ties in the State, producing more than 1,000,000 pounds of poultry and about 50,000 cases of eggs in 1925. One produce firm in Floydada shipped out 190 cases of eggs, or 5,700 dozen. Friday. This amount was bought from farmers and citizens in less than a week's time. A conservative estimate of the number of eggs shipped from Floydada during an average week would be 70,000, or 200 cases. At \$7.60 per case, the present price, this means that \$1,520 per week is paid to poultry raisers in the Floydada territory for eggs. The amount paid for cream is approximately \$1,200 per week. Shipping out 22,000 pounds of chickens at an average price of 22 cents brings in the neighborhood of \$506.

COLLINS ALLOWED BOND IN SUM OF \$10,000

H. H. Collins, accused slayer of Frank Howard, and who also seriously cut Will Fisher, who is said to have tried to separate them, was tried here Saturday before M. S. Dumas, local justice of the Peace in an application of the defendant for bond. He was represented by attorneys from Lubbock, and the state was represented by District Attorney A. W. Gibson of Lamasa, and County Attorney Geo. W. Neill. Collins was allowed bond in the sum of \$7,500 in the Howard case and \$2,500 in the Fisher case, both of which must be satisfactory to the officials here. It is believed his friends will make the bond. Collins was immediately carried to Tahoka and placed in jail there instead of Lubbock, for several good reasons, none of which need be repeated in these columns.—Terry County Herald.

All kinds of propaganda are being circulated to defeat the proposed school bonds. Perhaps those who are circulating this propaganda are honest and sincere in their statements. Perhaps they have been led to believe that the site for the proposed building has been settled upon in case the bonds are voted. Such is not the case. Several desirable sites are offered. As we understand it the members of the Board are divided among themselves as to which should be accepted. In fact we know this to be the case. No site has been selected. None will be selected until after the bonds are authorized. Some of the members of the board have made the suggestion that the matter of the site be left up to a vote of the people. We can not say whether this will be done or not, but we can positively declare that no site has been selected by the board.

We believe that a good county agent could do much good in Lynn County. It is probable that even the most proficient and tactful agent could not accomplish the maximum of good the first year or even the second year, but we do believe that a really proficient man who loves his work and who is thoroughly dedicated to the task of rendering service, can soon convince the farmers as well as others of his worth. The home demonstration agent has done this and we believe that the right kind of county agent would do the same thing. Why not give it a fair trial?

Many people are much disturbed about a order recently made by the Washington authorities to the effect that hereafter beer containing as much as 3.75 per cent of alcohol may be sold for medicinal purposes. In states which have no laws prohibiting such sales, this ruling may operate to the detriment of law enforcement, but in Texas we have the Dean Law which prohibits the sale of any beverage containing more than one per cent of alcohol and providing that alcohol in any form may be sold for medicinal purposes only upon the prescription of a physician. This order will not materially affect law enforcement in Texas.

If the friends of educational progress in Tahoka go to sleep on the job, the school bonds will be defeated Saturday and our schools crippled for years to come.

Tahoka has the largest school district in the county. Tahoka has the wealthiest district in the county. The prospects for the increase in population are greater than in any other large district, we believe, in the county. But Tahoka already has less money invested in school buildings than O'Donnell has, and in addition to that O'Donnell has just recently voted \$85,000.00 with which to construct a high school building. The bonds are already sold and the contract for the building is to be let soon. Tahoka has less money invested in public school buildings even than Wilton. Tahoka's buildings are shamefully inadequate to take care of her school needs. Yet in the face of all these facts, the friends of educational progress in Tahoka are going to have to come to the polls and vote next Saturday to prevent Tahoka from taking a backward step. Can we afford for Tahoka to vote down any additional buildings under these circumstances? Certainly not.

After all the slush that the "wets" have introduced before the Senate committee which is holding "hearings" on the proposals of the "wets" to modify the Volstead act, it is refreshing to hear a note sounded, clear and strong, before that body for law enforcement. In answer to questions propounded by wet Senator Reed, a lady told the committee that the wet stand "for the strengthening of the Volstead act rather than its modification. We want it enforced by officials who are in sympathy with it," she declared. Asked if she approved the section relating to fruit juices. "We stand for the strongest things in enforcement and the weakest thing in liquor," she shot back, and the crowd applauded. Those who have been led by "wet" propaganda to believe that the people of the country are ready to surrender to the clamor of the lawbreakers of this country against the dry laws are reckoning without their host. America is dry for keeps, and she means to get drier.

In striking contrast with the wails of a group of Senators who have been championing the cause of the law-breakers in the United States Senate and seeking to get this country to back up on the Volstead act, Senator Morris Sheppard of Texas made a ringing speech in Washington a few days ago in favor of law enforcement and a dry America. The liquor interests and some other "interests" are against Sheppard on this proposition, but the great common people, the God-fearing people of America, are with him. Stay with them, Morris, and the people of Texas will pronounce the verdict, "Well done, thou good and faithful servant."

