B. F. POND SHOT TO

DEATH AT LAMESA FRIDAY

Lamesa, Texas, Jan. 12 .- The killing of P. F. Bond, age 60, at Lamesa Friday has occasioned quite a disturbance in the heretofore quiet and peacable city, and the tradegy is looked upon with deep regret by the entire citizenship.

Tom Farrow, age 32, a painter and paper hanger, who was working with Bond at the time the quarrel arose which led to the killing, is lodged in the local jail.

The killing occurred at ten o'clock Thursday morning when the men engaged one another in a fist fight which was caused by a disagreement over a contract on which both were working.

It seems that one of the workmen secured the contract to finish the top part of the hotel building being completed here while the other had secured the contract for the bottom floor, a misunderstanding of the limits Mrs. John Cobb and Miss Vinia of the surfaces they were to finish seemed to have caused the trouble.

been gone but a short time until Farrow ran to his home, which is nearby, armed himself with a 410 in Tahoka, Tuesday, January 23rd. guage shot gun and returned to the hotel where he shot Pond one time, the bullet taking effect just above the heart. Pond, it is said by eye witnesses, walked into the hotel and the new Baptist who have recently fell dead.

Young Pond, whose home was a distance from the place of the killing, is alleged to have arrived at the hotel with a 30-30 Winchester shortly after his father had been killed but was disarmed before he
