Storm Destroys Half Of County Cotton

Hail, Wind, Sand Hits Crops In Several Areas Of Lynn County

Up to half of Lynn County's cotton may have been lost in last Friday evening's storm. County Agent Bill Griffin estimates.

The eastern half of the county was hit by hail and rain, while the western sec-

tion was the victim of a freak sand storm which came out of the north, possibly triggered by the tornado up in Hale County.

Tahoka received a lot of sand and no rain with the high wind, but most all of the rain was over the east-

ern half of the county. Some farmers west of town say they do not have enough moisture to replant.

On Saturday, .18 inch of rain fell in Tahoka and light rain fell over the east and northern portions of the county.

Hail and rain damage was reported east of Wilson, from Gordon south and west to New Lynn, Central, Grassland, Edith, Redwine, and Draw.

Also hard hit by blowing sand was an area north of Tahoka two or three miles. Dixie, New Home, Lakeview, Petty, West Point, T-Bar, Wells, and New Moore.

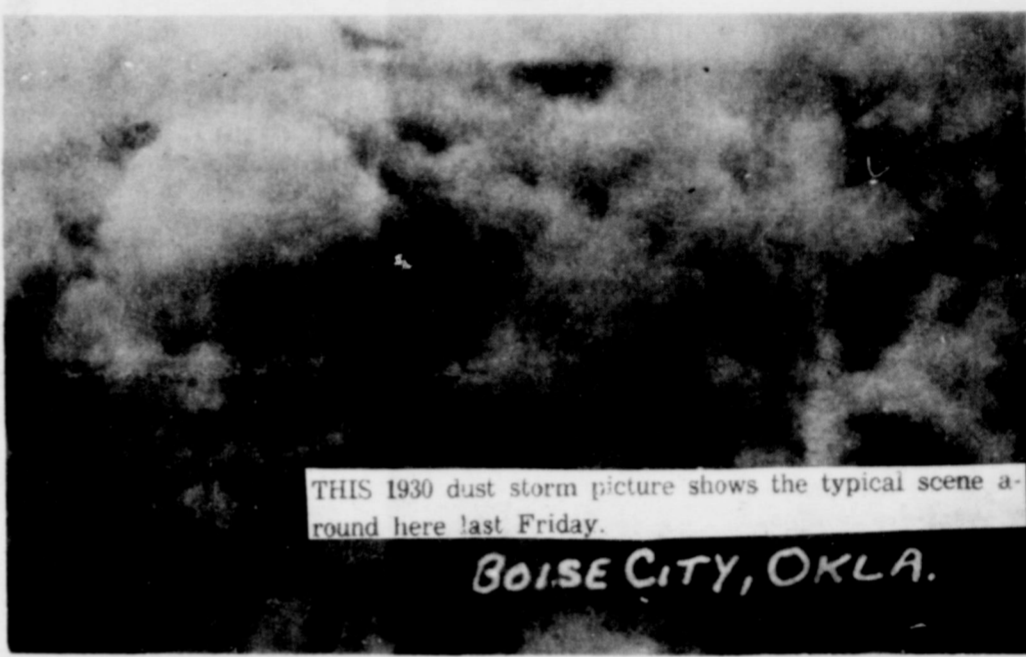
The unusual sand storm, reminiscent of the 1930's, came out of the north as a

reddish, black cloud, flattening many fields and burning young cotton in others. Most damage was reported in fields where the rows were running north and south.

Many other areas of the Plains also received severe damage, in Hale, Castro, Hockley, Lamb, Floyd, Lubbock, Terry, Swisher, and Gaines counties and possibly others, including some of Garza county.

Not only did the farmers lose their crops but also lost expensive high grade cotton seed, now hard to find, fertilizer, tractor fuel and labor.

Most farmers who have the moisture have replanted, and those with insufficient moisture are "planting on a prayer".

