According to Congressman George Mahon the battle over farm payment limitations for the 1970 crop is over for this year. The House and Senate approved the final conference agreement on the Agriculture appropriation bill today without payment limitations.

Many House Members who favor payment limitations agreed to support the final version of the Appropriation bill and postpone the fight to enact payment limitations until the bill providing for the new farm program is presented to the House next year by the Committee on Agriculture. Congressman Mahon said that he was highly pleased over the victory, but wished to warn of the serious difficulties which continue to lie ahead with respect to the enactment next year of a new farm program. Our farmers and ranchers are the backbone of the economy in Lynn County all crops in Lynn County in 1968 being \$19,854,000 and livestock and livestock products being \$1,228,000 giving a total of \$21,082,000 in farm marketings for last year. Government payments to the farmers in Lynn County last year were \$8,729,000 and makes the total farm marketing and government payments total \$29,811,000. Although the government payments are \$8,729,000 there is still a loss average of about 7,000,000 dollars in farm income in Lynn County under the present farm program that went in to effect in 1966. Government payments to farmers in Lynn County will reach about 10,000,000 this year.

55,975 Bales Ginned In Lynn County Area



NEW DIMENSION IN HOG RAISING--Pictured here is a portable hog pen that is being built in Tahoka by Jimmy Dulin. Jimmy is building the pen for Robert Smith, local farmer and hog raiser and son of Mr. and Mrs. Ross Smith. The pen will have wood floor and a top on half of it. According to most reports there are several advantages to the portable pen. One is cleanliness and also it takes less feed to a pound of gain on the hog. The pen pictured should top out about 50 hogs at a time.

County gins are running at top production, with most gins running night and day. As of noon Tuesday, 55,975 bales had been ginned in Lynn County. This report was compiled from production of 25 area gins.

Early estimates for the county was the same as last year which was 130,000 bales.

The bale count is running about the same as last year, with the bale count November 12, being 50,390 ahead of the count November 25, 1967, which was 33,849.

Tahoka's four gins tallied 9217 bales to date. Other gin totals are, 5162, Wilson; 9296, New Home; 16,096 O'Donnell; 6,536, Grassland; 3400, West Point; 3,050, Wells; 2,000, New Moore; and the two Southland gins, 1,218. This represents just above 43 per cent of the total production estimate.
