## Lynn County Farmers Institute to Meet June 6th to Elect Delegates to S. F. I.

The farmers, stock farmers and others interested in the development of Lynn county are hereby notified that The Lynn County Farmers Institute will meet in called session Saturday, June 6th, for the purpose of electing delegates to the State Institute to be held at College Station, Texas, July 17 and 18, 1914.

It is very essential that every man and woman interested in any way should be present as every 25 members or majority fraction thereof entitles us to one more delegate, provided we do not have more than ten delegates including one delegate at-large. Also your enrollment in the Institute automatically places you on the mailing list of the State Department of Agriculture and you will receive

all bulletins issued by that department free of charge.

Those who will be able to attend should file their names with H. M. Larkin, Secretary, before the meeting is called to order. Each delegate is entitled to free transportation both ways. Those ineligible to obtain passes are:

All district officers. All county officers, except County health officer and sheriff and two deputies. All precinct officers, except constable and two deputies. All school trustees and notaries public, unless such officers are actual bonafide employees of the railroads. Penalty for such persons using passes, not less than thirty days nor more than twelve months in jail and a fine of not less than \$100 nor more than \$1000.

## Most Rain in May

The month of May so far this year has been the wettest May ever known in Tahoka. The 1st day and night 1.66 inches fell, on the 9th we added .08, the 10th .35, the 14th during night .07, the 15th night and day .93, the 16th night .07, the 17th night .15, the 20th night and day .10, the 21st night 12 the 22nd night and day .18, the 25th night .15, the 29th last night .44; making 4.30 inches of rain this month. Requiring 12 nights and 5 days for four and a third inches of rain to fall, every bit of it went into the ground where it fell. So far this year six and three quarters inches of rain has fallen in Tahoka, while many parts of the county has had twice as much. One three or four hour rain filled a 22 inch wash pot that was out in the open yard on the Jim Cowan place five miles south of town.

## Very Few Fires Set by Dangerous Trades

By ROBERT ADAMSON, Fire Commissioner of New York City

THREE generations ago New England mill owners set out to make their mills safe from fires. By sound construction, by fire extinguishing apparatus and by cleaning up rubbish they greatly cut down fire losses. Their example has not been generally followed. But it shows what can be done.

OF NEW YORK'S 12,955 FIRES LAST YEAR HALF WERE DUE TO CARELESSNESS. CARELESSNESS WITH CIGARETTES, 1,079; WITH MATCHES, 1,175; WITH BONFIRES, 1,058; WITH GAS RANGES, ETC., 753; WITH OVERHEATED STOVES, ETC., 696; WITH CHIMNEYS, 703; CHILDREN WITH MATCHES AND FIRE, 588; WITH CANDLES, 351; WITH BENZINE, ETC., 394.

Dangerous trades set few fires—ONLY TWENTY-FOUR LAST YEAR FROM EXPLODING CHEMICALS; ONLY FOUR FROM CELLULOID AND FILMS. In these trades people take precautions.

We suggest that the ministers of Tahoka each devote one service this summer to the subject of "Cleanliness", individually and collectively. It seems as though they might find plenty of Scripture to support the subject.

For years it has been considered the duty of the town and city man to do all the boosting and advertising for the entire county, while really it is the farmer himself that is most vitally interested in the settling up and development of the country, and the more remote the farmer is situated from town, the more personally interested he is. What does the newcomer mean to the city man? It means more custom of which he may get a small share. What does a newcomer mean to the farmer? It means a customer right at his door who must have feed for his stock, very likely must buy some stock, it means a neighbor on whom to call for help in times of sickness and distress; often it means a larger school attendance, always it means more school money, an increase in church and social gatherings, it means less jury service, help to work the roads, more and better roads and better marketing facilities, in fact it means civilization instead of savagery. The farmers in a new, sparsely settled country like the South Plains should be the most persistent boosters of all.

## OUR TENANT PROBLEMS

EDITOR'S NOTE:—This is the fourth of a series of articles on AGRICULTURAL PROBLEMS prepared by Judge S. A. Lindsey, chairman of the Texas Farm Life Commission.

The tenant problem is less simple than the getting of cheap money on land worth twice the amount borrowed; all that is required in that case is to arrange the security (the best in the world) so that it is acceptable at the source of cheap money. All this is cold-blooded business between the investors in securities and those selling same. The transaction is: give me security and I will give you money. The state is not interested in this and should take no further hand in it than to provide the law by which the organization for invading the cheap money market may be effected, and then giving such organization opportunity to borrow such trust funds as the government may be lending.

The problem of inducing shifting tenants who are merely in partnership with the landlord in robbing the soil of its fertility and dividing the swag, to induce them to buy, improve and build up the soil they till and become fixed units of strength in their communities is clearly a concern of the state. This problem is close akin if not entirely identical both in purpose and result to that of general education. The strength and vigor of the state is as much dependent upon conserving the fertility of the soil as upon the intelligence of the people. The family is the unit of the state and the home surroundings, the prosperity, the optimism and education of the members of the family spell the strength and vigor of the state. If the state would be strong and enduring it must educate its citizens and attach them to the soil. There is something strengthening in the possession and proprietorship of a piece of land. Deprive people of this strength and they become socialists because their sense of weakness and insecurity impels them to seize at straws as to the drowning.

Mr. V. T. Hoggatt, Register State Land Board of Colorado told me the other day how his state is attempting to convert tenants to land-owners. He said Colorado has \$6,000,000 of permanent school funds. This money is being made available in this way: The counties are given the privilege of investing their proportionate part in the notes of purchasers of homes. This is done through the commissioner's courts. The court considers each individual case. If the man is honest, intelligent, industrious and capable of paying out the land and the land is worth the money, the court buys the land for him, or takes up his notes and gives him 40 years at 5 per cent interest in which to pay. The county must see that the state does not lose its funds. Every proposed loan is advertised and the people knowing the county to be responsible to the state assist in preventing an unworthy or unsafe case from getting through.

Inasmuch as the people of a state have adopted this plan let us consider it closely, before dismissing or advocating it. For remember we are not writing a political platform but studying a modern question in economics or statecraft which is now upon us for solution.

This discussion will be continued in my next article.

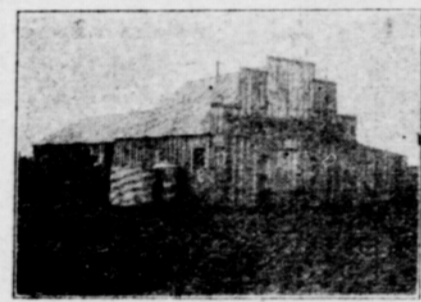
