HOME TRADE

Society makes us so bound together that we are dependent on each other for our prosperity and welfare. Thus it behooves each of us to look after our part of the obligation. This thought is brought out in the idea of Home Trade.

There are some great advantages in home trade. One of the most important of these is that it builds up a town. Another is that it supports our home people so that the money is retained in our own town. Still another advantage is that things can be bought cheaper from a store than from a mail order house, because the expense of postage and freight is eliminated. Even if the article is priced in the catalogue at a few cents less than the merchant sells it, the mailing expense will equal the difference.

Now, I will show how home trade builds up a town. If the farmers, laborers and other consumers buy their necessities at home, then the merchant will be enabled to support the common enterprises of the community in which they live by their gifts and also by their taxes which will be greater if their income is more. Of course if the consumer sends away for his goods then the money leaves the town and the amount paid to the home merchants will be necessary for their livelihood so he cannot contribute to the building up of his town.

If we trade with Tahoka merchants it will be an inducement for other business men to come here and open stores. Also it will increase their income sufficiently that they will be able to build more attractive store buildings. A town with a large number of good looking store buildings and other business houses will catch the eye of the tourist who passes through our town. Then he will be anxious to settle here. Thus you will be boosting your town while we are supporting home merchants.

By having these attractive stores buildings the whole community will be benefitted. The town will be the pride of the country. There is a sort of fame about a beautiful town that makes its inhabitants proud to be citizens of it and travelers admire it. I am certain that if put to a test

everyone would agree that home trade is the best, for in this old adage holds true; "What helps one, helps another." If one buys from home merchants then he helps the merchants and by so doing he helps himself. No one would want the money to leave his home town I am sure if he would but stop to think. The idea of mutual benefit should rule in every mind.

There are beneficial organizations such as; churches, clubs and charitable institutions that will be helped. Then surely everyone is enough interested in at least one of these to do his part however small that may be. Good roads and better schools should also be remembered because with the growth of a town these things will be looked after.

I have already proved that a town will grow when home trade is practiced. So, since all these go to prove that a town will be built up it seems that everyone should strive to be as patriotic to their town as they are to their country.

Now to prove that one will be better pleased with home bought articles. First of all the expense of getting goods from another city makes that undesirable. When goods are ordered there is every present the possibility of losing one's money by careless clerks in mail order houses. Then, too, often the goods are not as represented in the catalogue. So it is far better to go to the store and select the goods one wants. Another thing to be considered is the delay in getting an order back from a mail order house.

Not only should one not order from mail order houses but should not go to the cities close around to do his shopping. That the roads to Tahoka are not as good as to some other towns, cannot be offered as an excuse for it is not so. Because Lynn county roads are as good or better than the average Plains roads. So the expense of going farther away is more than the difference, if there is any, in the prices of Tahoka merchandise and the merchandise of other cities. Therefore, I believe that it not only our duty but a privilege to trade at home!

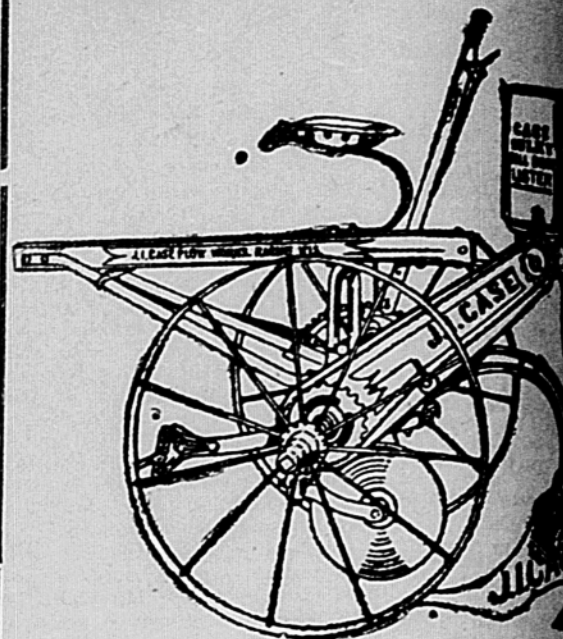

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WHO FEEDS YOUR COUNTY?

