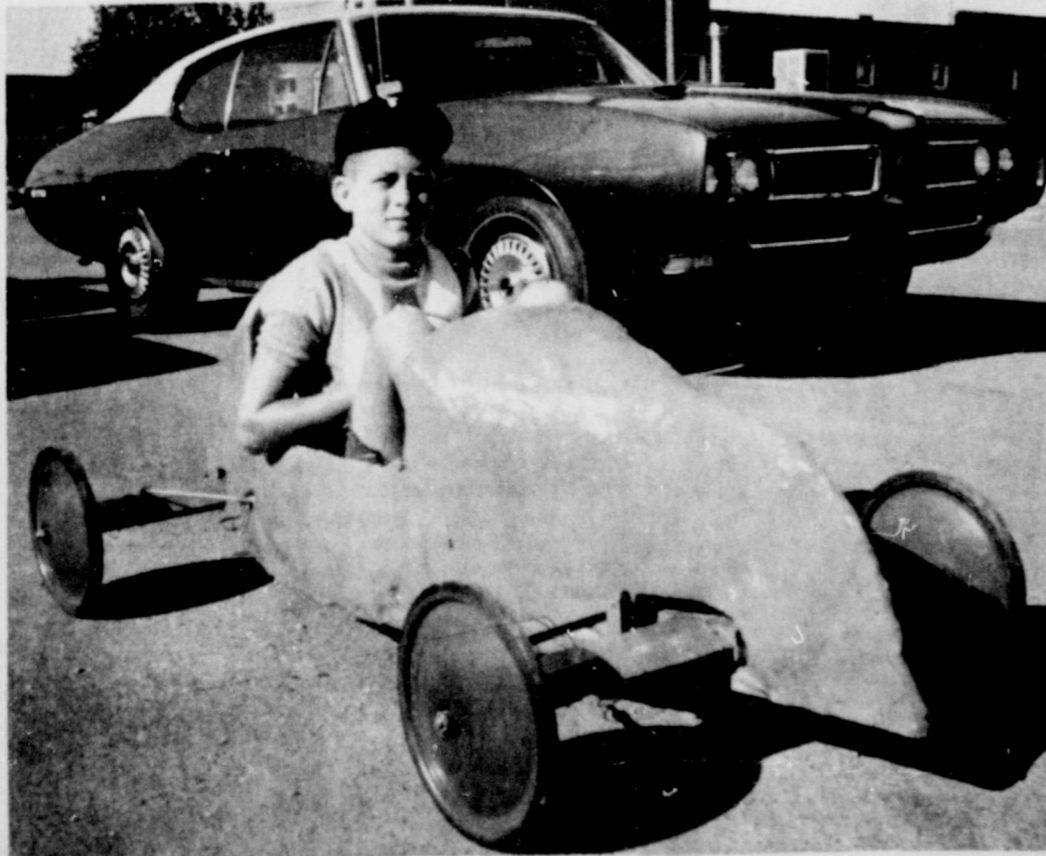
Terry began working in

# Farm Safety Week Is In Progress

The Lynn Soil and Water Conservation District joins the National Safety Council in sponsoring Farm Safety Week, July 21-24 says Jiggs Swann, District Supervisor.

Some of the things farm people need to observe in the use of herbicides, insecticides, the storage of all chemicals (out of reach of children), operation of farm machinery and automotive vehicles. Check the household for safety hazards such as faulty electrical wiring, gas leaks, etc., Swann pointed out.

Be sure to read the manufacturers labels and directions on all herbicides, insecticides, and other chemicals and make it a practice to follow the instructions. The operators manual furnished by the manufacturers of farm machinery and automotive vehicles contain good safety advice.

By making it a habit to think safety as we go about our daily activities can result in a more prosperous and longer life, Swann stressed.

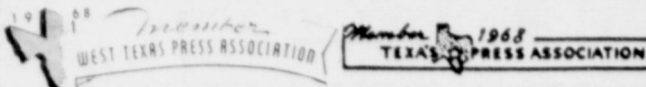

#### Hunting Seasons Set

The 1968 hunting seasons and bag limits have been set according to information released by the Parks and Wildlife Department. The P and W Commission met July 10 to finish setting the seasons. The season actually begins September 1 with mourning doves. Some changes have been made on this season so hunters should check local laws before hunting.

Prairie chicken season is October 12-13, pheasant season in the Panhandle is December 14-22, woodcock season is November 23-January 26 and rails and gallinules season is September 1-November 9.

For most of the state, deer season will start November 9 and end January 1. Most areas will open the first of October for archery hunting.

Other areas, the Edwards Plateau for example, will have slightly different seasons. This area will open November 9 to January 1. In the Trans-Pecos area, deer and turkey (only in Culberson and Hudspeth counties) seasons are November 30-December 15, antelope season is September 28 through October 6, javelina season is September 1-January 31 and quail season is November 9-January 31.

There will be no special season for teal this year as there has been the past three years.

