#### CITIZENS ASK FOR CO. AGENT

Petition Circulated For Reinstate-ment Of County Agent In Lynn County

A petition is being circulated this week to be presented to the com-missioners' court asking that a county agent be employed in Lynn

county.

Something more than two years ago, the court decided to employ an agent and Mr. A. L Robertson was employed jointly by the Coupnty and the State, upon recommendation of the authorities at the A. & M. College He remained here one year, at the end of which time his services were dispensed with and no successor was chosen.

FEEDING SCRAPS HARD

ON CHICKS

Decayed Matter Upsets Digestive System and Causes Unneces-sary Losses

Investigation of some recent baby chick losses has revealed that many poultry raisers are accustomed to throw table scraps into the chicken yard in the evening. This is a dangerous practice. In this warm weather such waste matter decays very rapidly and becomes injurious to the immature digestive system of the chicks. Moreover, such scraps are hardly ever balanced so as to give the chicks the all-round development the poultryman wants. Even if fed as a supplement to a balanced ration, scraps have a fendency to unbalance it.

If scraps must be fed, they should

ration, scraps have a tendency to unbalance it.

If scrapa must be fed, they should be fed only while still fresh, and when, the chickens can clean them up quick by. They should be fed to the mature hens, not growing chicks.

The Purina 1924 Poultry book, dis tributed free through the Courtesy of the Wyatt Feed and Coal co. of this city, contains detailed directions for feeding growing chicks for more rap id development, and mature hens for egg production, as well as much other valuable matter of interest to poultry raisers.


