Water, Inc. Will Hold Annual Meet

Two of the leaders in the field of water resource planning and development will address the third annual Water, Inc., membership meeting Feb. 17, in Lubbock.

Keynote speaker for the day-long meeting slated at the Koko Palace will be James Smith, Washington, assistant Secretary of the Interior for Water and Power Development. The Bureau of Reclamation comes under the supervision of the assistant secretary.

Luncheon speaker for the membership meeting will be Lt. Gen. Frederick Clarke, also of Washington, Chief of the Corps of Engineers.

More than 800 persons are expected to be on hand for the membership meeting which will be climaxed with a business session. Those attending will select six directors-at-large to serve on the organization's 41-member board of directors. Mailout ballots for 14 district directors will also be tabulated and the results announced at the session.

Following adjournment of the general business session, the board will convene to elect officers. K. B. "Tex" Wat-

son of Amarillo, is the current president.

In addition to the two key speakers, the program lineup reads like a "Who's Who" in water resource planning and development. The list includes Judge Otha Dent of Austin, chairman of the Texas Water Rights Commission; Howard Boswell of Austin, executive director of the Texas Water Development Board; Hugh C. Yantis Jr., executive director of the Texas Water Quality Board; J. R. Singleton of Austin, executive director of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department; Josiah Wheat of Woodville, a member of the National Water Commission and president of the Texas State Bar; Col. R. S. Kristoferson of Fort Worth, district engineer, Corps of Engineers; Harry Burleigh of Austin, area engineer for the Bureau of Reclamation; Fr. Ernest Gloya of Austin, director of the Water Resources Center, University of Texas; and Dr. Herb Grubb, a special assistant in the governor's office.

The meeting marks the first time the annual meeting has been held in Lubbock. Water, Inc., was formed at a meeting in Lubbock in mid-1967. Last year the meeting was conducted in Amarillo, and the first annual session was convened in Plainview.

Water, Inc., is a membership-based, non-profit organization working in the field of water resource planning, development and conservation. It lists more than 2,000 members in West Texas, Eastern New Mexico and in the Oklahoma Panhandle.

