Local School Board Met Last Thursday

Tahoka school board met in regular session Thursday, November 14, to approve claims and conduct other business at hand. Items approved by the board included the filing of tax suits by McCreary and Huey of Austin, for delinquent taxes on certain properties. Also, Al Hardin, Texas Tech, was approved as an addition to the substitute teacher list. The board approved the purchase of six lots, located on North 2nd St., behind the Homemaking Cottage, from Higginbotham Bartlett Co. at a cost of \$4,000. Tahoka, according to a report on actual athletic gate receipts, showed the school receiving \$3,920.62. The total enrollment as of November 14 was 1081 compared to 1,076 on October 10, 1968 and 1128, as of November 9, 1967. Average daily attendance for the first six weeks was 1,029.11.

Denver City Win Closes Bulldog Football Season

Conference play, for the Bulldogs closed out Friday night at Denver City when the Mustangs claimed the District 4-AA crown by a 59-8 victory. Charlie Brown hit pay-dirt for the Bulldogs late in the fourth quarter on a 38-yard run, assisted by two key blocks. The play, a fake pass left running room through the Mustang line for a score. A pass from Brown to end Jim Adams scored the two extras. Brown's score was the first and only time that the Mustangs had been scored upon in district play this year. John Powell scored the Mustangs first score, set up by Bulldog fumble on the first play of scrimmage. The Tahoka team tallied a

sustained drive in the second period, moving the ball down to the Mustang 26-yard line. One other drive, in 11 plays, left the ball at Denver City's 38. From this point the Bulldogs went on to score. Denver City led first downs by a narrow margin, 16-13. They racked up 259 yards rushing against Tahoka's 119, and tallied 131 yards passing with five completions of nine attempts. Tahoka had 22 attempts for 10 completions, totaling 85 yards. Both teams were close for penalties with the Bulldogs having four for 20 yards and the Mustangs, five for 25. The Mustangs will meet Olton tomorrow night at Olton. This is District 4-AA play-off.

Annual Christmas Seals Are Mailed To Local Residents

Christmas arrives in the mails this week, as November 21st, the final big mailing of Christmas Seals will come from the West Texas TB and Respiratory Disease Association. It will bring to 80,000 the total of Seals mailed. Christmas Seals should be arriving in Lynn County shortly, according to 1968 Christmas Seal Campaign Chairman, Mrs. Tom Sterling. Supporting Mrs. Sterling's statement are Wayne Huffaker of Tahoka and Mr. Wilmer Smith of New Home. Both are members of the West Texas TB and RD association for Lynn County.

The \$40,000 goal of the campaign is needed to finance an accelerated program of education, research and case detection aimed at the eradication of tuberculosis. "They also will finance increased efforts against emphysema and other chronic respiratory diseases which are taking a staggering toll in human life each year," says Mrs. Sterling. Christmas Seal funds finance chest X-rays, respiratory disease projects, outpatient services for TB patients, medical research and health information for everyone. Of the campaign funds, 75 percent goes to state activities and only 7 percent to the national organization.

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Bill Griffin, County Agent, Says.....

Although recent cold weather throughout the Texas Plains area should begin to curb screwworm cases, livestock producers need to continue to keep a watchful eye for the pest during the next few weeks.

Screwworm cases literally exploded across Texas in October, with more than 4,000 cases being confirmed, report officials at the Mission Laboratory where sterile screwworm flies are being produced in record numbers to combat the situation. At present 190 to 200 million sterile flies are being produced each week, almost three times the capacity for which the plant was designed.

Briscoe County with one case, Swisher County with two remain the northernmost counties in the state reporting confirmed cases during October. Other South Plains counties on the "casualty" list include Crosby, with one case; Borden, three; Scurry, two; Gaines, one; and Howard, five.

Numerous counties in the Rolling Plains also reported cases during the past month. They include Archer, Dickens, Haskell, Montly, Shackelford, Throckmorton, Wichita and Young, each with one case; Jones and Stonewall, two; Stephens, three; and Fisher, four.

As of November 1, Texas had already recorded 7,852 screwworm cases this year, exceeding case confirmations of all previous years since the screwworm eradication program was initiated in 1962 with the exception of the first year. Last year only 835 cases were recorded.

Officials emphasize that good management practices should be continued. A delay of all animal surgery is advisable until cold weather takes a firm foothold in the area. Herds should be inspected regularly and all wounds should be treated as soon as possible. Spraying of herds will help reduce fly populations.

All suspected screwworm cases should continue to be reported to the Mission Lab for identification, urge officials. Areas with confirmed cases will be "bombed" promptly with sterile flies. Containers for mailing samples are available from local County Agricultural Agents.

