We note in the press that merchants are not placing orders for cleth, and for this reason the mills are refusing to buy cotton, which ccounts for declining market.

If the farmers continue to sell cotton on the decline, how can they expect those gambling in the price on the exchanges, to bet it higher han the farmers are willing to take for their cotton? So long as they re willing to sell cotton at a declinlow can the mills be expected to buy cotton, or the merchants to buy loth? Would you buy an article this week which you expected to be heaper next week? Those picking otton have it in their power to adance the price and save themselves rom undue loss. Why not do it? Why lose \$75 to \$100 per bale on heir cotton, and make it that much arder for the central and northern elt farmers to advance the price?

Those now picking are the only. nes that can offer resistence to the lecline, or encourage a decline. They re the only ones who can offer encouragement to the bulls to bet the rice up or to the bears to bet it own. Which will they do? It is up o them. It is in their power to name he price of their cotton. No one ill offer more or bet the price igher for any article, than the party aving it for sale is willing to take! for it This is as true of cotton as of anything else. The only way to old up or maintain price is to reuse to sell for less, to do this with cotton, those to whom the farmers are in debt, should mobolize their after visiting relatives here. credit and influence behind the farmer, and aid and encourage him not to sell on a declining market, or at price that is not profitable.



#### SAW SOLDIERS OF FIVE WARS

#### John Pemberton Oak Has History Probably Unequaled by That of Any Other Tree.

Soldiers of five wars have been druled beneath the John Pemberton oak tree, Bristol, Virginia-Tennessee, nominated for a place in the hall of fame of the American forestry association at Washington by Mrs. H. F. Lewis, secretary of Virginia for the Daughters of the American Revolution. Under this tree Col. John Pemberton mustered his troops for the battle of King's Mountain. A marker has been placed on the tree by the Sycamore Shoals chapter, says the American Forestry Magazine, in making the announcement. The soldiers of the War of 1812 met here. Then came the Mexican war and the old tree saw men again leave their homes to fight. Next came the struggle between the states, and the oak witnessed the drilling of men to fight one another in their own country. Then came the world war and again the veteran oak saw our boys answer their united country's call.

"Judge," said Kelly hopefully, 'that's been worrying me. Where was 1?"-The American Legion Weekly.



HE United States department of agriculture is charged with the work of promoting agriculture in its broadest sense. Hence the department contains many bureaus. The office of farm management, for instance, has for its

main object the improve- addition of moisture and the control ment of farm practice by introducing of all conditions surrounding this better business methods and by applying the principles of science.

Then there are the weather bureau, the bureaus of animal industry and plant industry, the forest service, the bureaus of soils, entomology, biological

survey, crop estimates and so on. Among these are the bureau of chemistry and the bureau of markets. The former is largely concerned with analytical work and investigation under the food and drugs act and questions of agricultural chemistry of public interest. The bureau of markets has a wide scope. Its work is divided into four branches-investigational, demonstrational, service and regulating. One branch of its investigational work is the securing of basic information of fundamental importance regarding marketing methods and conditions and also regarding the standardization of agricultural products and methods

used in their handling. So many of the activities of the department revolve about the grain that the United States produces and eats. The specific activity with which this article is concerned is "the milling and baking qualities of grain for which standards have been established under the United States grain standards act."

Scientific milling and baking have received the attention of a corps of investigators. An experimental mill and baking laboratory have recently been Installed at a cost of \$50,000. They are quite up-to-date and by means of them a large amount of accurate information, hitherto unobtainable, has been secured.

The laboratory is really a series of laboratories, each equipped for doing baths being used. a particular part of the investigational work. The wheat samples obtained for testing purposes first pass through the grading laboratory, where a complete mechanical analysis is made of each i missioner.





#### Calling Back Birds.

In the devastated areas of Belgium and Northern France the birds as well as the human inhabitants lost their homes. Their nests and nesting places were destroyed.

Now they have been invited back: for the matter is not merely one of sentiment, inasmuch as the birds are needed to eat the bugs that devour the farmer's crops.

With this object in view, areas of woodland are being set aside and made as attractive as possible to feathered creatures. It is expected that by such means colonies of birds will soon be established, and that, with proper protection, they will multiply and become as numerous as ever before long.