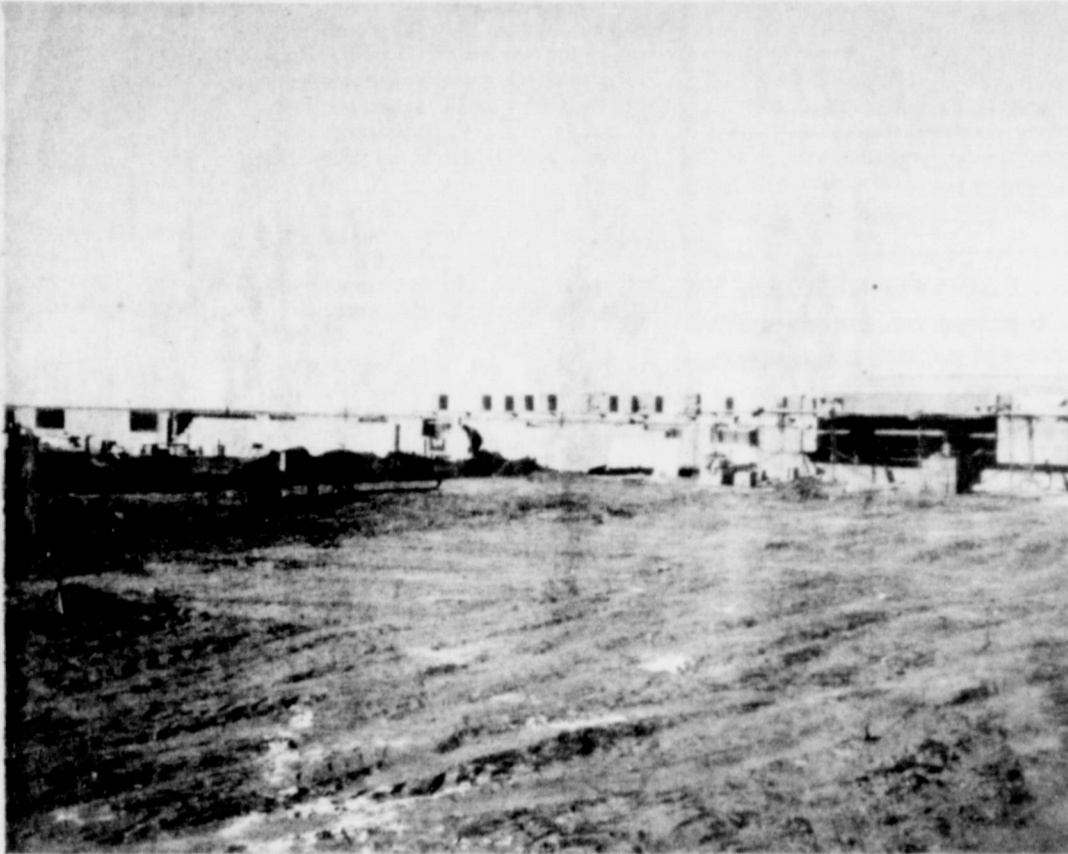

Agricultural Chemicals Confab Slated In Lubbock

One of the "hottest" subjects in agriculture to come around in the past few years, "agricultural chemicals and their use," will be highlighted at the 17th Annual Agricultural Chemicals Conference in Lubbock February 11 and 12.

Theme of the conference is "Impact on Recent Agricultural Changes on Chemical Usage," reports County Agricultural Agent Bill Griffin.

The program should be of interest to all farmers, agricultural chemical dealers and others in the county who are interested in the use of chemicals in the agricultural industry.

The annual confab will be held at the Koko Palace, 50th St. and Ave. Q, and registration will get under way at 6 p.m. on Wednesday, Feb. 11. Registration will resume at 8 a.m. Thursday and the opening session of the conference will kick off at 9 a.m. Griffin points out that a number of important topics will be discussed at the day-long gathering. Speakers during the morning session will delve into trends that are presently taking place as they affect chemical usage. These include trends in pesticide marketing and plant food marketing, trends in insect problems, cropping trends as they affect agricultural chemical needs and recent developments in remote sensing in agriculture.

The afternoon session will deal mainly with chemicals and environmental problems plus a discussion of new agricultural chemical products by various chemical company representatives. Featured presentations will include the effects of agricultural chemicals in the environment, insecticides in the environment, nitrate residue problems of feed lot manure as a source of plant nutrients.

A question and answer session following Mr. Solis' presentation was very informative.



