CUSTOMS OF GUAM

Island's Inhabitants Retain Primitive Manners.
Happy and Careless, Yet With a Sense of Industry and Thrift— Farms, as a Rule, Cultivated by the Family.

The increasing commercial importance of Guam is illustrated in a recent visit of the postmaster of Guam, principal city of our smallest possession, to the United States in behalf of better postal service for the island.
Curious customs and natural resources of Guam are described in a National Geographic society bulletin as follows:
"The fruit of the common tree (Barringtonia speciosa) the natives use to stupefy fish.
"The fruit is pounded into a paste, enclosed in a bag, and kept over night. The time of an especially low tide is selected, and bags of the pounded fruit are taken out on the reef next morning and sunk in certain deep holes in the reef. The fish soon appear on the surface, some of them lifeless, others attempting to swim, or faintly struggling with their ventral side upmost. The natives scoop them in their hands, sometimes even diving for them.
"In the mangrove swamps when the tide is low, hundreds of little fishes with protruding eyes may be seen hopping about in the mud and climbing among the roots of the Rhizophora and Bruguiera. These belong to a group of fishes interesting from the fact that their air bladder has assumed in a measure the function of lungs, enabling the animal to breathe atmospheric air.
"Men, women and children of Guam are expert swimmers, and are as much at ease in the water as on land. As they throw themselves into the sea and come bounding from wave to wave they remind one of dolphins.
"According to the testimony of early writers, their houses were high and neatly made and better constructed than those of any aboriginal race hitherto discovered in the Indies.
"They are a happy, careless people, fond of festivities, dancing, singing, story-telling and contests of strength and skill, yet sufficiently industrious to cultivate their fields and garden patches, build excellent houses for their families, braid mats of fine texture and construct canoes which were the admiration of all the early navigators. They were much given to buffoonery, mockery, playing tricks, jesting, mimicry and ridicule, offering in this respect a striking contrast to the undemonstrative Malaysians.
"The natives of Guam are, as a rule, of good physique and pleasing appearance. Owing to their mixed blood, their complexion varies from the white of a Caucasian to the brown of a Malay. Most of them have glossy black hair, which is either straight or slightly curly. It is worn short by the men and long by the women, either braided, coiled, or dressed after the styles prevailing in Manila.
"The people are especially agricultural. There are few masters and few servants on the island. As a rule the farms are not too extensive to be cultivated by the family; all the members, even the little children, lend a hand."

Calling Back Birds.

In the devastated areas of Belgium and Northern France the birds as well as the human inhabitants lost their homes. Their nests and nesting places were destroyed.
Now they have been invited back; for the matter is not merely one of sentiment, inasmuch as the birds are needed to eat the bugs that devour the farmer's crops.
With this object in view, areas of woodland are being set aside and made as attractive as possible to feathered creatures. It is expected that by such means colonies of birds will soon be established, and that, with proper protection, they will multiply and become as numerous as ever before long.

Beetles Worry Telephone Users.

When telephone girls in California find their wires "shorted," a bug may be on or in the wire, for California has a wood-boring beetle that goes through wood and also through alloyed substance considerably harder than lead. The beetle has put hundreds of telephones out of commission by boring holes in the cables that carry the wires. Water enters the cables, making wire connections useless until the bored places are found and repaired. The problem of control of this metal-boring beetle is still unsolved, according to the bureau of entomology of the United States department of agriculture and it will be difficult to find a practicable way.

Charlemagne Relic to Reims.
The Reims treasure, so severely imperiled during the German bombardment, has been enriched by a precious jewel of the ninth, or maybe the eighth century, a generous gift of the Empress Eugenie, says Le Moniteur de la Bijouterie in an article by the "Jeweler's Circular." The matter in question is the reliquary of Charlemagne, a round capsule of gold encircled with precious stones, in the middle of which, made out of two hollowed out sapphires, a piece of the true cross is inclosed.
It was found on the neck of the great emperor and the clergy of Aix-la-Chapelle (where Charlemagne died and was buried in 814) gave it in 1804 to Napoleon I. What is less well known is that Napoleon III. preserved this magic talisman, which assured, he said, the empire to its holder, in his bed chamber at the Tuilleries, at the head of his bed.