There will be a special season this year at the Aransas Wildlife Refuge in Aransas County. The refuge opened in 1966 for archery only but an abundance of deer has deemed a special gun hunt also necessary. Officials say to maintain the quality of the deer herd as well as protect deer habitat from damage due to over population, gun hunters will be allowed on the refuge on a public drawing basis.

Archers will be permitted to take one deer of either sex from September 1-8. No drawings will be held for the archery hunts.

Two hundred gun hunters per two-day period will be allowed between September 11 and 30 with a bag limit of two deer, one of which must be an antlerless deer. A

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## Team Is Checking Midge Infestation

Lubbock Grain sorghum producers on the Texas High Plains can again expect midge infestations sometime this season but, thanks to a survey presently underway, they'll be forewarned then to take effective control measures.

A survey team of personnel from the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and Agricultural Experiment Station, which sponsor the service, are presently checking for the tiny insect in Johnson-grass where it usually overwinters, reports Lyndon Almand, Extension area entomologist.

"Head samples from the Johnsongrass and other host plants are being collected and held in the laboratory for emergence of a adult midge," he says. "This will provide a history of the midge population for the entire season, thus enabling us to know in advance the midge populations will reach damaging levels. We should

be able to predict such infestations two to three weeks in advance."

A 12-county area is being patrolled and wherever Johnsongrass is spotted, 25 to 50 heads of the grass are collected. Grain sorghum heads will be collected as they become available. Counties in the survey area are Yoakum, Terry, Lynn, Garza, Lubbock, Hockley, Cochran, Hale, Bailey, Lamb, and Floyd.

"Producers often have difficulty finding midge in a field, even if they are present," points out Almand. "They are quite small and their habits vary greatly. Midge may be active at any time during the day and their detection requires patient vigilance."

Some adult midge have already emerged from Johnsongrass, says the entomologist, but at present they are merely sustaining themselves. Populations won't increase until they invade sorghum.

The world of dogs and cats has its ups and downs. Pets pick up bumps, bruises, rashes and get sick.

If your pet is sick - particularly with distemper - give him lots of peace and quiet. A slamming door or sudden burst of sunlight from a quickly-raised shade can throw him into fits. Keep the room dim and the floor free of rugs (for easy cleaning).

Scaly skin and hair falling out in patches may mean your pet has eczema - an uncomfortable affliction for man or beast. There are various remedies which claim to relieve itching, but the rub is - how long can the poor dog stand to scratch. One new medicine available in your local pet shop for dogs and cats, called Enditch (in liquid or edible tablets) is guaranteed to relieve an eczema itch within hours - and the sooner this itch is stopped, the better!

Dogs' teeth cannot repair themselves; when the enamel wears off, it's gone forever. Your job is to keep an eye out for yellowish tartar deposits which can eventually cause teeth to fall out. While bones and other hard materials act like a dog's toothbrush, you can also clean his teeth by wiping them with a damp cloth dipped in salt or baking soda.

**Spite Fences**

"Good fences," wrote Poet Robert Frost, "make good neighbors." But bad fences make lawsuits. This is particularly true of the spite fence, a fence built by a property owner for the sole purpose of annoying the people next door. For more than a century, the spite fence has been a bone of contention in our courtrooms.

In an earlier day, the spite fence found support in the doctrines of rugged individualism. What a man built on his private property was considered nobody's business but his own.

Thus, one court saw nothing unlawful when a home owner put up an ugly wooden fence, 40 feet high, artfully located so as to shut off light and air from the house next door.

"It would be intolerable," went the explanation, "to allow a man's neighbors to question his motives every time he should undertake to erect a structure upon his own premises."

Yet, the sheer nastiness of the spite fence was so plain that a reaction finally set in. Gradually, through both legislation and court rulings, the law swung the other way. Today it is the rule almost everywhere that a fence built just to be mean is indeed unlawful.

As one indignant judge put it: "What right has the defendant to shut out God's free air and sunlight from the windows of his neighbor, not for any benefit to himself but simply to gratify his own wicked malice? None whatever. The wanton infliction of damage can never be a right."

In that case, the law usually gives him the benefit of the doubt. The man may build his fence, even if the additional motive of tormenting the folks next door adds zest to his labors.

"A good neighbor is a great treasure," one court reminded an obstinate home owner. "We can generally have such treasures if we are neighborly ourselves."

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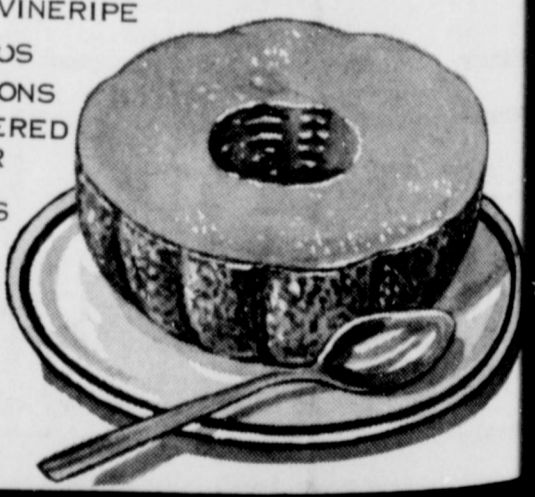