First of all, who feeds your family? What did you have for breakfast this morning? How much of it was produced on your own farm or in your own county? Where did the rest come from? Could the other things have been produced in your own county if someone had tried to produce them? What did you have for dinner today? Where did it come from? And what did you have for supper? How much of it was home grown? Did you ever try to live in a whole day—one whole day—three meals on things produced on your own farm? Of course not. The sugar and salt and tea and coffee had to come from somewhere else.

Now suppose we make a list of those things our nature really needs and even allow for a few things of nature through force of habit wants, and set them aside.

First, tea and coffee. We cannot raise them on our farms or in our county. Have you ever tried to raise tea? We do not really need any of them but we have trained ourselves to use them until we count them among the essentials of life. Truth is they are useless luxuries the same as chewing gum and cigarettes.

Sugar and salt are essentials to the construction of our bodies. Could we produce sugar in our county if we had to?

Where is Sugarland, Texas? There are a few other things we use every day like soda and baking powders. Where do these things come from? Barring a few things as these, how long could you live on your farm without starving to death? How long could the people in your county live on the products of your county?

Or suppose your county would receive a year's notice in advance that in 1924 it would be shut off entirely from any source of supplies—food supplies—except those which could not possibly be produced in your county,—what do you think would happen? How many people do you think would starve to death the next year in your county?

The question is: Are you trying to make a living at home? Are you planning to produce your own food on your own farm? Are you studying the production of balanced food products and the best methods and the greatest variety of ways of preparing your food supply for your family?

Are you using the corners, weed patches and waste lots on your farm for truck paths where the children may learn to grow food products, or are you using yourself and all your children to grow a single crop—and then take that single crop to town and trade it all for canned and dried foods that you might have produced fresh on your farm with less labor and energy and time than it has taken you to raise and harvest and market a crop to exchange them?

Did you ever try to serve a meal to your family or even company when every article in the menu was home-

grown? Ever made the yeast from which the bread was made?

Of course you had to flavor things with a 'pinch of salt' from some other State or county.

And those who do not live on a farm, have you ever made a practice of trying to feed your family on the food products of your county? Do you ever have big days and big dinners—and serve only your county's food products? And when you have a Texas Day do you have a Texas grown dinner?

DOES TEXAS FEED HERSELF? If not, why not?

Does Texas produce enough poultry to meet the needs of the State? Does Texas produce enough eggs to supply the State? If we do not, is it because we cannot—or because we have never really thought about it? So long as we could raise enough cotton to buy enough food to keep body and soul together haven't we as a State been willing for our children stay at home from school to raise the cotton and feed and clothe ourselves? Then if this is true, what in Texas are parents for? Is their prime purpose to produce more children, to produce more cotton to pay for more food to feed more parents to produce more children?

If this is true, don't you believe it would be a good thing for both the children and the crops if we would diversify a little more, and give the children something to do that they can get done in time to go to school? Give them something to do that will give them a better balanced food than the tin can menu, they buy at the grocery store with the cotton money.

What is your biggest family expense account? Food, clothing or shelter? Education or pleasure? Which costs the most, health or disease? Which is the most essential to life and happiness and contentment? Food! Food! Food!

Think of it just a few minutes and its relation to health, happiness and home.

Has your county every specialized in food products? Have you ever estimated how much food you import from other counties and other states that you could produce if you were specializing in food products?

Would you be a healthier county if you used more home products and less imported products? What is the worst stumbling block in the way of your schools? What is your greatest economic problem as a county? Now is the time to plan your food supply for the new year. Now is the time to make a new start in the poultry business, the garden, the dairy. Now is the time to invoice our county's needs and try to meet them. Now is the time to not only "buy it made in Texas" but buy it raised in your county. Let's do our best to develop all the resources in our county and by doing so develop a healthier, happier generation of children and more efficient and independent citizenship.