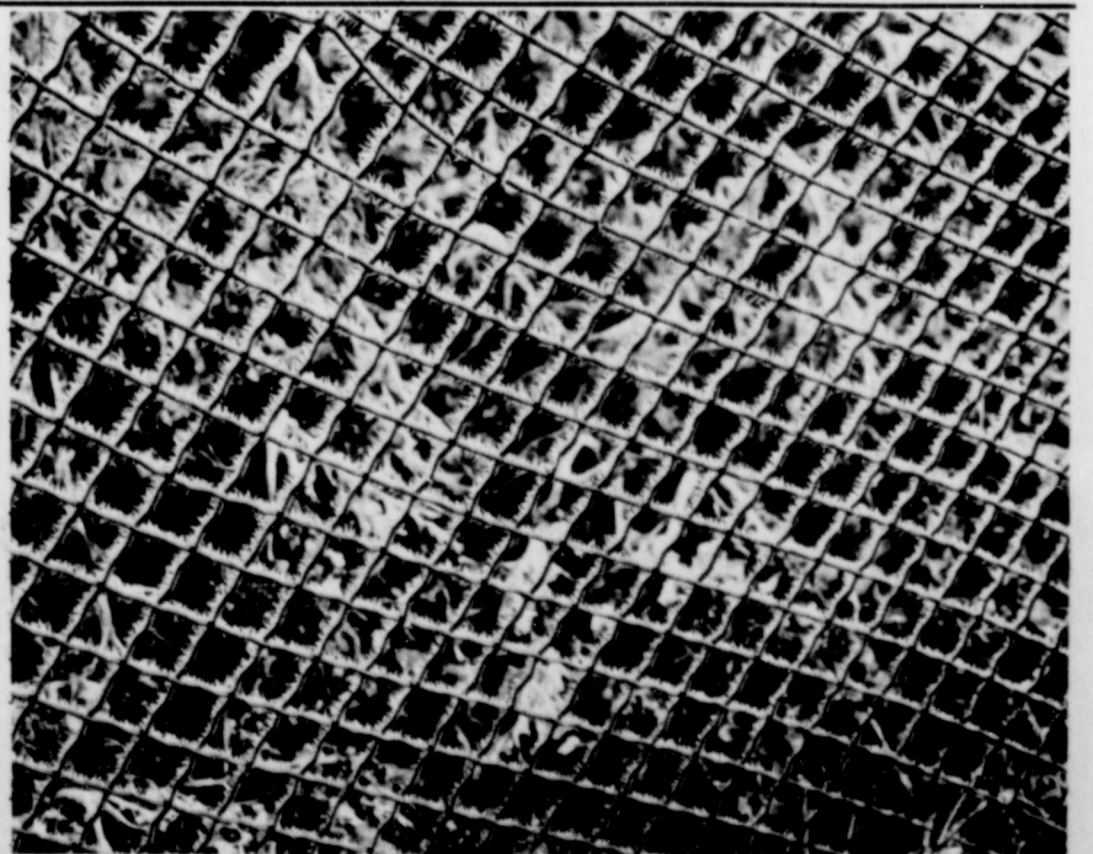

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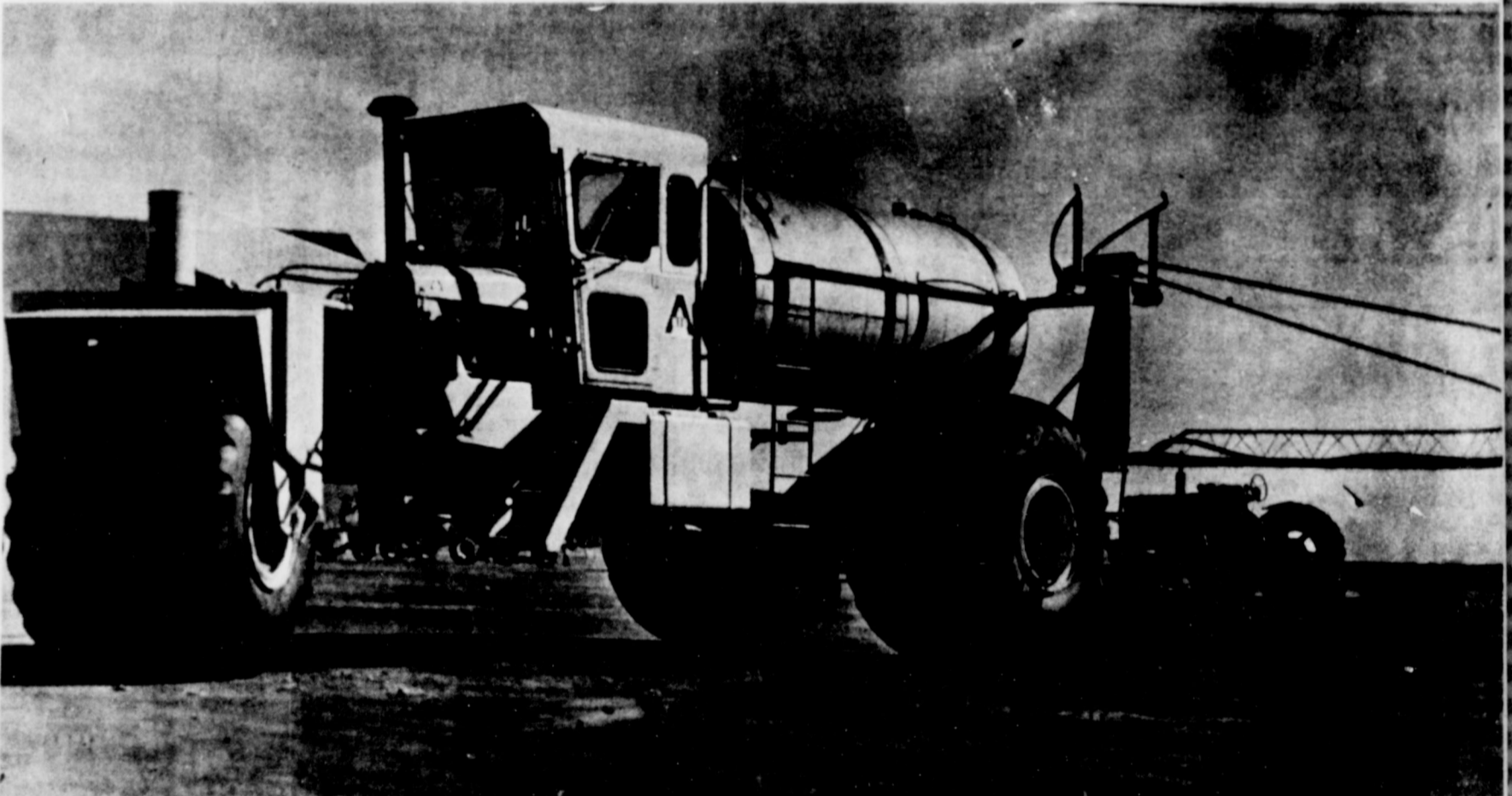

