

### SEN. HARDING SAILS FOR THE CANAL ZONE

PRESIDENT-ELECT DELIVERS TWO ADDRESSES IN NEW ORLEANS BEFORE SAILING

### URGES CLEAR THINKING

Believes Problems Brought About by War Can be Solved by a "Confident America."

New Orleans, La.-Sober thinking and an abiding faith in the republic during the critical period of war reconstruction were asked of the American people by President-elect Harding in an address delivered here just before he sailed for a three weeks' vacation voyage to the Canal Zone.

Some reverses and disapopintments he declared, must come as the aftermath of the world conflict, but he predicted confidently that all of them would pass away again if the people only "kept their heads" and held fast to the old-time virtues of thrift, honesty and common sense. Making his second formal speech since his election, Mr. Harding spoke in studied terms with a quiet earnestness betokening a full realization of the responsibilities ahead of him. But ringing through his address was a predominating note of confidence and "unfaltering faith."

"A confident America," buttressed by resources never equaled before by any people, and governed by a free. representative government, was the ideal for which tre president-elect declared must be kept forever in view through the time of transition. He said no one desired that the old order should return, but he maintained that in building for the new order there alls and fancy theories.



### Thanksgiving Hymn Well Liked at Birth But Now Forgotten

The first presidential Thanksgiving proclamation was that of President Washington in 1789 on the occasion of the adoption of the Constitution. the day, curiously enough, being November 26-the date of celebration of 1863. The great victories of Gettysburg and Vicksburg were really the cause of Lincoln's proclamation, and his example has been followed by all his successors until the annual festival has become one of our national insti-

The proclamation of 1863 was remarkable as the first of a series, extending now over fifty years. It was also noticeable because it was the occasion of a thanksgiving hymn by the of St. Luke's hospital, New York city. He is well known as the author of the familiar hymn, "I Would Not Live Alway," and a poet of no small repute. Mr. Lincoln's glowing words met his eye and struck a responsive chord in his heart. A noble Thanksgiving hymn was the result, a hymn which at the time was often sung, but is now comparatively forgotten. It was published with appropriate music, and even yet is suitable for use on similar

The bymn contains nine stanzas, with chorus, and takes up in order the various causes for thanksgiving mentioned in Mr. Lincoln's proclamation. The original title was "Give Thanks All Ye People," the first verse being as follows:

Give thanks, all ye people, give thanks Allelulas of freedom with joyful accord Let the East and the West, North and

South roll along, Sea, mountain and prairie, one thanksgiving song.

Give thanks, all ye people, give thanks to Allel is of freedom, with joyful accord.

thanks, Doctor Muhlenburg spoke of it | as "The President's Hymn," but would not permanently offer such a title without Mr. Lincoln's approval. Mr. Robert B. Minturn, a prominent member of Doctor Muhlenburg's congregation, was greatly pleased with the poem, and sent a copy to the President. with whom he was personally acquainted, asking permission to name the hymn as the author desired. Mr. Lincoln telegraphed back: "So let it be."

In July, 1865, Dr. Horace Bushnell published in "Hours at Home" an article attacking the well-known hymn, "America," as an unworthy and really humiliating effusion-as a political anthem. Doctor Bushnell thus refers to Doctor Muhlenburg's production:

"The hymn and air that were given to the public by Doctor Muhlenburg a short time ago appear to have missed the accident of being fairly born, and for that reason have not succeeded. The want of good accident here is fatal, but the hymn has real merit. It was too long and included three or



four verses that could have been omitted with advantage. Otherwise it might have stuck and would have had a fair chance of success; for the music, which we know only by the eye, and never heard in a public performance, appeared to have a look of prom-

The next known reference to this hymn occurs in connection with the observance of the fiftieth convocation of the University of Illinois, on November 20, 1913. 

Cheap Building Material.

