# Ranch Is Sold TRUSTEES HEAR COLLEGE MAN

sphries, W. T. S. T. C Speaker At County School Meeting Held Here

Responding to the call of Judge C. H. Cain, about thirty school trustees of the county met in the county court room at 2:30 Saturday afternoon to hear school problems discussed by Dr. John S. Humphries, a mem ber of the faculty of the West Texas State Teachers College.

Dr. Humphries fully explained what is meant by high schools of the first, second, and third class, on what basis schools are classified, and what affiliation means and on what basis credits are allowed. Then he discussed the matter of teachers. He strongly urged the trustees to raise high standard in the selection of their teachers, stressing the importance of scholarship and training for the work on the part of the teachers. Another matter which he insisted should have the careful thought and consideration of trustees and of the voters generally is the manner in which county school superintendents are chosen. He argued that they should not be selected by popular vote but by the county board of trustees, just as city and town superintendents are selected by the board of trustees, just as city and town superintendents are selected by the board of trustees, fust as city and town superintendents are selected by the board of trustees.

His address was very much enjoyed and appreciated by the trustees and many lingered to discusse with him privately the matters which had discussed in his public address.

Follwoing Dr. Humphries' address Judge Cain spoke briefly but very helpbully concerning some loca probems that trustees as well as he acting as county superintendent have to deal with.

Judge Cain also announced that he expected to call another meeting of all the trustees of the county at as he acting as county superintendent have to deal with.

Such meeting as that held Saturday afternoon is very fine in imparting information and in quickening the school spirit. It is to be hoped that there will be many in the future.







We know nothing about these particular cases, but there has long been a current belief in this country that violations of the liquor laws were being committed by men of wealth and influence in some counties of this state unmulested by the officers of the law. In fact, such charges have been frequently made hereofore. It will b rememberd that two or three years ago, Rev. Frank Norris of Ft. Worth charged that a federal district judge in Texas was patronizing bootleggers and winking at violations of the liquor laws as patronizing bootleggers and winking at violations of the laquir laws. Rev. Atticus Webb, superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League of Texas, charged that at the aberiff's convention at Amarillo about three years ago a lot of the sheriff's themselves gut beastly drunk. 

PHILADELPHIA CHURCH HISTORIC PLACE

Old Christ Church, on Second to Street below Arch Street, Philadel-phia, has heard the prayers of America first patriots beseehing freedom from tryanny. Visitors to the Seaguicentennial International Exposition next year will scarcely find a landmark of more historical significance.

Construction of the ancient sanctuary, which is of pure Colonial architecture, was begun in 1727. Dissension regarding an environment conducive to worship must have abounded, for many alterations were made, and it was only after the pulpit was moved twice, and the gallery enlarged, the seats altered, and the twenty-four branch chandelier hung, that the body of the church was completed in 1744. The pillars alone seem to have been made of adamant.

Funds for the steeple and bells weer raised by means of a lottery. The latter would indicate a more broadminded attitude on the part of vur forefathers toward funding expenses than is the custom of the 20th century vestryman. There can be no doubt that it was over subscribed since Benjamin Franklin was one of its managers. The tower and steeple were completed in 1753-54, and a chime of eight bells, costing five hundred pounds, was imported.

The old pulpit of 1770, the prayer lesks made from the original high desk, and the old communion table below the altar, remain to this day. The font, at which Bishop White, Francis Hopkinson, and a long list of worthies were baptized, was replaced in 1879 by one which was the gift of Jonathan Gostelowe. The beautiful silver bowl, weighing over sixty-three ounces, presented by Colonel Robert Quarry of the British Army in 1712, is still used.

It is the general impression that Washington, during his sojourn in Philadelphia, was a regular attendant at Christ Church. However, it appears from he correspondence of Bishop White with Colonel Mercer






