Practically the same officers and directors remain in charge of the First National Bank, while the Guaranty State experienced a complete change in officers. A. L. Lockwood was elected president; W. D. Nevels, vice president and W. C. Wells, cashier.

Frank H. Weaver, formerly cashier of the Guaranty State, was tendered a position as assistant cashier of the First National Bank.

Carl Griffing, assistant cashier in the Guaranty State Bank, will continue to fill his position with this bank.

Gin Meeting

The farmers and business men of Tahoka and Tahoka trade territory met at the court house on Saturday, Feb 11 and perfected an organization for the purpose of erecting during the summer of 1922 in Tahoka, an eight stand gin to take care of the Fall ginning business of this territory.

W. J. Burkhart was elected President and H. M. Larkin Secretary.

On motions presented by different members the following was unanimously agreed upon;

The company shall be known as The Citizens Gin Co., of Tahoka. That an eight stand gin be built costing not less than \$25,000 That this gin be built and operated on a strict dividend basis.

That shares of \$50 each should be issued and sold to the farmers and business men said shares to have one half paid on them at time of purchase and the other half to be paid and secured to be paid not later than June 1st., 1922.

That each share holder shall be allowed one vote, for each share held.


W. D. Jordan surrendered himself to Sheriff J. C. Terry immediately following the shooting and is being held in the Hale county jail pending a preliminary hearing.

Home Town Helps

ALL BENEFITED BY ZONING

Minnesota Newspaper Points Out the Advantages of Farszeing and Comprehensive Plans.

The prosperity of a city depends much on how it is built. It is always an advantage to a city to draw to it those well able to support themselves, because they become supporters of the city and pay their share of the taxes. The amount of taxes that newcomers can provide is enormous. By paying attention to the proper points in city building, the city establishes the very thing that brings this population without cost to itself.

Cities grow by natural means sometimes. A water power may develop a large city, but the city itself may be built in a clumsy way and without beauty. One factor in city building is arrangement. This is why zone laws are proposed so that a home builder of any class may feel sure that his surroundings will not be spoiled by the invasion of unsightly things that are wholly unnecessary.

The best good of a city should prevail over the more selfish desire of some property owner to make money regardless of his neighbor. There is just as much chance to make money under the zoning law, however, as there is without it, and even a greater one.

VALUE OF PROPER PLANNING

Fundamental Business Idea in Looking to the Future Development of the Community.

Town and city planning do not find their value in developing the esthetic side alone, but also apply the sound business fundamentals of maintenance and improvement to the community, declared B. Loring Young, speaker of the Massachusetts house of representatives, in an address at the eighth annual conference of the Massachusetts Federation of Planning Boards. By directing proper provision of water supply, sewage disposal, housing facilities, adequate municipal buildings and local forest reserve, he said, they work to the enhancement of citizenship in its relation to the community, the state and the nation.

As an opening to the conference, citizens of Winchester acted as hosts to the members of the federation on a motor trip of inspection of the many developments of the town which make it pre-eminent among communities where town planning has been carefully and intelligently applied. The first evidences of this were a large playground and park, a redirected stream and an attractive bridge, which have replaced unsightly tanneries and tenements and permit an unrestricted view of the community center.

Home Ownership Best.

Aside from the security which the home owner enjoys, the possession of his own home should be the ambition of every man. Naturally the first step is the most difficult, for the purchase of a home means a cash payment that is usually well beyond the \$1,000 mark. Once that hurdle is taken, however, the other payments are easy, for they should not exceed, at the outside, \$75 a month on the kind of a home the average man can afford. When the current business depression, with its deplorable unemployment situation, goes by the boards I believe many more Americans will see the wisdom of owning their own homes and thus increasing the percentage of our people who are free from the clutches of the landlord.—Washington Post.

To Hurry the Zoning.

The Chicago zoning act should be put into effect as quickly as possible. Many a beautiful residence neighborhood has been ruined by the steady encroachment of factories, coal yards and the like and the sooner the city is zoned the sooner this stupendous loss will be eliminated. It would also be a positive assurance to a man building or buying a home that his property will not lose value through the introduction of low-class improvements, and will also tend to stabilize real-estate loans as well as reduce fire hazards.—E. C. Roos in Chicago Daily News.

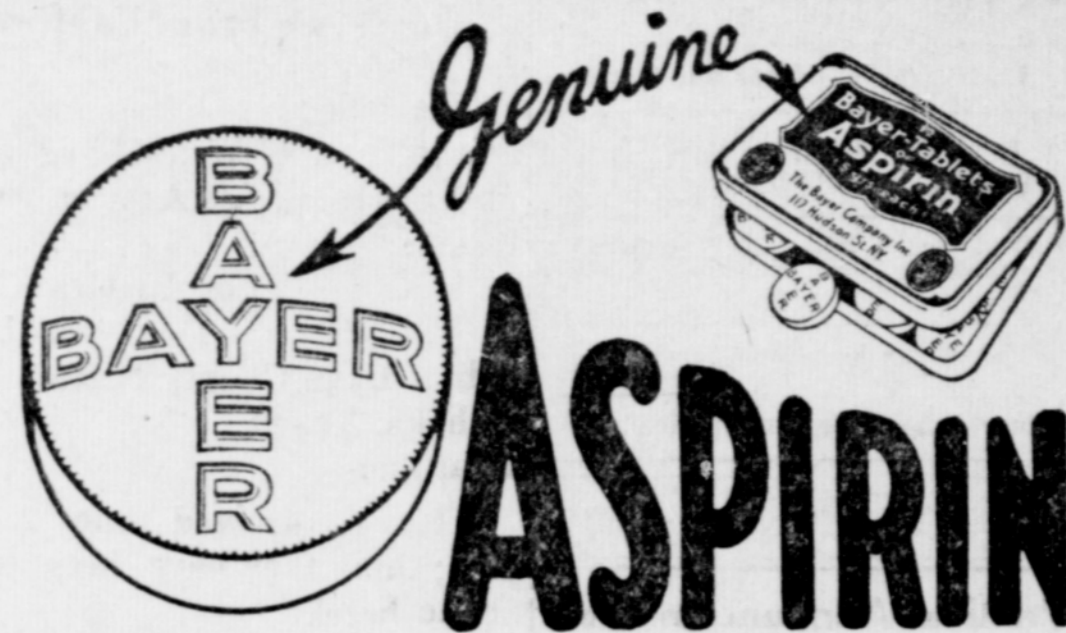

MAY REMODEL UNION JACK

Ireland's New Position in British Empire Likely to Bring Change in Famous Flag.

