



In Big Springs.

Just after miduight on Wednesday a week ago while helping the Marshall of Big Springs in raiding a negro dive. Jim Burk was shot and instantly killed. Three negroes have been arrested, whose names are as follow: Ed Hardgraves, Will Manning and Albert Smith.

Jim Burk, the white man when was killed, was 36 veres ald. 011. married, had been living in Big Springs several months and was employed as time keeper for the railroad grading cutfit there. He had an uncle living in Big Springs and a brother at Dennison, where he was burried.

Some talked of lynching the ne groes, but as a speedy trial was promised it was decided to let the law take its course

As a result of this tradgedy a mass meeting of the citizens was held Thursday and all negroes were ordered to leave Big Springs at once.

LYNN GOUNTY NEWS Changes Made In Quarantine.

Owing to the spread of Texas fever among Southern and Western cattle the Agricultural Department at Washington has adopted new regulations governing the shipment of cattle The statement of the department made public last fue-day with the regulations set forth that the Texas fever prevails among the cattle of California, Oklahoma, Indian Territory, Texas, Arkansaw, Louisiana. Mississippi, Tennessee, Alabama, Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia and Florida, which states Negro Kills White Man are quarantined with certain excepted areas. Under the new regulations the general area is to be limited by a new line. The exceptions for Texas shipments are stated as follows:

> During the continuance of the quarantine no cattle of the moditied quarantine area of any state or territory other than Texas shall he moved or allowed to move into the counties of Baylor and Throckmorton

No cattle of the counties of Childress, Cottle, Hardeman, Ford, Wilbarger, King, Knox, Haskell, Stonewall, Jones, Fisher, Scurry, Borden, Howard, Mitchell, Glass cock, Sterling, Iron, Reagan, Upton, Crane. Throckmorton, Bavior and those portion of Pecos, Terrell and Tom Green counties lying north and west of the quarantine line, shall be moved or allowed to move except as provided for immediate slaughter to any point in the United States, not in the state of Texas, which is located outside of the modified quarantine area. until they have been in-pected and a written permit for the snipment