Four leaders from the Lynn County Farm Bureau are planning to attend a state-wide Texas Farm Bureau Legislature, Membership, and President's conference Feb. 11-12 at the Hilton Inn in Waco, according to L.C. Unfred, information chairman for the local farm organization.

They are: R.L. Dulin, President; Herman Wuensche, Vice President; Charlie Beckham, Membership Chairman; and T.B. Mason, National P.X. Committee.

The meeting will serve as a "victory report" on the recent state-wide membership campaign and will launch Farm Bureau's program of work and legislative activities for 1970.

Main speakers include TFB President Sidney Dean of Victoria who will discuss "Farm Bureau Progress and Problems," and State Representative Delwin Jones of Lubbock whose subject will be "State Legislative Issues for 1970 and 1971." Gordon Morrow, San Benito, chairman of a special TFB Study Committee, will make a report on the committee's ac-

tivities. Ed McKay, Waco, director of national affairs for the state farm organization, will discuss "Farm Program Prospects." Tommy Klemcke, Austin, TFB state affairs director, will present a report on the subjects of taxation of farm and ranch land, minimum wage for farm labor, and interim committee activities of the State Legislature.

Wayne Little, Waco, TFB field services director, will preside at a session honoring counties for enrolling new members. Austin Crowner, Waco, TFB sales director, will outline the organization's new agency development program for insurance services.

Policy Execution (legislative) chairmen will meet with McKay and Klemcke; and Little and Don Neumann, Waco, assistant field services director, will conduct training for Membership chairmen.

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

Limitations on 1970 cotton insurance liability have been announced by Ben A. Jordan, Jr., Texas State Director for the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation.

"Because of the heavy loss in the last few years, we are limiting the amount of insurance we write on cotton crop investments for the 1970 crop year." After January 31, if the county

limit has not been reached, applications for cotton insurance will be accepted only by FCIC offices and when the county limit is reached, sales will be closed.

Cotton damage in Texas has been caused by drought, freeze and excess moisture during the past four years. Texas cotton growers have received \$16,757,730 in Federal Crop Insurance indemnities since 1966 while premium payments amounted to \$6,365,375.

Nationally, more than \$50 million was paid to cotton growers from 1966 through 1969 by the FCIC. Some \$20 million was paid in by policyholders for cotton protection during the same period.

The intent of Congress when Federal Crop Insurance was created, the state director said, was for premiums to be sufficient to pay indemnities and provide an adequate reserve to take care of heavy loss years. In the past 20 years, cotton indemnities have averaged half again as much as premiums. This means that for each premium dollar taken in since 1948, Federal Crop Insurance has paid out a dollar and a half.

Current Federal Crop Insurance policyholders will not be affected by the limitation, but 1969 policyholders who have cancelled their policies for the 1970 crop year should reinstate at once. After the liability limit is reached, we will not be able to accept reinstatements from former policyholders.

Lynn County received the modified certified Brucellosis certificate by virtue of the fact that Brucellosis has been reduced to not more than one percent of the cattle in not to exceed five percent of the herds as indicated by official testing and other approved procedures conducted under the cooperative State-Federal Program.

The Lynn County Certification is valid to October 18, 1972.

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Highlights And Sidelights

From Your State Capital

Texas who registered to vote before the January 31 deadline are assured plenty of action for their 1970 registration certificate.

One of the nation's hottest U.S. Senate races is due to rage on through the November 3 general election.

Sen. Ralph Yarborough, 66, of Austin and former Congressman Lloyd M. Bentsen Jr., 48, a Houston business executive, are major Democratic contenders for Yarborough's seat. Whoever wins will face Republican Congressman George Bush, 45, of Houston, in November.