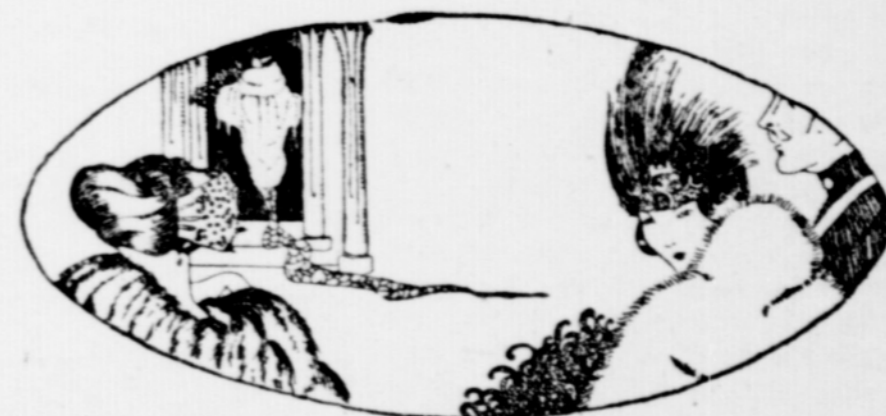

CRAFTY BRE'R FOX

Trappers Give Him Credit for Deep Cunning.

Of All Wild Animals, the Bushy-Tailed Rascal is the Hardest to Trap, but is Altogether Underserving of Mercy.

In the opinion of trappers, the fox is the most cunning and resourceful of all the wild animals. He often fools the most expert trapper and the truest and fastest of dogs. Some trappers who are very successful in catching many other fur-bearers state that they do not believe it possible to take Reynard in a steel trap. This, of course, is not the case—in fact, he is as easy to catch in a steel trap as the mink, provided the trapper thoroughly understands his business. All that is necessary is a careful study of the animal's nature and habits.

The fox lives on small game, birds, eggs and poultry. He makes his den in sandy hillsides, and in it the female rears from three to seven puppies, which are born in the early spring. February is the season Reynard goes wooling, and he travels far and wide in search of sweethearts, faithful to none, for his love is more fleeting than the footprints he leaves in the drifting snow. The fox's sense of smell is highly developed, and by it he detects the danger of the trap. The scent left by human hands and the scent left on the trap by other animals caught in it are quickly detected.

"A successful fox trapper must be a keen observer of details," writes C. A. Holmes, a special game protector. In a recent issue of the New York state conservation bulletin, in describing different methods of hunting and trapping foxes. "He must realize that he is pitting his wits against one of the most cunning of animals that roams the silent places of the hills and valleys. Recently I made an experimental set which resulted in the taking of one of the oldest, largest and wisest foxes in this vicinity. I noticed that the fox in question did not seem to take alarm at my trail over an old woods road, and as the snow was quite deep, would even take advantage of the better traveling by following in my tracks as far as he cared to go in my direction. That is the way of the fox—he is not blindly afraid of man, but trusts to his wits to keep him out of trouble. He knew that the trail was made by a man walking, and he also knew that the danger lay not in the trail, but in the man himself.

"After I had traveled this old road several times, and had noticed Mr. Fox was in the habit of following me nearly every night, I picked out a bush that stood close by the trail, to serve as a mark for locating the trap, and here I set two jump traps in one of my own footprints, with a sheet of clean paper beneath the traps, another sheet on top, and an inch of snow lightly brushed over all. I fastened the chains to clogs buried in the snow at the side of the trail and went on about my business.

"The next morning Reynard was waiting for me, a trap on each front foot. I would not have captured this fox had I not made this experimental set in the trail, and it only goes to show the value of observation to the experienced trapper.

