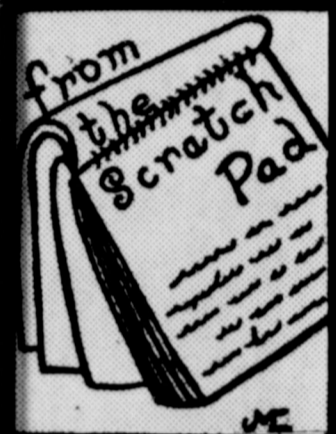

An ambitious Spanish exchange student, Jose' Alfonso Garza - Junco, better known to Wilson students and friends as "Joe", returned home to Mexico after completing special studies in Wilson High School. He went home via plane Dec. 12 to be with his family for the Christmas holidays.

Joe is the 21-year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Rogelio Garza - Lopez of Monterrey, (In Mexico, both names of parents are used). He has three brothers, one of who is a 17-year old concert pianist.

The story of the exchange student's trip to Texas and his acquaintance with Mrs. Nancy Green, WHS English teacher, was related to Mrs. Ted Melugin when she met them for an appointment at the school recently. Mrs. Melugin stated that "it was indeed a pleasure meeting this young man and hear of his dreams that are fast becoming a reality." It takes but a few minutes to know that Joe has a "pleasing personality, a quick smile, and is eager to cooperate."

Mrs. Green told of first meeting Joe and his family while she and her husband were vacationing in Mexico last September. They were enroute by train through Cooper Canyon which was a 13-hour journey. They learned of Joe's desire to

come to the United States and enter a university as well as his dreams of becoming a rancher. He presently owns 16 head of cattle which he keeps on a friend's 140,000 acre ranch. Joe wants to enlarge his herd and buy a ranch in Mexico someday. He is a 1964 high school graduate and attended the University of Chihuahua, Mexico. Upon learning that Joe needed additional English studies before being accepted into a university in the United States, Mr. and Mrs. Dick Green in-

vited him to reside with them at their home in Lubbock and arranged for him to be an exchange student at Wilson High School.

Joe's parents consented to the arrangement and brought him to Lubbock last October. Joe's father is connected with Reynolds Aluminum in Monterrey, while visiting in Wilson, Joe's parents met a number of faculty members and Wilson residents. This is Joe's second trip to the states, but was his first to Texas. He attended the University of Michigan last spring for a six weeks course in English.

Joe completed courses at WHS in junior and senior English, and took junior and senior courses in vocational agriculture.

Mrs. Green stated that Joe was surprised about everything in the states being run by machines, like the cotton - pickers in action, which he had never seen. Joe said, "Everything in Mexico is done by hand." He was fascinated by the new telephones with the dial on the receiver, and wanted to buy one to take home. Mrs. Green explained they could not be bought, but only rented in this country. She asked him if he wanted to tell about being cast in a film this summer? Joe explained that while out riding on his horse, he came upon a group from MGM movies making a film starring Shirley McClain and Edmund O'Brien. The movie,

entitled, "Sun-Rise", is to be released sometime next year. Joe was employed by the director after a friend told of his fine horse-riding ability. He was cast in the film riding his horse, herding the cattle. Joe explained that he received a nice fee for three days of filming.

When Joe was asked what he liked most about Wilson, he replied, "The boys were friendly and I enjoyed the football games very much." He was asked about the girls. He laughingly replied, "They're nice, too." Joe said he enjoyed visiting the different farms in this area and working with the Future Farmer students and teacher. He expressed deep gratitude to the Wilson faculty and for Mr. and Mrs. Green's hospitality and efforts in giving him the opportunity of becoming an exchange student in Wilson.

During Joe's stay here, he was an invited guest speaker to the Intermediate Baptist Girls' Auxiliary and to the WHS History classes, showing color slides of his homeland. Since his arrival in this area, Joe has made many friends at Texas Tech where he became a member of the International Club and was accepted on the Soccer Team. It was learned that "Soccer" is the most important sport played in Mexico.

Mrs. Green also stated in the interview that Joe would be missed by her and her husband and his many friends, and that his knowledge of the English language had greatly improved, as well as her knowledge of Spanish. Joe hopes to enter either the University of Kansas City, or Texas Tech in the fall semester.

After the interview, Joe joined his new friends in the Wilson High School auditorium to watch a magician perform on stage. "Laughter is a language, understood by people of all nations, Joe." The people of Wilson invite Joe to return, and thank him for bringing the message by his visit - a better understanding between countries, customs and people.

Linda Huffaker, CHD Agent, Says.....

Stronger Fiber for Active Knees
Permanent press fabric is being improved with stronger fibers to resist knee scrapes and wear. The new polyester, man-made fiber used in most permanent press products, now stretches the same as its cotton counterpart, explains Linda and will share he strain with cotton.

No Germs in Cold Water Washing
Cold water detergents have passed their consumer acceptance test. According to Linda, tests have shown that the fear of bacterial infection from cold water washing is unfounded. Researchers agree tumble drying at standard 60 degrees Fahrenheit kills is much or more bacteria than the hot-cycle washer does.

Tough Jobs
To improve cleaning of heavily soiled items, Linda recommends using the cold-water detergents in hot water. They work even better at higher temperatures.

ABC—Permanent Press

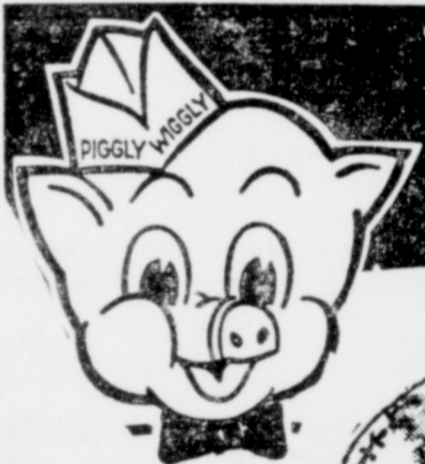
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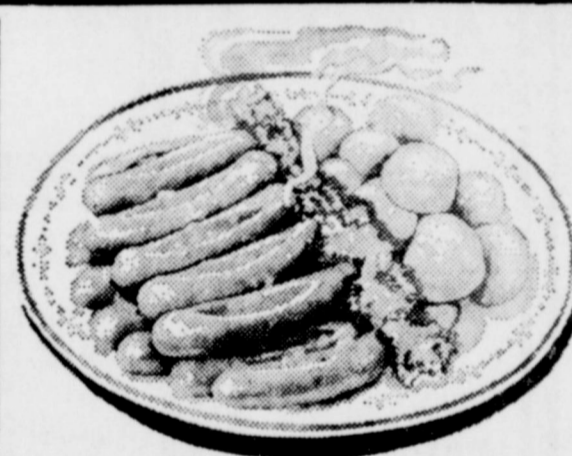