A case of screwworms was reported at Wilson on November 11. The specimen was mailed to Mission Laboratory and identified as screwworms.

Pressurized Containers
 Those pressurized cans found in abundance around most homes and in the farm shop are potential bombs and the hazards involved should be recognized.

With cooler weather and the need for heat in homes and the shop, better take time to make a check and see that none of the pressurized containers are stored near a heat source, advises County Agent Bill Griffin. The containers should be kept out of direct sunlight, away from radiators or other areas of high heat. Any heat above 100 degrees, he warns, will create a definite hazard.

Reports from over the county every year show that serious injuries and even some deaths result from the explosion of pressurized cans. Heat is the greatest danger involved. Cans placed in an incinerator or trash fire, though believed empty of paint, hair spray or insecticide they once contained, will explode with great force and can cause injury should a person or pet be in range of the flying metal.

If no other safe method of disposal for such cans is available, they should be bagged, advises the county agent.

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Linda Cribbs, CHD Agent, Says.....

Cookies and cakes which are long-lived and can stand a few knocks can be mailed with confidence, regardless of distance says Linda.

Soft drop cookies, cherry bar cookies, squared and filled cookies travel well. Apple sauce, molasses, oatmeal and mince meat cookies are good packers. Cookies flavored with honey and fruit improve with age.

If cookies are too rich, they may crumble or turn rancid, warns Linda.

Cakes are difficult to ship successfully because they dry and break. Syrups substituted for part of the sugar help prevent rapid drying. Frost cakes and those made with applesauce remain moist for some time.

The Extension Agent recommends sending cupcakes baked in fluted paper cups. Or, she says, cut a square cake and frost pieces on all sides, wrapping each piece individually.

To send pie, Linda suggests tarts or individual pies. They pack better. Add bran to the pastry dough helps prevent the crust from breaking up. Firm fillings are less apt to soak through the crust. Linda recommends mince meat and fruit thickened with cornstarch. Custard fillings spoil too rapidly to be safe.

The agent says products of these two recipes travel well.

Honey Hermit
 Melt 1/3 cup shortening and add it to 1-1/3 cups of strained honey. Then add 2 eggs, 1/2 cup milk, 1/2 teaspoon salt and 1 cup chopped raisins. Sift together 3/4 cups flour, 1 1/2 teaspoons cinnamon, 1/2 teaspoon ground cloves, and 4 teaspoons of baking powder. Add the dry ingredients to the moist and mix well. Drop on greased cookie sheet and bake in 375-400 degree oven until done.

Applesauce Loaves
 Cream together 1/4 cup shortening and 1 cup sugar. Add 1 cup applesauce. Sift together 2 cups flour, 1 level teaspoon baking soda, 2 level teaspoons cinnamon, a pinch of salt and a pinch of nutmeg. Add dry to moist ingredients, then stir in 1 cup chopped raisins and currants. Mix and bake in individual small loaf pans, using 350-375 degrees F. oven. Chopped citrus or candied fruits can be substituted for a portion of the raisin and currant mixture, if desired.

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Farm-City Week Is Slated This Month

President Johnson has designated the week of November 22-28 as 1968 National Farm-City Week, according to Allen V. Sheppard, Work Unit Conservationist, Soil Conservation Service.

Many communities throughout America will be having special observance programs. The week is sponsored nationally by Kiwanis International in cooperation with soil and water conservation districts.

"Farm-City Week this year focuses attention on the quality of our resources—our environment," Sheppard said. "While resources are of special concern to conservation districts, these elements of our natural environment are of critical importance to all people whether they live in the city or the country."

Sheppard said the event is an example of the recognition given by civic clubs and other town and city groups to the interdependence of farm and city people.

Sheppard noted that President Johnson, in his proclamation of National Farm-City Week, said the quality and quantity of our resources in the next century depends on planning for uses of the countryside and developing town and country economies.

"Individual lives will be shaped, too, by whether our core cities are restored and whether suburban growth is translated into durable and desirable forms of community development," the President said.

"Our major tools for achieving these goals are: an agricultural capacity for abundance never before attained by a nation; and a vigorous economy with a gross national product this year of around \$850 billion dollars, the largest in the world," the President said.

Sheppard suggested that Farm-City Week events might include joint efforts by farm organizations, civic and business groups, youth and women's clubs. Orderly development of Texas's urban open spaces, pollution control, flood prevention, rural recreation and nature areas, highway beautification and wildlife protection were listed by Sheppard. Community resource projects need local action, he said.

"Such projects involve town folks as well as country residents. Soil Conservation Service technical staffs, located in Tahoka are available to help the planners. Other Federal and state organizations are also geared to offer specialized aid," the official said.
