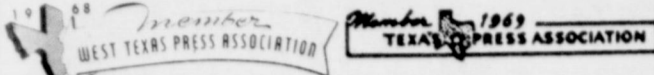

Quail Season Closes Jan. 31st
Hunters still have time to hunt Bobwhite and "Blue" quail before the season ends January 31st. Crane season officially closed the 28th of December so quail remains the only legal bird left to hunt.

This reporter reported small quail at the beginning of the season in November, but this was due in part to an early season.

The quail have now matured and the lucky hunter will find the birds fat and in good shape.

John Matthews, prominent Abilene area rancher, is foundation chairman. Bill Donnell of Marathon is vice chairman and Robb Brown of Throckmorton is secretary. The group already is selecting district chairmen and county leaders eventually will be named to organize local efforts.

In announcing the foundation, Bill Griffin said that nearly 82 percent of Texas range has been invaded by brush. That reduces animal carrying capacity by half or more, he said. Brush also affects the prosperity of many Texas communities that depend on agricultural income.

Griffin said that the program already has the enthusiastic support of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association, Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association, Texas Farm Bureau and the Texas Farmers Union. Now, no organized effort among stockmen has been developed to help in the attack on brush.

Wilson School Board Met December 17

The Wilson School Board met in regular session on Tuesday evening, December 17 in the Homemaking Cottage. Items of business included accepting the resignation of two teachers, approving their replacements, renewing the superintendent's contract, approving the audit report for 1967-68 school year and approving a request of Mrs. Janie Harris allowing her to continue teaching thru February 21 which is the end of the fourth six-weeks.

Mrs. Sandra Aston who teaches second grade and Mrs. Sonya Morrison who teaches fourth grade, submitted their resignations effective at mid-term. Miss Mary Halliburton has been employed as second grade teacher and Mrs. Janet McCoy has been employed as fourth grade teacher. Both are completing their work at Texas Tech at mid-term. Both ladies are elementary majors and are doing their student teaching in Lubbock Public Schools this semester.

The Board renewed Supt. Glen Mitchell's contract to run through June of 1970.

The Board advised the superintendent to begin taking applications for the Tax Assessor-collector position to be vacated on July 31 when Mrs. Ethel Covey will retire. Applications may be obtained through the superintendent's office.

The Board also adopted a letter to be mailed to all of the patrons in the school district urging them to write to the legislators concerning forced consolidation as recommended by the Governor's Committee. The Board took a strong stand against such legislation.

The Board heard a cafeteria report which indicated that rising costs was causing the cafeteria fund to have a deficit at the end of the year. Prices of lunches for students were not raised, however, the Board did raise the price of lunches for outsiders from 50c to 75c. Parents and town people are invited to come and eat in the cafeteria at any time.