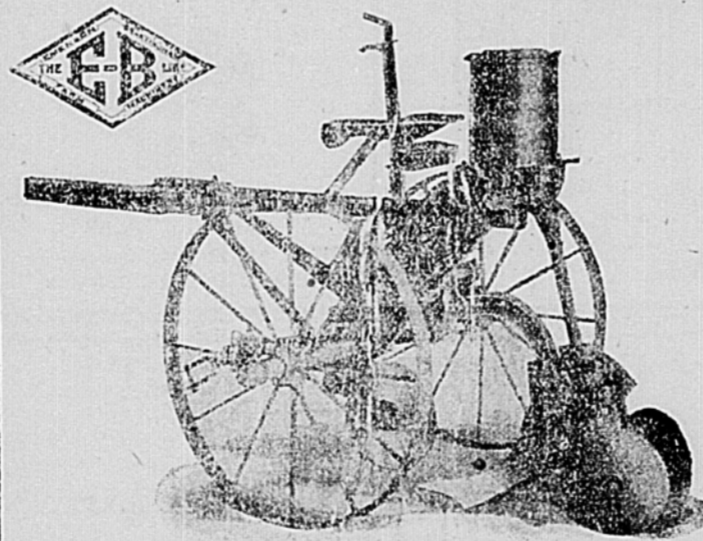

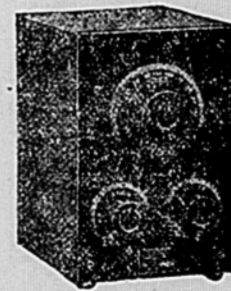

WHY COAL IS HIGH ON THE SOUTH PLAINS

Editor's Note:—The following article from the pen of Rev. J. E. Anderson, clipped from The Terry County Herald, relative to the coal strikes and high price of fuel, will be of interest to News readers. Rev. Anderson was an Army Chaplain in the World War and former pastor of the First Baptist Church in Brownfield. He has spoken in Tahoka a number of times.

Marion, Ill., Jan. 4th, 1923.
 Editor of Herald,
 Dear Stricklin:—I now live in the "bloody" Williamson county, the town where the mine riot occurred. I am awakened by the mine whistles all around me each morning. I find that the miners are not the worst folks in the world. It is a mistake about their being "all foreigners." This is the biggest coal mining center in the world, and most of the coal diggers are Americans, 100 per cent. I find them to be bunch of fine fellows. Nearly every man in my church here is a coal digger, and they pay a 10th part of their gross income into the church.

The big concerns put it in the papers that the reason that coal is so high is because of high price paid to miners, and therefore it is the high cost of production. This is false propoganda. It only costs the operator \$1.40 per ton to dig and load a ton of coal. I bought my winter's supply of coal at \$3.00 per ton delivered. I can tell you where the rake-off comes in; it is the railroads and the coal dealers. I do not blame the coal digger for contending for the present wage scale. You would not get me to work from 200 to 500 feet under the earth for what they get, for almost daily I am called to the bedside of a crushed miner. Their lives are in peril every moment they are in the mines. The recent strike was not pulled off by the miners, but by the operators. The working agreement expired with the operators, and the latter refused to sign another agreement. Everyone who labors has an agreement. I have an agreement with my church; no one could therefore expect a miner to dig coal without any sort of a contract. There was not anything else left for them to do but walk out. But the big concerns will call them bolcheviks, reds, anarchist, un-American, etc., and use the Associated Press to spread their propoganda.

If you are suffering from a shortage of coal at the present, it is because the miners can't get cars. The mines are running about one-third of

the time, because they can't get cars. Wall street is determined to break the unions and starve the railroad men. The big capitalist have over-rated their rolling stock. They want big interest on their over-rating. In order to make up the deficiency they are trying to compel the laboring man to work for nothing.

We have an administration now in power that favors the big concerns. They are doing all they can to prolong the depression in order to crush the little man, and especially the laboring man.

The miners now have a working agreement which will expire April 1. The coal diggers are now anxious to sign up for another year. But you will see that another big strike will be pulled off about April 1st, and the laboring man will be condemned by the public. Some will say this is all superstition, therefore not true. Tell 'em it was written by a "red-headed" preacher, who is not afraid of the devil, and that he has first hand information.

Express my love to the good people of Brownfield, and dear old Terry. Tell them I said if I were in their place I would not move off for they are in "God's Country." Enclosed find check to keep 'er comin'.