Beetles Worry Telephone Users. When telephone girls in California find their wires "shorted," a bug may be on or in the wire, for California has a wood-boring beetle that goes through wood and also through alloyed substance considerably harder than lead. The beetle has put hundreds of telephones out of commission by bor-

#### ing holes in the cables that carry the wires. Water enters the cables, making wire connections useless until the bored places are found and repaired. The problem of control of this metalboring beetle is still unsolved, according to the bureau of entomology of the United States department of agricul-


#### Charlemagne Relic to Reims.

The Reims treasure, so severely imperiled during the German bombardment, has been enriched by a precious jewel of the ninth, or maybe the eighth century, a generous gift of the Empress Eugenie, says Le Moniteur de la Bijouterie in an article by the "Jeweler's Circular." The matter in ques tion is the reliquary of Charlemagne, a round capsule of gold encircled with precious stones, in the middle of which, made out of two hollowed out sapphires, a piece of the true cross is inclosed.

It was found on the neck of the great emperor and the clergy of Aix-la-Chapelle (where Charlemagne died and was buried in 814) gave it in 1804 to Napoleon I. What is less well known is that Napoleon III. preserved this magic talisman, which assured, he said. the empire to its holder, in his bed chamber at the Tuileries, at the head of his bed.



"The natives of Guam are, as a rule, of good physique and pleasing appearance. Owing to their mixed blood, their complexion varies from the white of a Caucasian to the brown of a Malay. Most of them have glossy black hair, which is either straight or slightly curly. It is worn short by the men and long by the women, either braided, coiled, or dressed after the styles prevailing in Manila. "The people are especially agricultural. 

### BY ANTI-SUFFRAGISTS TENNESSEE HOUSE WIPES OUT

REFERENCE TO RATIFICA TION ON JOURNAL.

RECORDS EXPUNGED

Nashville, Tenn.-The Tennessee house of representatives, with a quorum present for the first time since Aug. 20, has expunged from its journal all record of ratification of the suffrage amendment and voted 47 to 24, with twenty not vating, to not concur in the action of the senate in rati-

fying. Shortly after the house convened it became evident that the anti-ratificationists, a majority of whom have been in Alabama on a filibuster for more than a week, were in the majority through failure of several of the suffrage members to arrive in time. With clock-like program, the antis proceeded to put through their plan of attempting to undo what was done on Aug. 21, when ratification was accomplished.

The first step was a motion to expunge from the journal of that day all reference to the proceedings upon the suffrage ratification resolutions. After this was carried 47 to 37 with six not voting, motion was made and carried that a certified copy of the resolution, the original of which is in the hands of the senate, be spread upon journal.

Representative Riddick, floor leader of the ratificationists, made the point of order that the resolution was out of the hands of the house and now a part of the federal constitution through proclamation of Secretary of State Colby. He was overruled by Speaker Walker.

The house by a viva voce vote then adopted a motion to reconsider its previous action upon the resolution. Motion was then made and carried to nonconcur in the action of the senate in ratifying the ratification resolution.

#### WORKING TO SAVE THE LIVES OF CHILDREN

Thirty-Two States Now Have Child Hygiene Divisions Established.

Washingach - Thirty-two states have established child hygiene divisions and are joining with the United States public health service in a movement of growing importance to the conservation of child life.

Dr. Talaferro Clark, assistant sur geon general in charge of the federal work, describes how the national and state agencies are co-operating, the problems they find and the methods they use. The information given will be published in a government report now in preparation.

There are two great divisions of the work, that of preventing deaths of infants and that of caring for the wellbeing of school children.

One-fifth o fall deaths are of children under 5 years of age. It is established that one-tenth of all deaths are of children under 1 year. That one-half of these die under 3 months. That one-third of these die before a month old.

There is opportunity for the greatest saving of life among the children under 5 years, Dr. Clark explained. Most of the effort of child hygiene authorities is given to education work with the mothers.

Defective teeth are responsible for more health difficulties of American children than all other causes combined, Dr. Clark asserted.

