesday. The governor of Texas recently appointed a board of directors for the

West Texas Technological College and has served notice for the body to hold their initial jubilee at Sweetwater the 2nd of March. The whole South Plains contemplates sending a large delegation to that city on this date and let it be known the keen desire of establishing the college above the cap rock.

District Judge Clark Mullican, of Lubbock, delivered the opening and principal address of the evening, and in a flow of the best oratory ever heard in this country, he made known the various reasons why the college should be located above the cap rock and at Lubbock.

The News could publish quite a lengthy article by going into details on what was said by the various spokesmen at the banquet in Lubbock, but this is considered unnecessary at this time.

It is important that every town and community above the caprock get in the race to bring the college to the South Plains.

The location of the Technological college within a little more than an hours driving distance from Tahoka would mean more than any other one thing that could happen to Tahoka and Lynn county.

The News wishes to compliment Lubbock in the manner in which they entertained the large delegation Wednesday evening, there being something near two hundred and fifty persons present on this occasion. The "feed" was far above the ordinary, and there was a plenty of it.

Let the citizenship of Lynn county unite in one body in pulling for the location of the college on the plains, and let the central point be Lubbock.

Many Acres of Land Being Cultivated

W. T. Raybon, local manager for the Fuller Gin Company, returned to Lubbock Tuesday afternoon from an automobile trip throughout this trade territory, having made a visit to Brownfield, Lamesa, Tahoka and Post City.

Mr. Raybon says it is hard to estimate the number of acres of new lands that are being cultivated this year, and especially in that section laying to the south and west of Lubbock. The large ranching interests are fast giving way to the progressive agriculturalist who is making every minute count in putting plain lands into the highest state of cultivation, which means the highest possible revenue producing state.

These lands are as fine as can be found anywhere and the farmers are experiencing no difficulty in plowing at this time as can be seen from the large tracts that are turned each day. Large and small tractors, mule and horse teams of from six to as many as twelve head to one implement are seen in every section of the great South Plains turning the grazing lands into farms which will produce untold wealth for the progressive farmers, and naturally this is a scene that thrills and entertains the local gin man who realizes that truly King Cotton will reign here. He knows that farmers from all sections of the plains who have given their land a showing have found every advantage for cotton producing here and he is enraptured by the sight of their activities, and no doubt has already made some comparison of the 1922 and 1923 cotton crops in this territory.

Mr. Raybon reports that along with the land-breaking work the home-builders are evenly as industrious, many improvements having been made throughout the country.

Lubbock business men might prepare for the increased demand the development of this section will automatically place upon them. Those who are misinformed concerning the possibilities of the great South Plains as well as those who are not in position to keep up with the gigantic development program that is being carried on are every day expressing their lack of confidence in Lubbock by insinuating that there are near possibilities of this city outgrowing her trade territory—this thing could never happen this year. In spite of the fact that our builders are among the best in the country and the further fact that our building material dealers have splendid stocks in every department we think it practically impossible to make Lubbock outgrow her territory, and take the reports such as Mr. Raybon has brought us as a foundation for this opinion.

Grass lands were fine and the countless herds of fine beef cattle which have roamed the plains added millions to West Texas' wealth, but the modern farmer knows more profitable uses for South Plains lands—he knows that anything that is well cared for will grow here—he knows that cotton, the great southern crop has greater possibilities here than in any other section of the State, he knows that fruits and vegetables grow in abundance and that unlimited supplies of the finest water anywhere can be found beneath every foot of South Plains lands and therefore irrigation can make possible a great annual production of everything that one would wish to grow—and because he knows these things, these developments are being made which certainly marks his activities normal and phenomenal.

We appreciate Mr. Raybon's having given us a report of things as he found them about over this territory.—Lubbock Avalanche.