Rate Increase For Lot Mowing

Near Record Vote Is Cast In Saturday's Primary Runoff

Lynn Countians turned out a near record vote for the run-off, with three races appearing on the ballot. The large turnout was due to the sheriff's race locally and the governor's race. 2,490 votes were cast.

Voters gave Norvell Booger Redwine the nod for Lynn County Sheriff, over Reid Parker, winning by 202 votes. Redwine tallied 1,340 votes with Parker totaling 1,138.

Preston Smith was given a six to one victory over his opponent, Don Yarborough in the governor's race. Coun-

tians gave Smith 2,122 votes over Yarborough's 345. Smith will face Republican Eggers in the November General.

Judge James A. Joy of Plainview was elected Associate Justice of the 7th Court of Civil Appeals. He led county voting 1,312 to 1,076 over Judge Jack Hazelwood of Amarillo. Joy will succeed Judge Alton B. Chapman of Floydada, who did not run for re-election.

Precinct voting in the sheriff's race was as follows, with Redwine's votes listed first. South Tahoka, 176-180; Wilson, 208-68; O'Donnell,

157-205; New Home 132-81; Draw, 23-59; North Tahoka, 271-283; Grassland, 30-23; Gordon, 50-20; West Tahoka, 123-90; New Moore, 16-23; Lakeview, 43-17; and Absentee, 111-88.

Precinct voting in the governor's race was as follows, with Smith's votes listed first. South Tahoka, 276-78; Wilson, 241-32; Donnell, 312-52; New Home, 175-38; Draw, 77-5; North Tahoka, 473-76; Grassland, 43-11; Gordon, 64-4; West Tahoka, 194-17; New Moore, 30-9; Lakeview, 51-8; and Absentee, 186-15.

Parks And Wildlife Hearing Set

Lynn County landowners and sportsmen are urged to attend Public Hearings sponsored by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, June 11th at 10:00 a. m. in the County Court Room.

Hearings of this nature are sponsored in each County seat in the state prior to setting fishing and hunting regulations and seasons in the state.

Four wardens will be in attendance to answer questions concerning fishing and hunting regulations and to hear the views and opinions of local sportsmen and land owners.

County Boat Ownership High

Lynn County residents are fond of water sports as evidenced by the number of boats in this county. County Tax Collector George McCracken reports, 164 boat

trailers registered in 1967. This would not include boats stationed permanently at lakeside retreats or water craft that can be carried on top of cars. A rough 'guesstimate' would be one boat for every fifty residents.

White River Lake Booming
 Following a trend of reporting on area lakes, we call your attention this week to White River Lake, 12 miles south of Crosbyton.

White River has been open now for two years and was created because of a need for municipal water supply to the cities of Post, Ralls, Spur, and Crosbyton.

The family and I paid a brief visit to the lake over the weekend and was able to find out several interesting facts about the facility from Mr. Ted Karr of Crosbyton, a water district employee.

The lake depth is now 57.8 feet after a recent rise due to recent rains in the White River watershed. The lake contains 20,000 acre feet of water and is slightly over half full. At full capacity the lake will contain 38,000 acre feet of water. A rise of 14 feet is needed before the lake will be considered full and the excess water will drain off through the 'morning glory' near the dam.

Mr. Karr reports the lake is overstocked with Bass and Crappie. The lake didn't fill as fast as anticipated by water district authorities. This gives the angler a chance at limit size Bass and Crappie and they are reported to be no trouble to catch. One area fisherman had terrific luck fishing for Channel Cat. His catch was brought to the Marina to be weighed and the 5 catfish averaged over four pounds each.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Biologists released 21 Yellow Catfish into the lake recently in hopes they would spawn and populate the lake with their species. All weighed between 15 and 25 pounds. The Yellow Catfish will not spawn in captivity so transferring fish already established is the only way of stocking new water.

The White River Municipal Water District owns the land surrounding the lake and offers cabin sites on a lease basis. Presently there are 61 permanent cabins around the lake with more in various stages of construction. Free camping is available on the 6000 acres of land controlled by the water district.