"Every sportsman should realize that one of the worst enemies of wild life is the fox—cunning, vicious, bloodthirsty—it kills for the love of killing. The warm blood of its victims is its fountain of youth. Every fox shot or caught in a trap means just so many more grouse, pheasants and rabbits—to say nothing about the value of the fur. Fewer foxes, more sport, more game, more fun."

Purple Ore Now in Demand.
Purple ore is an unknown quantity to the uninitiated. To the initiated it is a heavy purplish powder used chiefly as ballast by ships leaving French ports. So little worth was attached to the ore five months ago that it sold in Bordeaux for 12.50 francs a ton. Since then it has been put to new uses, and, with the rise in demand, there has been a corresponding rise in price. Purple ore has a rich iron content, and that fact has been sufficient to prompt English manufacturers to devise new uses for the powder. Its sudden leap into the limelight will perhaps stimulate interest in the residue of other minerals, the possibilities of which may have been overlooked in the rapid march of all branches of engineering.

That Travelers May Read.
Borrowing a book from the public library in one city and returning it to the library in the next town where he makes a stop may be arranged for the benefit of the traveling man.

The National Council of Traveling Men's associations has appointed a committee to see what can be done along this line and has asked the American Library association to appoint a similar committee to confer. The library association, accepting the invitation, has just constituted its own committee. John Adams Lowe, vice librarian of the Brooklyn public library, is its chairman.

Bird Plumage Bill.
Bird lovers in this country will be pleased to learn that a bill has passed its second reading in the British house of commons forbidding the importation of bird plumage. The measure is heartily supported by the press, but is meeting with some opposition from certain members of parliament.

1920 PRICES ARE SLIGHTLY HIGHER THAN IN 1899

Possibly the greatest price increase of the past two decades have come in the harness, hardware and implement lines, the increase, according to some evidence presented recently having been approximately 475 per cent.

As an instance of the differences W. H. Finley ran across in his papers last week a copy of an invoice of plow gear he bought in January, 1899, at Holland, Texas, from M. J. Murrain, a dealer in hardware and farm implements. A local firm, whose prices are considered representative of this date, obligingly quoted Mr. Finley prices on the bill for delivery at this time. The first figures given are those for 1899 and the two are set down for contrast:

Incidentally, the bill head on which the figures were made cost the merchant in 1899 about 9.75 per five thousand and would cost him today \$24 per five thousand.—Floydada Hesperian.

SHORTAGE OF DWELLINGS THROUGHOUT UNITED STATES

Washington, Aug. 13.—Approximately 25,000,000 persons in the United States are now living in temporary, crowded and sometimes unsatisfactory quarters, according to officials of the United States Housing Corporation.

"The nation is short more than 5,000,000 dwellings and apartments," said Chief Engineer Chase of the corporation today.

"All hope of improvement must be deferred until next spring. Building now has practically stopped. It will take the country five years to catch up."

This means rents will continue to soar this winter, it is believed here. "The housing situation now is more acute than it was at the close of the war period when practically all building had been halted for three years," said Chase. "In only a few cities has any building activity gone on since the war ended. In this class are Cleveland, Akron, Detroit, St. Louis and one or two smaller middle-west towns.

"In all other cities there has been almost no building of dwellings since the armistice. There has been some construction of business buildings in New York. This was due to contractors who had materials which had been contracted for months before.

"In most sections of the United States, however, builders are simply waiting until next spring before starting work.

"Builders now and pretty generally since the armistice, have found it practically impossible to get materials. Poor transportation was partially the reason. Another was tight money.

"The labor shortage and strikes constituted another barrier to building." The United States Housing Corporation now has no authority to build and sell homes as it did during the war, officials said.

The corporation now is liquidating its business under an order of Congress. The corporation did, however, this spring take what steps it could to relieve the situation by selling houses and materials it had on hand.

EPITOME OF WOMAN SUFFRAGE BATTLE

1848—First Woman's Rights convention held in Seneca Falls, N. Y., at call of Lucretia Mott and Elizabeth Cady Stanton. Susan B. Anthony rises as leader in the movement for political freedom.