Washington .- More than one-fifth of the population of the country is located in 33 leading cities having 200. 000 or more inhabitants. A table showing these cities in order of their rank for 1920, issued by the census bureau, placed their combined population at 22,724,565, which is slightly more than one-fifth the total population of the country as estimated by Dr. Joseph A. Hill, chief statistician of the bureau, at 105,000,000.

#### STATE FINANCES ARE IN SOUND CONDITION

Austin, Texas .- The state's new fiscal year will open with \$14,000,000 in cash in the state depositories and with a general revenue fund of at least \$8,750,000, the largest general revenue balance at the opening of any fiscal year in the history of Texas, which, State Treasurer John W. Baker says, is more than ample to take care of disbursements without the necessity of the state going on a deficiency basis.

"Our financial condition is such that there is not a chance of the state having to go on a deficiency basis during the coming fiscal year." said Mr. Baker. "The general revenue will on the opening day of the fiscal year show an amount almost double that on the opening day of the last fiscal year. We will have a little over \$8,-750,000 in the general revenue fund compared with \$4,682,000 on Sept. 1. 1919, which up to that time was the largest amount of general revenue shown on the opening day of a new fiscal year. On Sept. 1, 1918, the general revenue balance was \$4,035,000, and \$3,045,000 on Sept. 1. 1917."

The balance in the available school fund has also seared to a recordbreaking mark, there being over \$1. 500,000 to the credit of that fund. compared with \$854,000 on Sept. 1, 1919: \$348,000 in 1918, and \$1.326,000 in 1917. The state highway department fund shows a balance of \$1,910. 000. All the other funds are in good condition.

1. The extent of his kingdom (4:21-25). He ruled over all the kingdoms from the Euphrates river to the Mediterranean sea, except the Phoenecians, but they were in alliance with him. This was the nearest to the realization of the divine promise, (Gen. 15:18), that Israel ever enjoyed; but the fulness of the promised possession shall be realized when the Greater than Solomon is king.

2. His great wisdom (4:29-34). It excelled that of the Chaldeans, Persians and Egyptians (vv. 30, 31). None of his contemporaries approached unto him in knowledge. He had a singularly comprehensive mind. He was (1) a moral philosopher-spake 3,000 proverbs; (2) a poet-his songs were a thousand and five; (3) a botanist-he spake of trees, from the cedar tree that is in Lebanon even unto the hyssop that springeth out of the wall; (4) a zoologist-he spake of beasts and fowl, and of creeping things, and of fishes. He was superior in intellect to any of his own or any other age.

3. The temple (chs. 5 and 6). This was an exact reproduction of the tabernacle, double in size, in marble and gold. The amount of labor, skill and money expended on the building was exceedingly great (I Chron. 22:14-16). Never before had such a costly structure appeared.

4. Royal palaces adjoining the temple (ch. 7). Following the erection of the temple he began the building of his own house. He was nearly twice as long in building this as in building the Lord's house.

5. His commerce (9:26-28; cf. II Chron. 9:10, 21). His trading ships went east as far as the Indian ocean, perhaps even to India; and west as far as Spain.

6. Army and navy (10:26-29; cf. 9:27). Such wealth and greatness would at some time provoke opposition, so he put his nation into a state of preparedness.

All this greatness was associated with the name of the Lord. It was known that his fame was due to his relation with the living God. No one ever had a greater missionary opportunity than he. Wealth and knowledge may be powerful factors for the extension of the cause of Christ.

II. The Queen of Sheba Astonished (vv. 3-9).

After the interview in which Solomon answered all her questions, she was overwhelmed with his great wisdom. She had plied him with hard questions to see if he could measure up to his reputation, and found that the half had not been told her.

III. The Queen of Sheba Gives Gifts to Solomon (vv. 10-13).

As was the custom, she brought gifts to Solomon, the king, the gold of which was in value between three and four millions of dollars.

This was a large gift for that time, but Solomon more than recompensed her. He gave her all she desired and in addition, of his royal bounty. While her gift to him was great, his to her was greater, even in keeping with his possessions. God gives unto them who give their hearts unto him exceeding abundantly above all they ask or think (Eph. 3:20.).

IV. All the Earth Sought Solomon (vv. 23-26).

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