Gov. Preston Smith, 57, a cinch to win the May 2 Democratic primary nomination in the gubernatorial race, will be challenged by Republican Paul Eggers, 50, of Wichita Falls, in the general election.

Republicans talk freely about million-dollar campaigns for Bush and Eggers.

Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin will be opposed by District Judge David Brown of Sherman in the Democratic primary and Corpus Christi attorney Edward Yturri, 42, a Republican, in November.

Republicans came up with a surprising number of statewide candidates before the February 2 filing deadline.

In addition, there will be hard fought local contests in many Texas counties.

Long-time conservative leader Bard A. Logan of San Antonio said he was "tired and needed a rest" so he resigned as chairman of The American Party of Texas. Vice-Chairman H.W. Matthews of Conroe succeeds

Logan until the election of a new leader at the state convention.

Chief chore of the American Party now is to get 30,000 to attend its May 2 precinct conventions, so it can qualify to place a gubernatorial candidate on the ballot.

And there will be a sizzling November 3 battle over the liquor-by-the-drink proposition on the constitutional amendments ballot. Lines are already forming and campaigns shaping up on that.

TREASURE BOOKLET--Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler is now distributing free copies of his booklet, "Treasure Tempest in Texas". It's about the Padre Island galleons and their cargo.

At the request of Corpus Christi Rep. Frances Farenthold, State Auditor George McNiel checked on whether state facilities had been used in printing the booklets. He reported that General Land Office facilities had been employed but that Sadler had reimbursed the agency \$5,000. "It might be in order for me to observe that it is not unusual for general information brochures to be done at State expense," McNiel wrote, saying that Sadler appears to be "leaning over backwards to avoid criticism."

Printing of brochures is a common practice in many state departments, as a necessary part of informing the public. Thousands of copies of various and elaborate, well written and informative booklets have been provided by numerous departments to the schools and li-

braries of Texas. Many departments even have their own printing plants.

Sadler's opponent in the Land Commissioner race, Rep. Bob Armstrong has not been critical of the incumbent.

Armstrong, a prominent Austin sportsman, began his campaign by calling for stronger conservation measures.

POLLUTION FIGHT SET--Texas Air Control Board will ask Attorney General Martin to begin legal proceedings soon against persistent air polluters, particularly in Houston and El Paso.

Pollution issue is being spotlighted by candidates from local to senatorial level.

On January 29, Texas Water Quality Board called on the U.S. Navy, seven towns and three industries to explain poor quality discharges into public streams.

Navy said it would keep on dumping raw sewage into the Sabine River until it gets \$146,000 for treatment facilities.

Towns invited to answer questions about their sewage discharges were Celeste, Center, Greenville, Hemphill, Newton, Quinlan and Timpson.

ATTORNEY GENERAL RULES--County commissioners have discretionary authority to maintain streets which are an integral part of the county or state road system, within a city, if the city consents, says Attorney General Martin.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded that: Appropriated state funds may not be used to purchase liability insurance on an aircraft (not a "motor vehicle") under the tort claims act.

A district attorney may not retain a percentage of monies collected as civil penalties in civil suits which he initiates on behalf of the Parks and Wildlife Department to abate water pollution.

Banks could validly plead the statute of limitations in escheat action by the state to recover inactive accounts (four-year statute commences to run only after the bank has denied its liability to pay dividends to the rightful owner and has given notice to the owner of the dividends).

A misdemeanor driver's license case in Wichita Falls must be tried either in the new municipal courts or the justice court, where punishment is by fine only, not to exceed \$200. All other misdemeanors so arising must be tried exclusively in municipal courts.

Probate court has no power to approve claims filed under a section of the Probate Code where claims have been rejected by operation of the law under another section of the code. A justice of peace in Bexar

County must run for re-election this year due to mistakes in abolishing six justice precincts and creating three new ones in their place back in 1967.

CRIME SESSION URGED--Austin newsman and business, man Wick Fowler has launched a one-man campaign for a special session of the legislature to enact "emergency laws" dealing with criminals and drunk and careless drivers.

Fowler, known as a humorist, was dead serious when he contended that only in a special session could full attention be focused on the rising crime rate and traffic dangers.