At the end of Civil War—Suffragists attempt to secure favorable interpretation of Fourteenth and Fifteenth Amendments.

1869—Wyoming gives its women full suffrage.

1872—Susan B. Anthony tries to vote, is arrested and refuses to pay fine.

1873—Susan B. Anthony makes first draft of woman suffrage amendment to the constitution.

1878—Amendment introduced in United States Senate by Senator Sargent, California.

1894—Colorado, Utah and Idaho give their women full suffrage.

1910—Women of State of Washington receive franchise.

1911—California enfranchises the women.

1912—Kansas, Arizona and Oregon join equal suffrage States.

1913—Alice Paul's militants begin "reign of terror." First activities in Congress on suffrage amendment since 1887. Illinois women receive Presidential and State suffrage.

1914—Full suffrage granted women of Nevada and Montana.

1917—New York enfranchises women.

1918—Women of Oklahoma and South Dakota enfranchised. Suffrage amendment finally passed by Congress.

1920 (March)—State of Washington brings struggle to final heat, the thirty-fifth state to ratify.

1920 (August 18)—Tennessee becomes thirty-sixth state to ratify.

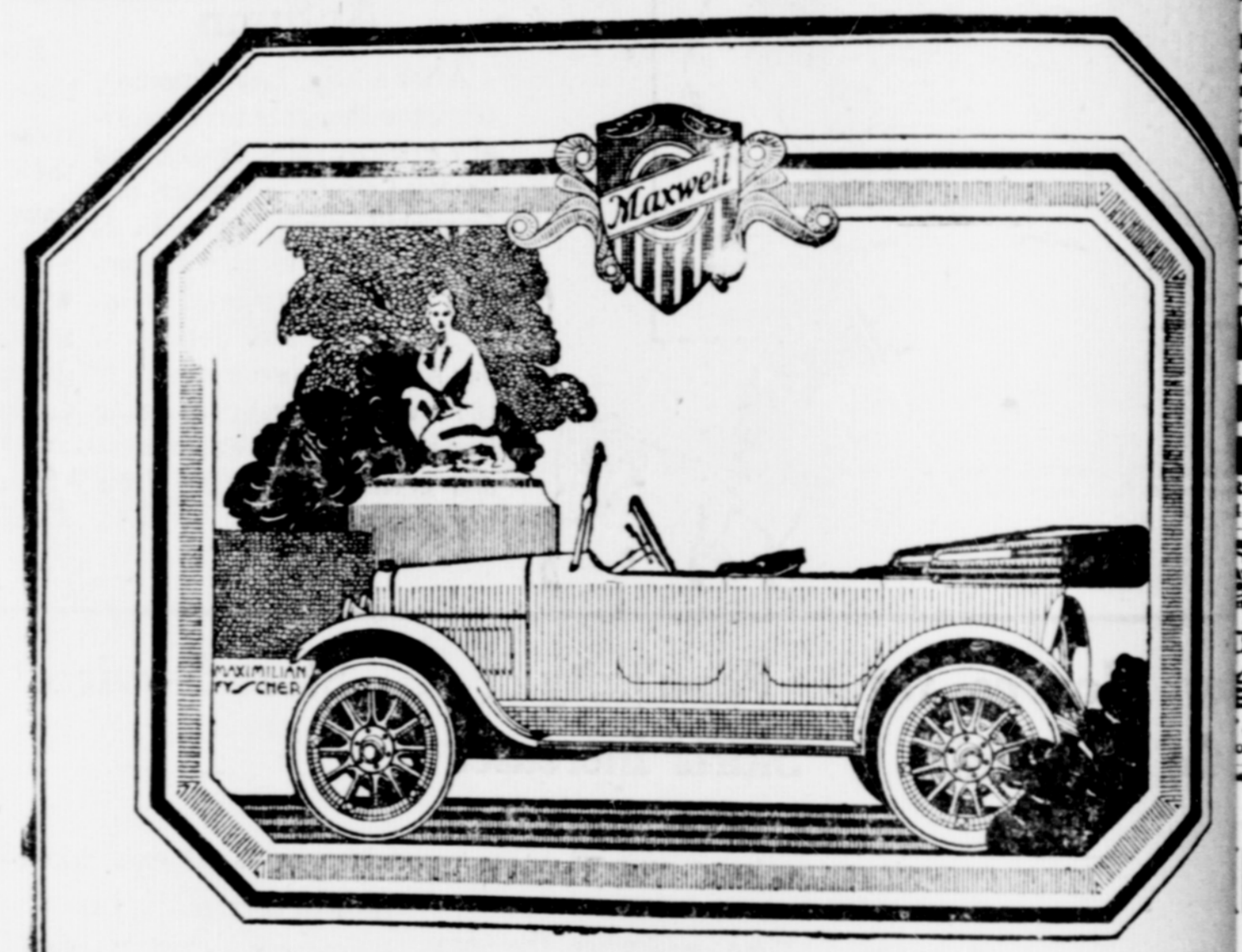

Something New in List of Accessories



WE ARE more allured by lovely accessories of dress than by essential clothing, and these furbelows provide us a continuous, pleasing performance. Something new claims attention all the time, and spices up our work-a-day world of dress. It is the daintiness and freshness of neckwear, or the richness of brocades in hats and bags or nosegays of ribbon flowers, or flowers of organdy or artificial fruits of yarn and numberless accessories made of ribbon that keep the mind occupied and the pocketbook busy just now.

Among the newest ornaments there are chokers (collars) of ribbon with full rosettes, to be worn close up around the neck. They are made of rather narrow ribbon and the rosettes have, as a rule, several short hanging ends. Just ahead of the autumn leaves are new blouses that show neck finishing resembling that perennial favorite, the frothy jabot, but the surest indication for fall seems to be the plaited upstanding ruff of ribbon drawn close to the throat with a narrow ribbon tie.

Another item that we may be sure of is the shopping bag of handsome ribbon. There is a new line of these ready for presentation to fall shoppers, and some of them have hats to match. Tops of the bags reveal new designs, and there are many handsome tassels used for finishing them. The soft draped crowns popular in fall hats lend themselves to the hat-and-bag-to-match idea. A handsome set appears in the illustration in which a narrow brimmed shape of plain velvet has a crown of brocaded ribbon draped so that it terminates in two points at the side. Of course these two points exist merely to support two handsome tassels that dangle from them and brush the shoulder. The shopping bag to match is pictured mounted on a metal ring with round top which probably holds a mirror on the reverse side. One may lay a safe wager that it contains a small ribbon covered box that carries compact face powder and a lip stick.

