 Quite a number of negroes are now in Lynn county helping gather the large cotton crop. Many of the pickers who came out west to pick the staple are returning, owing to the decline in wages during the past few days. The cotton market is at low ebb, and the growers cannot pay the same price that prevailed a week or so back. It is likely that hundreds of acres will be

left in the fields if the price continues to go down. Wages in all lines of work has been cut as well as the forces on many concerns.
 The report of State Treasurer, John W. Barker, shows that at the close of the fiscal year, ending August 31, 1920 there was a balance of \$8,840,768 to the credit of general revenue which is the highest in the history of the state. Also school bonds to the credit of the permanent school fund increased more than \$3,000,000 during the last two years. The available school fund amounts to \$1,713,817 which is much in excess of any balance ever held by that fund at the close of the fiscal year.

A. E. F. Landmarks Going.
 Gradually the landmarks of the American army that first reached the Rhine are disappearing. The old buildings that sheltered the first army amusements and recreations are being demolished, and the latest one to feel the blow of the wrecker's hammer is the victory hut in Coblenz.
 This hut was built to provide an adequate eating place for the soldiers coming in from the various bridge-heads. A corps of civilian workers were kept busy preparing and serving the food for the 7,000 men who were fed there each day. At first the entire building was used as a cafeteria, but when the most of the divisions had gone home and the A. E. F. became the A. F. G., half of the building was converted into a wet canteen for the service of light lunches, ice cream, etc., and the other side was still used as the cafeteria.
 November 5, last year, a heavy snow storm came near ending the career of the hut. The weight of snow on the roof was so great that the main pillars buckled and distorted the floor to such an extent that the authorities questioned the advisability of making the necessary repairs. The demand for a skating rink, however, was so insistent that after much discussion the building was altered and the athletic enthusiasts, as well as the skating enthusiasts, used the building during the winter.—From the Stars and Stripes.

All Pages at Right.

Why not print all books in such a way that every page is a right-hand page? asks Dr. I. Winslow of Boston, who claims a patent for his conception of how to do it. He holds that if one has to read pages on one side of a book only this will be held more easily, the eyes will not wander, there will be no necessity for changing the position of the head and neck. Thus reading, especially of big heavy volumes, will be less fatiguing, not only to the eyes, head and neck, but also to the arms and hands.

Mr. Winslow's idea is to print a book so that you read straight ahead from right-hand page to right-hand page, these being numbered consecutively; then, when you have read through to the last right hand page, you turn the book upside down and continue reading as before, what in ordinary books are left hand pages now being right-hand pages. This, of course, involves printing all left hand pages upside down and numbering them consecutively from the back of the book. This would easily be arranged by the printer in laying out the forms, though to get the pagination of a large book correct would require some nice calculation on the printer's part.

Flag Stayed Right There.

Court etiquette among the reigning families of Europe is not to be lightly considered, and so the story of how the stubbornness of an American doughboy upset an age-old rule of the royal house of Roumania is of more than usual interest.

Some time ago Queen Marie of Roumania accepted an invitation to ride in an American official army car. When the car arrived at the palace gates, the queen at once noted that an American flag flew from the radiator. Before entering the car she requested that the flag be removed, explaining that royal etiquette prevented her riding behind any flag save that of her own country.

Opposition arose immediately. The chauffeur, an American doughboy, announced politely, but none the less firmly, that when the flag came down he came down also, and some one else would have to drive the car. The queen, who, by the way, is a granddaughter of the late Queen Victoria of England, graciously conceded the point and the party proceeded on their way.

Cheap Building Material.

The making of houses chiefly from slate waste, as proposed by north Wales builders, is an experiment of much interest. The waste has been accumulating in quarries for three centuries, and is adapted for use in paints, putty, bricks, blocks, slabs, tiles, flooring, mortar, rubber and molded products, but hitherto the cost of manufacture seems to have kept it from competition with other materials. Tried for roads, the slate has proven too dirty in wet weather. It is suggested as a promising binder in granite macadam; and bricks made from it have been found very strong and as resistant to water absorption as other bricks. Good drain pipes have been made from slate dust. For cement the ground waste is claimed to be especially good, and near the quarries a mastic of slate dust and oil has been used often for repairing leaky roofs. This mixture, when it sets, is said to be harder and more durable than the natural slate rock.

Uncle Sam's Tallest Eastern Mountain.
 Many people believe that Mount Washington, in New Hampshire, is the highest mountain in the eastern part of the United States. Mount Washington stands 6,293 feet above sea level, according to the United States geological survey, but many peaks in the southern Appalachians are several hundred feet higher than New Hampshire's famous mountain.