A well stocked Marina, A Steak House, and dock area are permanent fixtures around the lake. District authorities have provided picnic tables and shades in strategic area around the lake.

Activity on the lake was heavy over the past weekend as witnessed by this writer. Fishing, skiing, swimming, and boat riding was the order of the day for residents from 17 counties. (We took a license plate survey.)

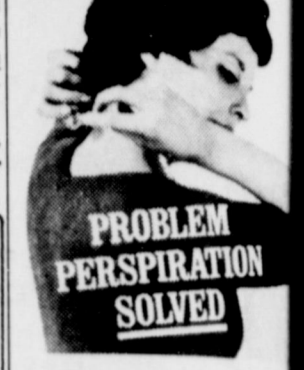

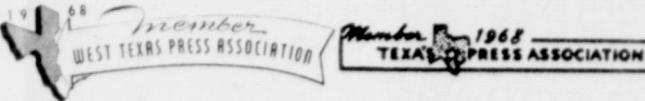

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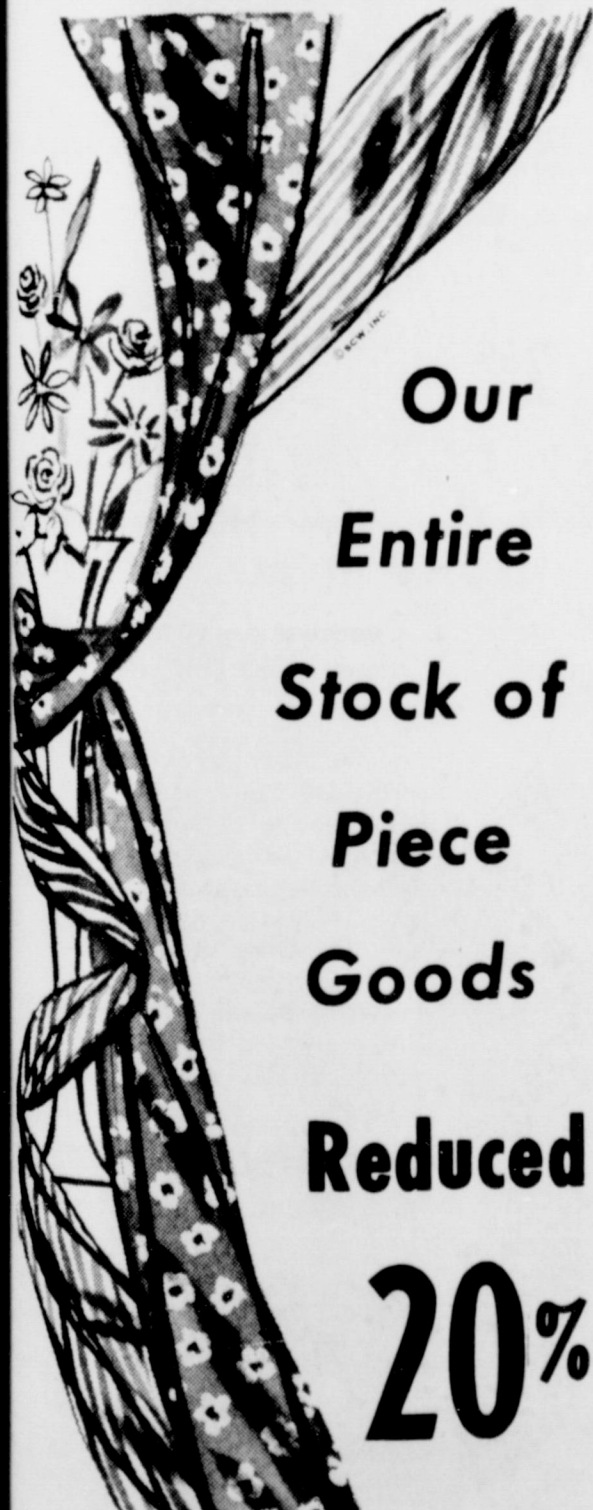