AND NOW THEY TALK OF SUITS



THE first hats and the first suits for fall have made their entry. They almost reconcile one to the passing of summer and succeed in making fall welcome. Women are remarking of the suits, their straight but chic lines, their trim fastenings up the front, their high necks and with all this their lack of severity. 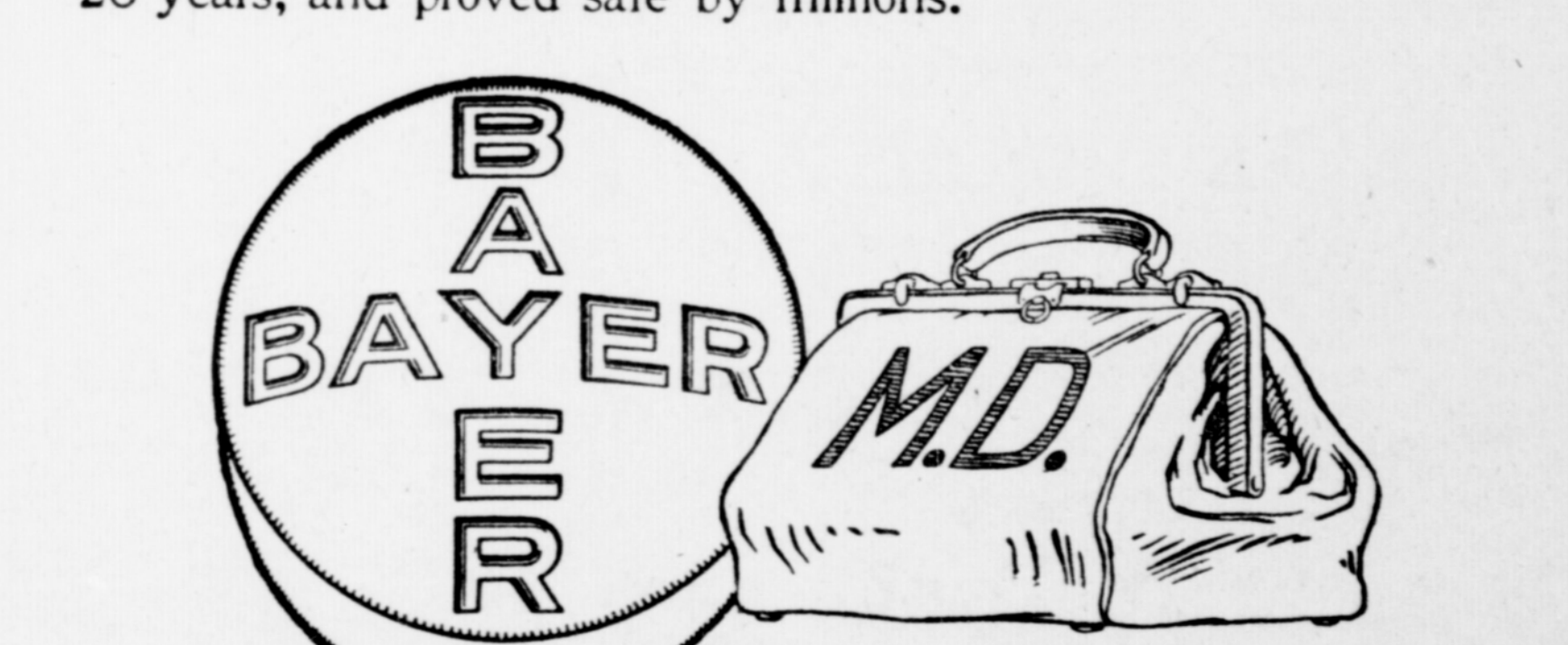

WHOLE WORLD IN HIS DEBT

Demise of General Gorgas Removed One Well Called a "Soldier of Humanity."

The death in London of General Gorgas removes one to whom had been given the unofficial but deserved title of "the world's physician," says the New York Times. His epoch-making work in Cuba and at Panama gave him fame in all civilized lands as a master of sanitation and of scientific method. His genius in finally tracing the yellow fever germ to its true carrier and in devising and developing the sure means of extirpating it brought about in his lifetime the fulfillment of his own prophecy that cases of yellow fever would become a medical rarity. It was inevitable that after his amazing and complete success in Cuba and at the Canal zone his skilled services should be sought by other governments.

In Guayaquil he demonstrated again his ability to rout yellow fever in one of its historic lairs, and in South Africa he brought his knowledge and devotion into play. No one in his time approached him in the number of victories which he won over tropical diseases. It was a dream of General Gorgas that the tropics might be made safe for the development of white civilization, and he did an immense deal to hasten its realization. The wide recognition which came to him while living and which is feelingly renewed now that he is gone, was less of his scientific attainments, great as they were, than of his achievements as a soldier of humanity.

EVER READY TO HELP BLIND

Americans Noted Everywhere for Their Generosity—Humorous Little Happening in Philadelphia.

In every nook and corner of the globe one visits, the natives do not fail to tell you of the generosity of the American. The native will give a hazzar a two centavo or two-centimo piece, while an American will probably give 50 centavos or centimos. And Americans are not only generous, but ready to do a kind act.

