Fieed From Quarantine For Scabies Washington. D. C. Nov. 17, 1913. The Acting Secretary of Agr iculture bas issued an order releasing, on Nuvember 17, from Federal quarantine for cattle scabies (also called "cattle mange'") the Counties of Howard and Borden in the state of Texas. The release of these two cunties is the first visible effect ecently promulgis order state Live Stock Sanitary Com ission requiring that between the dates of September 1 and ecmber 1,1913 , all affected could the quarantiened arear erds be dipped twice, and all dipped ones, under State or Federal supervision. The DepartBareau of Animal industry is cooperating actively in the enforcement of this order, and since September 1 approximately
sixty State and Federal employees have been engaged in the the dipping af cattle in the handle country of Texas. The Panhandle Cattle Raisers' Association is also cooperating.

## LIQUOR SHIPMENT LAW

The Allison law of the regular session prohibited intrastate shipments, but at the specia session the new law was passed, repealing the old one and broadning its effect to include inter state shipments.
The principal changes from the old law are intended to take advantage of the Federal law known as the Webb-Kenyon act, permittio: States to prohibit shipments of intoxicating liquor or alcohol into prohibition or cal option territory, and the in sertion of provisions making it possible for drugglsts, manufacturers using alcohol commercial ly, and the like, to obtain the alcohol by making affidavit as to the purpose of use and amount the purpose of use and amount ing each individual order.
The cheif means of efforci the prohibition against ments of alcoholic beverage from other States into dry terri rom in Texas is by giving territory in Texas is by giving peace fheers the right of prohibiting hipments and by prohibiting xpress and other carrying com panies from receiving and trans mitting such shipments. But he lutely prohibits the soliciting solutely prohibits the soliciting of orders by letter, circulars or in any other manner in dry
local option territory in Texas.

or local option territory makes the violation of its terms a felony, and provides that "any person, or any officer. agent mploye of any firm or any cor poration who shall violate any of che provisions of this act shall be
