At the masthead was the name of Inez Lilly as owner and Otis Lilly as editor and manager. In this first issue of their paper, we note that the first wedding that was consummated in Lynn county was performed in the home of W. C. Cowan, the contracting sparties being Mr. Will Humphries and Miss Bertie Cowan. The first item in the local column recites that Tahoka needs a railroad. The first editorial states that Tahoka was then five months old and was a town of forty buildings. The church directory shows that Rev. Parrack was the Baptist pastor, Rev. Roberts the Methodist pastor, and Rev. Bennett the Cumberland Presbyterian pastor. The paper carries a nice line of advertisements, one of the most prominent of which is that of a livery stable.

The News has been doing its part through all these years for the development of the country and the upbuilding of our little city, and the prophecy that Tahoka will some day be a good town, found in the first issue of the News, has already come true. It shall be our purpose during the coming year to help make it a better and bigger town in every way and to be of service to all Lynn county. Here goes for another year.

Teachers of Better Training Are Urged

FORT WORTH, Texas, Aug. 30-Texas must have better trained high school teaches, says Dr. George A. Works, director of the Texas School Survey. In the first of the reports on the finding of the survey the director suggests that legislation be set in motion to require high school out near mid-day last Saturday, and teachers of academic subjects to it was indeed sweet music to the ear. have college degrees.

He points out that more students study Algebra than all sciences put togeth er, and he condemns this condition and urges a change be made. The present status is accredited to the influence of the University of Texas, since it requires a large amount of mathematics in its own curriculum. The natural sciences-chemistry,

botany, physics, physiology, and hyriene, geography and nature studies are of equal value in mental discipline, and of more practical value In English the survey finds formal

phases are emphasized to the loss of practical application, and that grammar and composition receive too much attention in comparison with American and English literature. Spanish and Latin receive more attention than literature in the English languages.

Ancient and medieval history are over stressed in Texas, to the great loss of modern and American and Texas history and civics. This should be reversed, according to therecom mendations of the report.