Right in the city of Philadelphia a person often sees a man or woman helping a blind person across the street. Probably you would have done the helping if the other person had not been a few steps in front of you.

The other day a gentleman saw a blind man walking in a circle and felt sorry for him.

Walking promptly up, the good Samaritan said: "Is there any way in which I can help you?"

Stopping in his tracks, the blind man replied: "Yes; you can take me to a restaurant and fill me up."—Philadelphia Record.

TEXAS COUNTY POPULATION CHOWS GREAT INCREASE

Washington, Aug. 23.—Despite losses here and there, the census enumerations of Texas counties continue to show a healthy growth for Texas.

The county of twenty-nine additional counties has been completed by the Census Bureau. These counties—Castro, Crane, Cherokee, Hood, King, Loving, Menard, Randall, Real, Terry, Upton, Wheeler, Hansford, Lamb, Cisco, Cochran, Gaines, Hays, Martin, Morris, Motley, Oldham, Runnels, Brewster, Gonzales, Jeff Davis, Reagan, Rockwall and Wharton—totalled 195,440, against 175,855 ten years ago. Thirteen of these counties, too, showed losses.

Small, But aLrge.

The count disclosed that Cochran County, which adjoins the New Mexican border, probably is the smallest county in population in the United States.

But, at that, it is growing as it had but sixty-five persons ten years ago and sixty-seven folks this year, a gain of more than 3 per cent. With an area of 859 square miles, Cochran County has one person to every thirteen square miles.

In all, the Census Bureau has enumerated eighty-three Texas counties. These counties show a total population of 192,459, against 689,469 ten years ago, a gain of 162,990, and a percentage increase of more than 17 per cent.

Rural Growth is Fast.

Considering that with but one exception, Jefferson County, all of the big counties of Texas have yet to be announced, and likewise, the great majority of populated counties, Census Bureau statisticians say that Texas rural growth is more than keeping pace with that in other states.

The percentage of rural growth is expected to take a decided increase when the bureau begins announcing the populous counties.

THE GREATEST TASK OF A CHAMBER OF COMMERCE

The greatest task of a chamber of commerce is to "sell" itself to the people of the community in which it is located and from among whom it draws support.

The term "sell" is borrowed from the primer of the modern salesman and it is used advisedly. Men and women will not pay money to a merchant for goods, which they do not want or which do not come up to their requirements nor will they contribute to the maintenance of a civic or commercial organization which does not win their approval or of which they know nothing.

The successful merchant, nowadays, strives to educate his patrons to acquire a taste for the goods he carries on his shelves and the chamber of commerce or other quasi-public institutions, depending upon popular support must prove to its members and the people as a whole that it has a reason for being and is therefore worthy of maintenance.

Too many chambers of commerce were permitted to die of inanition, in the past, because those who should be benefited by it and would support it if they were shown how to secure the benefits, were permitted to remain in ignorance often times even of its very existence except when they were called upon to send checks to cover their dues.


The officers and directors were too often to blame for lack of interest. They either did not know how to sell the benefits of the organization to the community or else they were inclined to adopt a policy of exclusiveness and converted the chamber of commerce into a "club" at which the favored few gathered upon more or less occasions for the purpose of forming plans to agree regardless of the fact that they had no voice in making them or of the further fact that they had not been given good reasons for agreeing to them.

It is an incumbent upon the directors of a chamber of commerce to let the people know that the organization is doing or trying to do to advance the best interests, not only of its members, but of the community as a whole.

States With Record Crops.

According to the latest available figures Kansas contributed one-fifth of the winter wheat crop, North Dakota, Minnesota and South Dakota nearly three-fifths of the spring wheat and seven-eighths of the flaxseed; Pennsylvania and New York nearly two-thirds of the buckwheat, Louisiana about one-half of the rice, and that state, California and Texas nearly seven-eighths. Tobacco is highly concentrated in Kentucky and North Carolina, from which more than one-half of the crop came.