Noting there were 3,580 traffic deaths last year, he said: "Had this number been killed and injured in one incident, say a tornado or hurricane, the state would be overwhelmed by hysteria." Fowler also pointed out that there were 400,000 major crimes committed in the state last year and the crime rate is growing. He urged Texans to petition Governor Smith to call an emergency session of the lawmakers.

CRIME FIGHT--Governor's Criminal Justice Council says that 84 per cent of the 1969 federal crime control money received by governments below the state level in Texas is being used in the state's major cities, towns and rural areas. Largest amounts were Houston, \$227,000; Dallas, \$201,844; and Fort Worth, \$108,750.

At the state level, four agencies received \$197,231. They were the Department of Public Safety, Department of Corrections, Adjutant General's Department, and the Commission on Law Enforcement Officer Standards and Education.

COURTS SPEAK--Supreme Court in effect upheld the constitutionality of a law which authorized a youngster to be declared delinquent if he is behaving so as to endanger the health or moral of himself or others.

High court dismissed the appeal of a teenager sent to a state correctional school by a county judge before an appeals court ordered him released on bond.

Third Court of Civil Appeals denied the appeal of an Austin high school boy sent to a reform school after his school principal ordered him to empty his pockets and found marijuana. Court said the principal was acting for the father.

Supreme Court rebuffed the effort of major bus companies to prevent Corpus Christi from operating a special bus service outside its city limits.

A Houston doctor, according to the Supreme Court, should not be held liable for damages to a patient who complained that the drug given him for a urinary infection caused him to be-

come dizzy. GRANTS APPROVED--A variety of grants has been approved within the last several days to assist local and regional agencies.

A \$126,521 Office of Child Development grant went to the Community Council of Guadalupe County, Inc., Seguin. Money will go for head start and summer head start programs in that area.

Val Verde County Community Action Agency, Del Rio, received \$122,728 in a community action grant for administration, general services, emergency food and medical services.

A regional planning assistance grant of \$113,775 went to North Central Texas Council of Governments serving 10 counties and 100 units of government in the Dallas-Fort Worth region. Community Council of Uvalde, Kinney and Real Counties, Inc. got a \$64,000 grant for family planning, job development, emergency food and medical service programs.

A smaller grant of \$3,509, made to the Guadalupe County Community Council, goes to special summer youth recreation program benefitting 3,122 boys and girls.

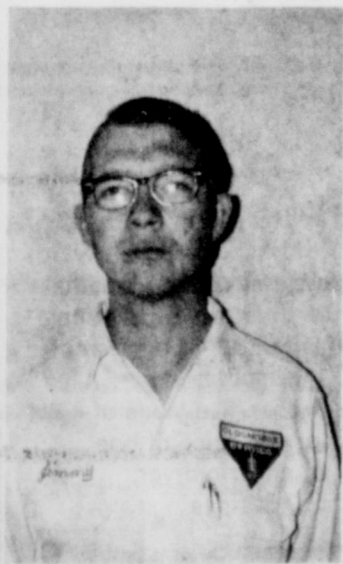

Linda Huffaker, CHD Agent, Says.....

Can semi-sweet chocolate be substituted when a recipe calls for unsweetened chocolate? Yes.

There is such a slight difference in the amount of sweetness that you will never know which chocolate you did use. Use the same amount of sugar whether you use unsweetened chocolate or semi-sweet chocolate.

When a recipe calls for blanched almonds why is blanching necessary?

Blanched almonds will give a main dish, vegetable or dessert a special nutty flavor and texture.

To blanch, cover shelled almonds with boiling water. Let stand until skins will slip. Drain, put into cold water and rub off skins. Dry between towels.

The cyclamate scare roused a flurry of questions. Here are answers to the most frequently asked questions.

"Can I use beet sugar for cane sugar?" They are exactly the same product, chemically. There is absolutely no difference between the sweetening power of cane and beet sugar. Each contains 99.8 percent sucrose, the chemical name for sugar.

Processors presently are testing in sugars to which vitamins, minerals and flavorings have been added. So we can expect further changes in our sugar choices.

"Is brown sugar unrefined white sugar?" No, brown sugar is as highly refined as white sugar and is refined in exactly the same way, except at a lower temperature. This produces a sugar of minute crystals mixed with natural refiner's syrup. As a result, proportionally, the actual granulated sugar content of brown sugars is less; but they taste sweeter on the tongue because of the syrup present.