The highest mountain in the Appalachian system—the highest point in the United States east of the Rockies—is Mount Mitchell, in North Carolina, which stands at an elevation of 6,711 feet.

The highest mountain in Tennessee, Mount Guyot, stands 6,636 feet above sea level.—Geological Survey Bulletin.

Porcelain of Great Value.

Remarkable properties are claimed for a new porcelain. A special glaze expands and contracts in exactly the same degree as the mass of porcelain, and chemical and other vessels made from the material not only endure great heat but are not fractured by sudden changes of temperature. It is even possible to fuse holes in the new porcelain, using an oxyhydrogen blow pipe, without causing cracking. The material, moreover, can be worked like glass, and different pieces can be fused together, or a porcelain tube or handle can be fused to a dish. The blow-pipe softened mass can be blown like glass into bulbs or other forms not hitherto produced with material of this kind.

DYES TO BE SUPERFLUOUS?

Short Cut to Gorgeous Colorings Being Worked Out by a Wizard, It Is Said.

A. W. Brabham of Olar, S. C., soon to be known as the Wizard of the Cotton Patch, Burbank's only rival, announces that the American dye industry is unnecessary, or at least soon will be, according to Drug and Chemical Markets. For has he not grown cotton already dyed various shades of brown, green, blue, pink and gray as it comes on the plant? And does he not expect to produce black in a few years as well as all the colors of the rainbow? Thus will the need of colors for cotton be obliterated and the wealth that now is being accumulated by the dye barons will be diverted in the cotton growing districts of the South.

No mention is made of dyes for wool, but even these will be unnecessary when some genius undertakes to spend half a lifetime crossbreeding sheep to color their fleece, and this genius would have less difficulty than with cotton, as he would have ready at hand the world over supply of "black sheep." Then it would only be necessary to teach the silk worms to turn out colored silk after feeding on the flower bed and the flax plant to produce green fibers from green sand, blue from blue marl, red from red clay, and black from loam, ad infinitum.

On Selecting Doors.

Haphazard selection of doors of the ready-made variety should not be allowed in the building of a fine home, declares an announcement issued at Chicago by the lumber interests. Doors should be designed by the architect who builds the structure, that they may be in keeping with the general style of the house, it is stated.

It is pointed out that in the selection of an attractive and distinctive doorway depends the visitor's first impression of the home he is about to enter.

Recounting the history of doors, lumber manufacturers point out that in early days wooden doors were hung on sockets instead of hinges. In the middle ages doors were richly carved and in the gothic period were nearly covered with intricate ornamentation extending as part of the hinges.

Sweet Potatoes.

The sweet potato may soon be a much more common vegetable in our markets than heretofore. Its season has been restricted by the difficulty of keeping it for any length of time in storage. Unlike the white potato, it began to deteriorate as soon as it came out of the ground.

This trouble is understood to have been overcome by new methods of curing, and plants specially designed for the storage of sweet potatoes have recently been established at many points in the South.

Improved and much sweeter varieties have been developed, and a campaign is being organized to promote the marketing of better sweet potatoes on a greater scale all over the country.

The sweet potato, of course, is not really a potato at all, but a kind of yam. It is, like the so-called "Irish" potato, an American vegetable by origin.

"GHOST" IN NO MAN'S LAND

Germans Thought They Were Listening to Unearthly Visitor, but it Was Clever Propaganda.

The only direct propaganda raid for which the American army had opportunity before the armistice was planned and carried out on the Metz front by Capt. H. E. Osann, an officer of Belgian descent who was familiar with the German army, says Mr. Heber Blankenhorn in Harper's Magazine.

"This is my funeral," Capt. Osann said when he explained his scheme. "All I want is 40,000 leaflets. That division is full of Alsace-Lorrainers, and I know the names of scores of men in it. We'll drop special leaflets on them for a few days, and after they have soaked in I'll take a patrol some night and go up to their wire and call, 'Don't shoot! I'm not going to shoot. Is Fritz Schneider there? I want to talk to him. Where is Willy Liebmann?'"

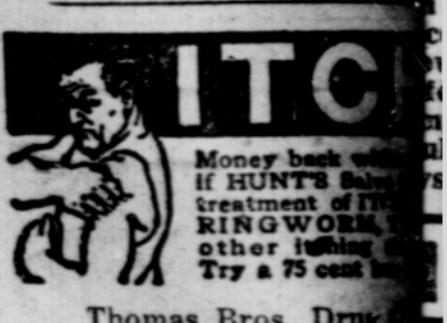
"You'll get a prompt answer from machine guns," I observed.