The making of houses chiefly from slate waste, as proposed by north Wales builders, is an experiment of much interest. The waste has been accumulating in quarries for three centuries, and is adapted for use in paints, putty, bricks, blocks, slabs, tiles, flooring, mortar, rubber and molded products, but hitherto the cost of manufacture seems to have kept it from competition with other materials. Tried for roads, the slate has proven too dirty in wet weather. It is suggested as a promising binder in granite macadam; and bricks made from it have been found very strong and as resistant to water absorption as other bricks. Good drain pipes have been made from slate dust. For cement the ground waste is claimed to be especially good, and near the quarries a mastic of slate dust and oil has been used often for repairing leaky roofs. This mixture, when it sets, is said to be harder and more durable than the natural slate rock.

Uncle Sam's Tallest Eastern Mountain. Many people believe that Mount Washington, in New Hampshire, is the highest mountain in the eastern part of the United States. Mount Washington stands 6,293 feet above sea level, according to the United States geological survey, but many peaks in the southern Appalachians are several hundred feet higher than New Hamp-

shire's famous mountain. The highest mountain in the Appalachian system-the highest point in the United States east of the Rockies-is Mount Mitchell, in North Carolina, which stands at an elevation of 6,711 feet.

The highest mountain in Tennessee, Mount Guyot, stands 6,636 feet above sea level .- Geological Survey Bulletin.

Porcelain of Great Value.

Remarkable properties are claimed for a new porcelain. A special glaze expands and contracts in exactly the same degree as the mass of porcelain, and chemical and other vessels made from the material not only endure great heat but are not fractured by sudden changes of temperature. It is even possible to fuse holes in the new porcelain, using an oxyhydrogen blow pipe, without causing cracking. The material, moreover, can be worked like glass, and different pieces can be fused together, or a porcelain tube or handle can be fused to a dish. The blow-pipe softened mass can be blown like glass into bulbs or other forms

DYES TO BE SUPERFLUOUS?

Short Cut to Gorgeous Colorings Being Worked Out by a Wizard, It Is Said.

A. W. Brabham of Olar. S. C., soon to be known as the Wizard of the Cotton Patch, Burbank's only rival, announces that the American dye industry is unnecessary, or at least soon will be, according to Drug and Chemical Markets. For has he not grown cotton already dyed various shades of brown, green, blue, pink and gray as it comes on the plant? And does he not expect to produce black in a few years as well as all the colors of the rainbow? Tous will the need of colors for cotton be obviated and the wealth that now is being accumulated by the dye barons will be diverted in the cotton growing districts of the South

No mention is made of dyes for wool, but even these will be unnecessary when some genius undertakes to spend half a lifetime crossbreeding sheep to color their fleece, and this genius would have less difficulty than with cotton, as he would have ready at hand the world over supply of "black sheep." Then it would only be necessary to teach the silk worms to turn out colored silk after feeding on the flower bed and the flax plant to produce green fibers from green sand, bive from blue marl, red from red clay, and black from loam, ad infinitum.



HEARING IS HELD BEFORE SECRE. TARY PAYNE AND COM-MISSIONER SELLS

Washington.-Arguments in support of the government abolishing the 4,800 acre rule, as applied to oil lands of the Osages and tribes of western Oklahoma, have been presented before Secretary Payne of the interior department and Commissioner Sells of the Indian bureau at a hearing by members of the Osage Lessees' association, Mid-Continent Oil and Gas association and other oil operators now in the field. The movement is opposed by Randolph Shirk of Tulsa, attorney for the Cortez Oil company, who disputed the claims of the Mid-Continent association that the existing rule was hampering the small operator. The department had revoked the rule with reference to the territory of the five tribes in Oklahoma and has from time to time modified its application in western Okla-

Secretary Payne announced at the opening of the hearing that suggestions had been made looking to a further modification of the rule rather than its abandonment by the government. The oil men took this to mean that their permitted acreage in leases would be enlarged considerably, probably to 20.000 or 30,000 acres, sufficient to pay an operator going into development on a large scale. The only promise made by Secretary Payne was that the matter would be determined promptly.

