**STOCK YARDS COMPANY WILL HELP PROCURE GILTS**

The News has received a communication, advising that the Fort Worth Stock Yards Company will assist Chambers of Commerce, Bankers, and County Agents to procure gilts for the farmers of the state, declaring that there is a shortage of hogs in Texas. The communication is as follows:

"The Fort Worth Stock Yard Company is now prepared to cooperate with Chambers of Commerce, Bankers and County Agents, in securing well selected gilts not registered, at meat prices plus the cost of immunizing, freight, etc. There is now an 8,000,000 shortage in the pig crop; there are 200,000 farms in Texas without a pig of any kind; and it is costing Texas over \$70,000,000 annually to buy pork products from other States; with a rising hog market and the prospects of a fair crop of grain sorghums, it looks like it is time for the farmers of the State to restock their farms. Indifference and the lack of information on the value of hogs to general farming has been the biggest limiting factor the swine industry has had in Texas, and not the price of registered animals.

"Farmers whose farms have had no hogs for the past year are no doubt free from infection should now restock with registered hogs where it is possible to do, and then keep their farms in a sanitary condition.

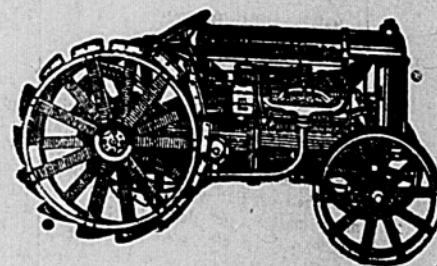

**ORDER OF COUNTY JUDGE, ELECTION IN SUBDIVISION**

This the 13th day of August 1924, came on to be considered by the county judge of Lynn County, Texas, the petition of W. W. Balch and fifty other freeholders of the hereinafter described sub-division of said county for an election in such sub-division for the purpose of enabling the freeholders thereof to determine whether horses, mules, jacks, jennets and cattle shall be permitted to run at large therein, and it appearing to the undersigned judge of said court that such petition was filed with the commissioners court of said county on the 7th day of August 1924, and that such court thereafter on the 11th day of August 1924, heard and granted the same and ordered that such election be held on the 20th day of September 1924, and that the judge of this court issue an order therefor and cause public notice thereof to be given as required by law;

Now, therefore, by virtue of the authority vested in me under such order and the law, I, J. W. Elliott, County Judge, of Lynn County, Texas, do hereby order that on the 20th day of September 1924, at New Home School House in such sub-division, an election shall be held for the purpose of enabling the freeholders of such sub-division to determine whether horses, mules, jacks, jennets and cattle shall be permitted to run at large in such sub-division, to wit:

Beginning at the Lynn and Lubbock county line at a point in the east line of sur. 13, cert. 685. Thence west on county line to a point in the west line of sur. 42, cert. 672. Thence south on section line to southwest corner sur. 156, cert. 31. Thence east 1 mile to northeast corner sur. 156, cert. 31. Thence south 1 mile to southeast corner sur. 156, cert. 31. Thence east on and with section line to southeast cor sur. 402 cert. 707. Thence north on and with section line to the county line in east line of sur. 13, cert. 685, the place of beginning.

That polls shall be opened for such election at New Home School house in such subdivision; W. W. Balch, J. H. Smith and J. H. McNeely being proper persons for such purpose and freeholders and qualified voters of such sub-division and of Lynn county, are hereby appointed as managers of said election, and they shall select and appoint their own clerks.

No person shall vote at such election unless he is a freeholder, and is also a qualified voter under the constitution and laws of the State of Texas. All votes of such election shall be by ballot and all voters desiring to prevent the animals designated herein from running at large shall place upon their ballots the words; "For The Stock Law", and those in favor of allowing such animals to run at large, "Against The Stock Law".

On or before the tenth day after such election, the persons holding such election shall make due return of all the votes cast at their respective voting places for and against said proposition to the county judge of said county who will tabulate and count said returns and as certain and proclaim the result of said election in the manner prescribed by law.

Public notice of this order shall be given for at least thirty days before the date of such election by publication thereof in some newspaper published in said county, if there be one; and if no newspaper be published in said county, then at three public places in said subdivisions.

**KEEP YOUR CHICKENS CULLED**

(By A. L. Robertson, County Agent)

Are you sure that it is possible to reduce your flock in size and get as many or more eggs—to reduce your flock in size and get more interest and pleasure from your birds—to reduce your flock in size and make more money from your hens? Just try Culling and see.

Everyone can readily appreciate considerable number of non-laying how important it is to maintain the flock up to a high average production; that is, if there are any non-birds, it reduces the flock average, and hence the profit very materially. Here is what we actually find under average poultry conditions. All hens will lay in the spring and early summer days of July and August. At that time there will always be found a certain per cent of the flock which will cease laying, start changing their plumage or moulting and go into a rather long, extended rest period. It is a fact that hens do not lay while changing their plumage. In order therefore, to put in practice with the birds the greatest amount of efficiency, it is a very successful and profitable practice to eliminate from the flock regularly through August and September the birds that quit at this time. This practice of weeding out these non-productive birds is called culling. Culling accomplishes two purposes in one operation. It eliminates the inefficient non-producing individuals and if these poorer cull birds are sold immediately for the meat it brings in considerable revenue from this source, or if they are consumed at the home table, their disposition enables quite a saving in the family budget. Then too, we must remember that the elimination of these non-layers does not reduce the egg yield one bit, but at the same time it accomplishes quite a material reduction in the amount of feed consumed, hence reducing the operating cost for feed. Then there is yet another definite advantage in culling. While one regularly eliminating the poor birds during the summer, there are gradually left in the flock in the fall, the better individuals, those which are desirable to be held over as breeders for the following year.
