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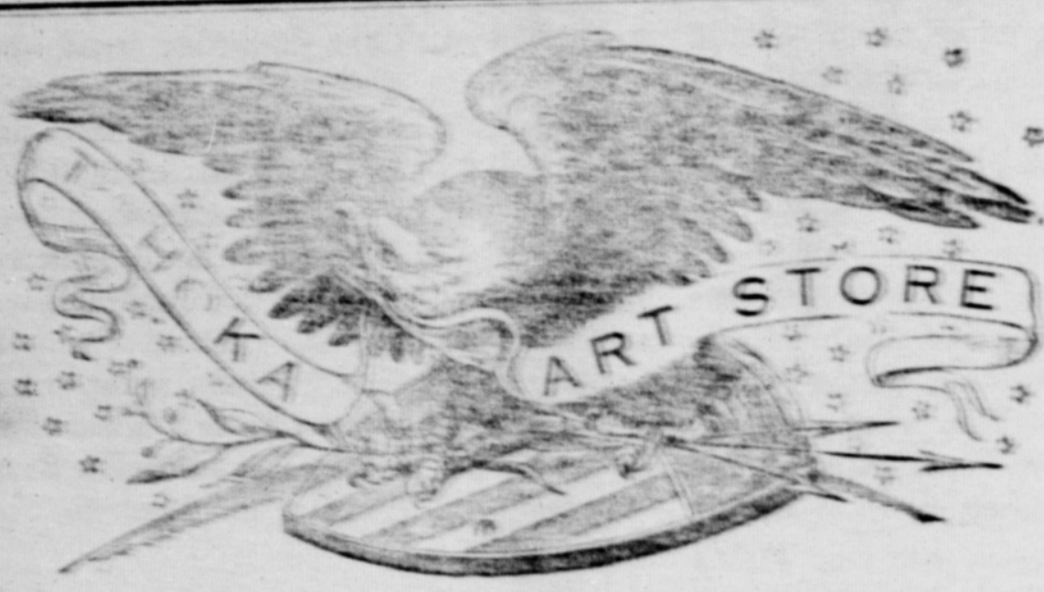

A LYNN COUNTY HOME, NEAR TAHOKA

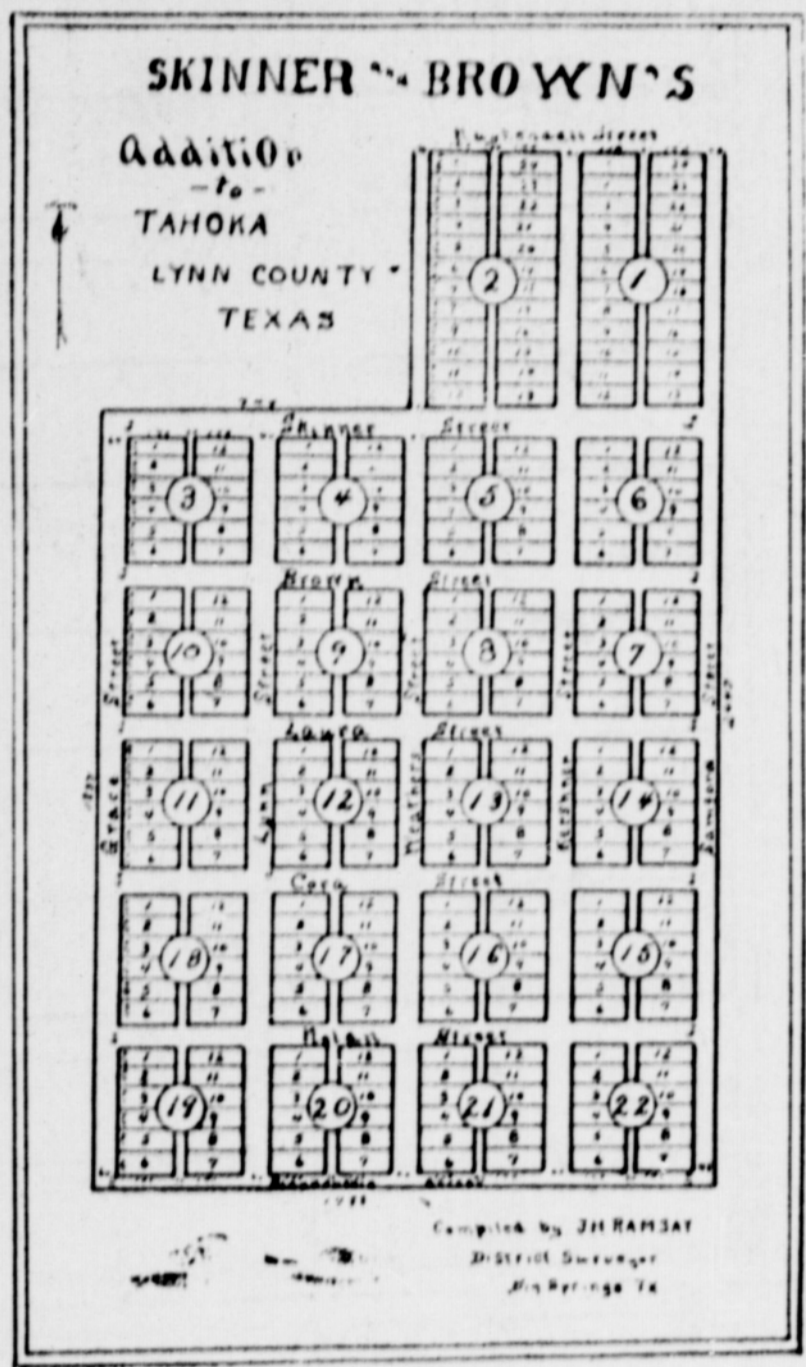

CYCLONE TEARS UP BARN NEAR TRENT