Advocates of the proposal presented a solid front in their argument that the restriction tended to hamper development, and that if the rule was not abolished, or greatly modified, the Osage country would be deserted virtually by the producer. Waco, Texas .- The agricultural display made at the Cotton Palace this year by west Texas towns under the direction of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce has been awarded a prize of \$1,000 to rthe best sectional exhibit of its kind at this year's exposition.

HOW JESUS THE KING WAS RE-CEIVED.

LESSON TEXT-Matt. Il and 12. GO: DEN TEXT-Come unto me all ye that labor and are heavy laden, and I will

give you rest.-Matt. 11:28. ADDITIONAL MATERIAL-Luke 7:18-35; 10:13-15, 21, 22; 11:14-26, 29, 32.

-Choosing Jesus as Our Teacher, YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULT TOPIC -The Response of Men to the Ministry

The teacher should keep in mind the progress of thought in Matthew and present these lessons accordingly. In chapters 5 to 7 we have the laws of the kingdom; chapters 8 and 9, the mighty works to demonstrate the King's ability to administer the affairs of the kingdom; chapter 10, the propagation of the kingdom through the sending forth of the twelve; chapters 11 and 12, how the kingdom was received.

I. Four Classes of Hearers (ch. 11). 1. Perplexed hearers like John the Baptist (11:2-11). John believed that Jesus was the Christ (v. 2), but was somewhat perplexed as to the manner of the establishment of the kingdom. In the Old Testament predictions there were two lines in the Messianic prophecies; the one set forth Christ as the suffering one, as in Isaiah 53, and the other, as the invincible Conqueror, as in Isaiah 63. Indeed, in Isaiah 60:1, 2 we have the two advents in one view (see Matt. 3:10-12). He said that the ax is laid unto the root of the trees and that there was to be a separation of the ly with the opening of the eyes of the blind, etc. John saw Christ as the one who would remove the sins of the people by the shedding of his blood (John 1:29), but he failed to see the interval between the time of his sufferings and the time of his triumph. Since this interval between the first and second comings-the nature of the age in which we live-was not known until Christ revealed it in the parables of the thirteenth chapter, we do not wonder at John's perplexity. John's faith was not failing him, neither did he send this deputation to Jesus for the sake of his disciples. He was a true prophet and a faithful man, but he was perplexed.

2. Violent hearers (11:12-19). These were willing to receive the kingdom according to their own way, but were unwilling to conform to its laws. Their ears were closed to everything but their own carnality. They would not repent when called upon to repent by John, nor rejoice when called upon by Christ to rejoice (vv. 17-19).

3: The stout-hearted unbelievers (11:20-24). In Cherazin, Bethsaida. and Capernaum, Christ had done most of his mighty works, but the people deliberately set their hearts against him and his message. It was not for lack of knowledge and opportunity that they were unsaved, but for their purposeful rejection of Christ. Tyre and Sidon, Sodom and Gomorrah were filled with immoral profligates and idolaters, but they will be more tolerably dealt with in the day of judgment than those who wilfully reject

4. Hearers who are babes in spirit (11:25-30). There were some among those who heard Jesus with childlike faith, who believed that Christ was the Messiah, and they opened their hearts to receive him. Christ igyftes those who have the babe-like spirit to come to him, and to all who come to him and receive him he gives rest.

### II. The Antagonism of the Kingdom. (ch. 12).

In chapter 11 we saw the shameful indifference of the Jews to their King. In this chapter we see positive and bitter antagonism. manifesting itself against him. They are not only without a heart for him, but do their best to destroy him. The immediate occasion of their wicked determination was Christ's relation to the Sabbath. Because the hungry disciples plucked corn and Jesus healed the withered hand on the Sabbath day, they sought to destroy him. They accused him of being in league with the Devil. Jesus with unanswerable logic showed them that they had biasphemed against the Holy Ghost, and were therefore guilty of an unpardonable sin. They did not deny the miracle but sought to account for it without owning him as the Messiah.




