How Machine Pulls Flax.

One of the most costly and tedious of the processes in connection with the manufacture of linen is the pulling of the flax, which hitherto has had to be done by hand. New attempts are now being made in Europe to do this mechanically and several tests recently have been made of different flax-pulling machines. most successful seems to be one that is now running in Ireland. This ma chine, like others tried in England, France, Russia and Canada, mentally consists of a comblike ar-rangement that grasps the flax stems and by the resistance of the seed capsules of the fiber plucks them from the ground. After being pulled, the flax is thrown onto a binder arrangement similar to that used in gruin harvesters. It is then bound and shocked, also like sheaves of grain.-Popular Mechanics Magazine.