75 HUNDRETHS RAINFALL

Tahoka and vicinity has received seventy-five hundredths of an inch rainfall during the past week. More favorable conditions were never at hand in this section of the west. W. H. VAUGHN SHOT AT LUBBOCK SATURDAY

One of the most unwelcomed incidents in the history of Lubbock occurred in Avenue I, near the Citizens National Bank here Saturday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock, when Ed George, age 26 years, and W. H. Vaughn, both farmers, engaged in a fight which terminated in a pistol duel in which W. H. Vaughn was seriously injured.

Vaughn, a man of about fifty years is the owner of a large farm sixteen miles southwest of Lubbock, and George was employed to work on the farm, and reports have it, he occupied the house with Mr. Vaughn until about a year ago when a quarrel arose over a personal affair.

The two men, it is claimed, have been at outs since that time and have quarreled several times since, and have both been expecting serious trouble for some time.

Several rumors are afloat as to how the fight which led to the shooting occurred, some claiming Vaughn hit the first blow, while others claim George led the attack.

In the fistie bout it seemed that the men were not satisfied with the progress they were making and George pulled a forty-five Colts with which he shot Vaughn the bullet taking effect in the lower abdomen and passed through his back.

For a few minutes after the shooting Vaughn seemed to have held himself in absolute control, his nerves having withstood the shock of the bullet as well as the awful experience without any noticeable effect, but when the car he was first helped into could not be started he was lifted into another car, and on rising from the seat of the first car it was noticed that he had lost an enormous amount of blood, and before the second car had been entered he began to show the loss of strength.

Vaughn and a bystander grappled with George for the possession of the gun with which the shooting was done, and when Vaughn succeeded in wringing it from the hands of George and the bystander George fled down the street and Vaughn fired one shot at him which went wild.

Officers took a thirty-eight calibre automatic pistol from Vaughn which he tried to pull when the shooting started, but somehow the weapon hanged in its holder, which is a leather affair, attached to a belt. On seeing that his gun was lodged and that it was time to act, Vaughn gave up hopes of getting it and grappled with the gun with which he was shot.

Vaughn was rushed to a local sanitarium where immediate surgical attention was given and as we go to press he is, according to the physician, in a very critical condition.

We have just received a letter from Fannin county, stating that they are having lots of rain and snow and flu. Have had several deaths.

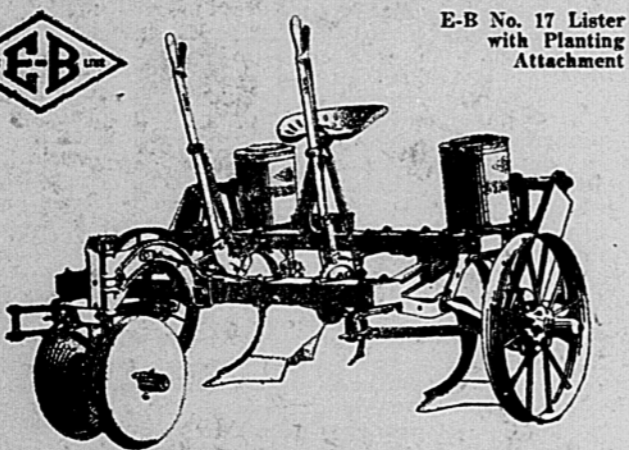
W. R. Bartley got tired of drinking well water and dug him a cistern.

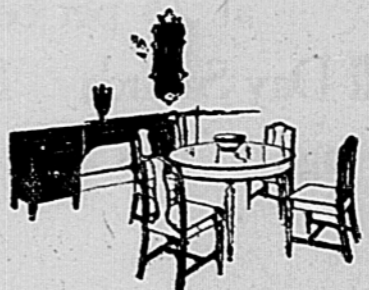

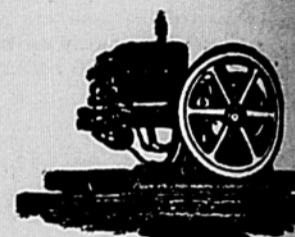

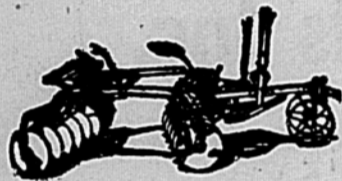