Among the lesser and more sentimental sacrifices the British feel they are making for Irish peace, there is the prospect of the changed Union Jack.

The diagonal red cross in the Union Jack stands for Ireland. The original national flag was the banner of St. George, a plain red cross on a white background. In 1606 the Scottish flag, a white diagonal cross and a blue background, was blended with the white upright cross, with a blue background of the diagonal white cross being added.

On the death of Charles I the cross of St. George again became the national flag, but in 1706, after the union with Scotland, the cross standard with the blue background was restored. In 1801 the red cross of St. Patrick was superimposed on St. Andrew's cross, making the present Union Jack.

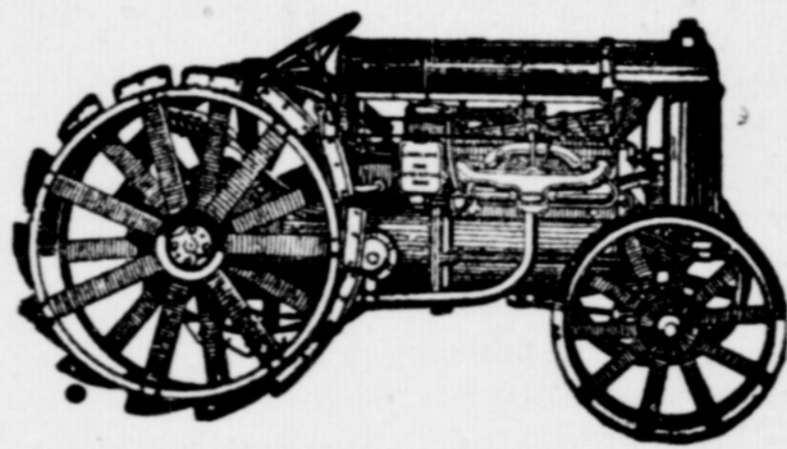

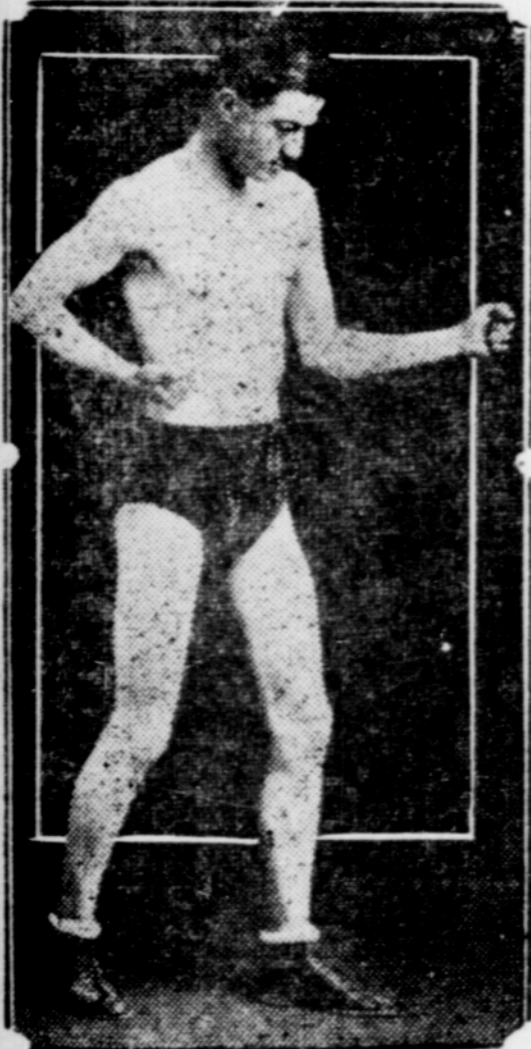

Mother's Cook Book

HAVE A CRACKER

CRACKERS are the ever-ready standby of the "up-to-the-minute" housewife. They will keep indefinitely if kept dry and air-tight. If they do soften—five minutes in a hot oven will crisp them again as good as fresh ones. Any kind of crackers, sweet, graham, oatmeal or ginger may be used for a dainty sandwich to be served with a cup of tea or a refreshing drink. An old-fashioned dish and one good for an invalid or a child is cracker soup. Toast the crackers until brown, spread with butter, sprinkle with a little sugar and pour over hot milk. A sweet cracker put together with marmalade, jelly, cream cheese, nuts or any other good filling makes a good substitute for cake.

Tomato English Monkey.
Take one and one-fourth cups of cracker crumbs, two tablespoonfuls of butter and three-fourths of a cupful of milk. Beat two eggs, add salt, pepper, a pinch of soda, one and one-third cups of cheese; add to the scalded milk. When the cheese has melted add three-fourths of a cupful of tomato strained, stirring until well mixed. Serve on hot toasted crackers.

Graham Cracker Pudding.
Take four tablespoonfuls of butter, add one-half cupful of sugar, one-half teaspoonful of vanilla, the yolk of an egg and a pinch of salt, mix well, then