By a vote of 45 to 41 the Senate last Monday unseated Brookhart of Iowa and seated Daniel F. Steck in his stead. Sixteen Republicans and twenty-nine Democrats voted to unseat him and thirty-one Republicans, nine Democrats, and one Farmer-Labor member voted not to unseat him. Brookhart is an Insurgent while Steck is a Democrat. The evidence showed that Steck had received a majority of the votes cast at the last Iowa election instead of Brookhart, according to the verdict of the Senate.

Judge Felix D. Robertson has withdrawn as a candidate for Criminal District Judge of Dallas county. From this distance we are not qualified to express an opinion as to the kind of record he has made as a trial judge but we get many intimations from many sources that he was a huge "joke." He would have been worse than a "joke" if he had been elected governor; he would have been a calamity. His near-election was not due to his merits but to the power of a secret political organization that sought to dominate the politics of this state. As a result of its activities, the people of Texas were reduced of a choice between Robertson and the Fergusons. This is another demonstration of the fact that it is always dangerous and blighting for any secret organization to be accorded political power and influence. Many such a dastardly attempt to control the politics of this state never happen again with in a thousand years.

The News believes that good public schools are among the very best assets that any town can have. Good public schools are not assured by the construction of good buildings but it is certainly true that the best schools can not be maintained without good buildings. We believe that good schools are worth far more

than they cost, even to the rich and the well-to-do. But the public school is peculiarly the poor man's institution. The children of the man in moderate circumstances and of the man in poor circumstances are given the same opportunity in the public school as the children of the rich and the powerful. While human nature is such, therefore, that it is to be expected that the wealthy and the well-to-do will often oppose taxes and bond issues for the improvement of the public schools, there is every reason in the world why the poor man and the man in moderate circumstances, the ordinary man, should favor the improvement of the public schools. It is not surprising that some of Tahoka's wealthy and influential citizens should be opposing the bond issue now pending, but it is almost past comprehension that any ordinary citizen should oppose this step forward. If the ordinary citizen will vote for his own interest and for the interest of his children and his neighbors' children on next Saturday, the bond issue will carry much stronger than it did in the last election.

It is human nature that when a man opposes a thing he will find as many reasons for opposing it as possible. When one objection is eliminated he will readily find another. There is no way under the sun to satisfy the man who opposes any movement because of the fact that it will cost him something. But his objections should be taken with a grain of salt. Remember this when you go to the polls Saturday.

Let nobody be deceived. Those who oppose the school bonds are working at the job. They are good men and influential men, but this is not a question of men. The question to be settled is: Will Tahoka take a step forward or backward educationally?

WOULD LEGALIZE DISTRICT BONDS

Ausin, April 10.—Direct appeal to Governor Miriam Ferguson to call a special session of the legislature to validate \$100,000,000 in road bonds held to be void by the U. S. Supreme Court by a recent decision in the Archer County case was made today by a delegation of prominent Ft. Worth citizens and later in the day the Governor will also be importuned to call an extra session by a petition which is being drawn at a conference here.

To the Fort Worth delegation Gov. Ferguson and her husband J. E. Ferguson expressed the opinion of there being doubt as to whether a special session of the legislature could give the needed remedy. They said they were anxious to provide a remedy and did not decline to call a special session.

Suggestion was made that a bill be drawn and submitted to the governor.

weather it has been found impossible to heat this so as to keep the children comfortable. The only alternative is the erection of some unsightly and expensive frame buildings or shacks or the building of a permanent structure in keeping with the needs and the civic progress of the city. Either course will cost some money. Good business men usually claim that "the best is the cheapest" in the long run.

Who will be allowed to vote? This question is frequently asked. The answer is that qualified property taxpayers only will be allowed to vote. It is not sufficient to have paid a poll tax. The poll tax must have been paid but in addition to this the voter must also be a property tax payer. This does not mean, however, that the voter must be the owner of real estate. If he pays a tax on personal property and has paid his poll tax and is otherwise qualified, he can vote. The man or woman therefore who pays a tax on a hound pup or a pug dog or any other personal property comes within the definition of a "property-taxpayer." Ordinarily, any woman whose poll tax has been paid and whose husband pays a property tax is a qualified voter. Property owned by the husband, whether it be a cow, an automobile, a farm, or a grubbing hoe, is the community property of the husband and wife, unless it has been inherited or acquired by the husband specifically as his separate property. If the husband pays a tax on any community property, the wife is a property taxpayer.

If you are a qualified voter at this election, go and vote.
If not, do not try to vote.
