Lynn County's First Quota

Thursday morning Lynn county's first quota of selected men for the new National Army left for Camp Travis near San Antonio, Texas. The following four boys were ordered to appear and answer to roll call at five p. m. Wednesday September 5th; the number preceding their names being their order number and the number following their serial number:

18 Milton Finch 487
28 John Wesley McLaughlin 75
97 Clark Roberson 49
141 Anton J. Kahlich 206.

Three of the above were to go to the camp and the fourth was called as an alternate in case one failed to report on time. Clark Roberson and John Wesley McLaughlin were the only ones that answered to their names, so Van Swafford, order No. 113, Serial No. 435, was called and went with the first quota.

As we understand the boards instruction, these two boys who failed to answer have a certain number of days of grace in which to appear and give excuse why they did not appear, after which they will be reported to the district board.

The second quota is scheduled to leave sometime during the week beginning the 16th of this month, and consist of 26 names called, 20 of which will be forwarded to the camp.

The Wisdom of Moses.

The sanitary laws of Moses were not only in line with modern rules of hygiene, but in some cases in advance of them, according to a contemporary.

The Jew a thousand or two years before Christ settling in a semi-tropical country was forbidden to eat pork or shell fish, and milk was described as a source of contagion. The Talmud prescribed a method of slaughtering animals that is today acknowledged by our marketmen as the most sanitary.

Nearly 4,000 years before Kock gave to the world his researches in bacteriology, the Mosaic law pointed out the danger to man from tuberculosis in cattle, but did not forbid infected poultry as food. It was only a few years ago that German specialists discovered that fowl tuberculosis was harmless to man.

The Mosaic law also enforced the isolation of patients with contagious diseases and the burial of the dead outside of the cities. These hints the Gentile did not fully accept until a century or two ago.

Moses not only prescribed fasting periods of the year, but commanded whole families to go into camps in the summer, where they could live near to nature. Many of the laws of Moses were nothing else than hygienic prescriptions for the health of the body and mind.—Youths Companion.

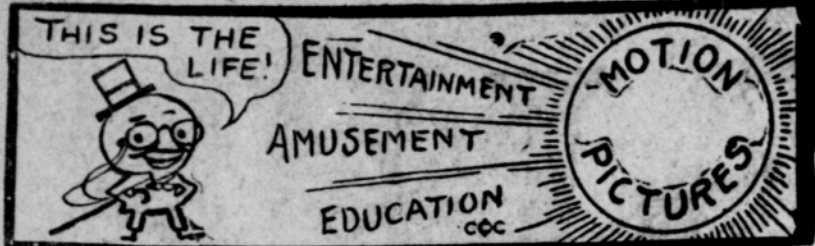

Mrs. Reeve returned to her home in Slaton Monday after a visit of several days with her niece, Mrs. Lockhart.

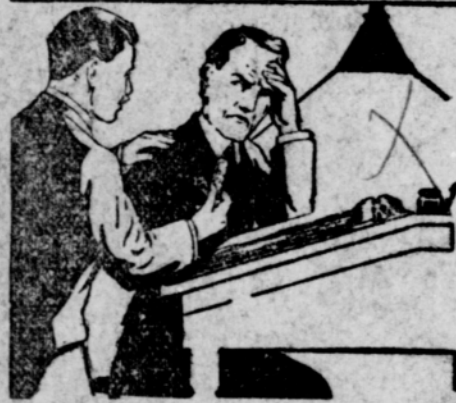

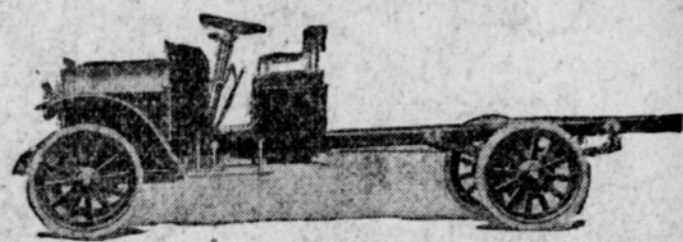