"What's the difference between dark and light brown sugar?" The amount of refiner's syrup (molasses-like) in proportion to the granulated sugar present makes the difference. The darker the brown, the more refiner's syrup, the richer the flavor.

In whole, cost is higher 7 to 11 cents a pound for dark brown sugar. In the recently developed easy-pour, non-caking products, syrup and flavor have been reduced. The newest product, distant granules of brown sugar, are the results of a pressure, temperature process which compacts it into uniform morsels for easy pouring and handling. No change in recipe proportions are needed since product "bulks" about the same as packed brown sugar.

"Why do confectioners powdered sugars contain starch?" The 3 percent starch added helps keep the sugar from caking and also makes it work up into a smoother icing than would be possible with powdered sugar that did not contain starch. The label declares the presence of starch.

Brown Bread
1 cup raisins
1 cup dates
3 teaspoons baking soda
1 teaspoon salt
1 1/4 to 2 cups sugar
4 cups flour
2 eggs, beaten
1 cup chopped nuts
1 teaspoon vanilla
2 tablespoons butter
3 cups boiling water

Place raisin, dates, butter, baking soda, and salt in a large bowl. Pour boiling water over all; cool. Add sugar, flour, eggs, and nuts, and vanilla. Mix well. Pour into greased 1 pound coffee cans, filling half full. Bake in 350 degree oven for 1 hour.

Mrs. Theryl Hodges of Lubbock, noted artist and art critic, is to judge the entries. A prize is to be awarded the best all around creation.

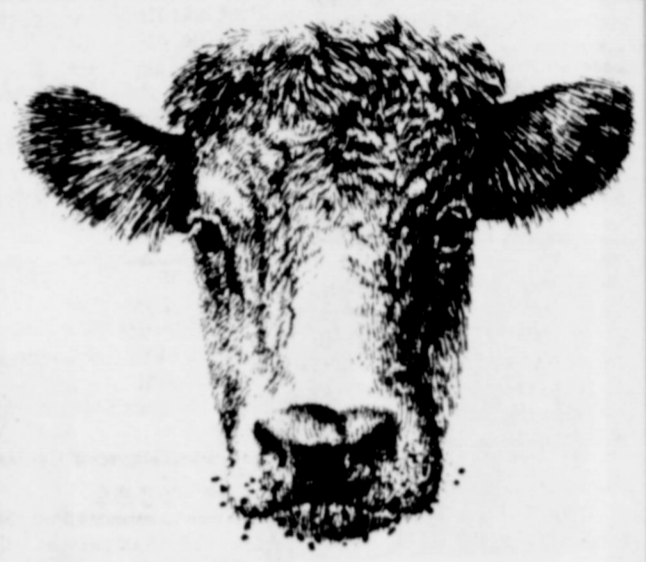
Mrs. Hodges will also do a demonstration on Floral Art as

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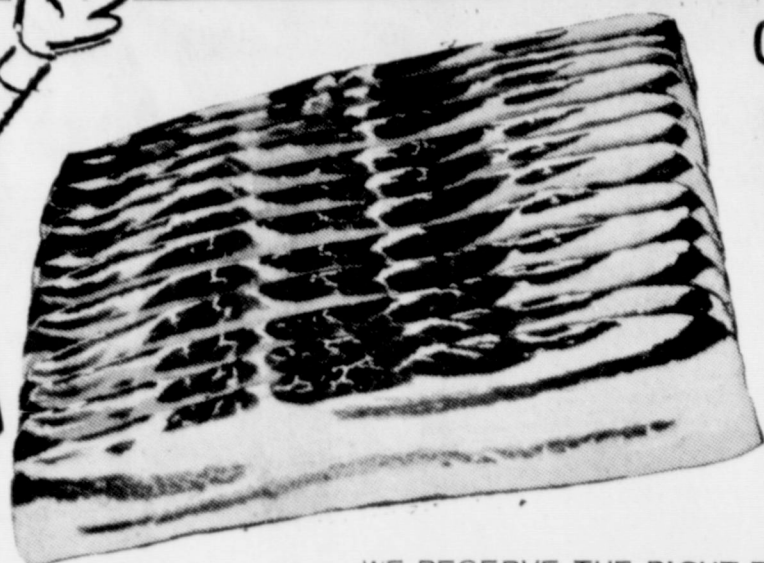
