## Jaycee Bike Rodeo Is This Saturday

The Tahoka Jaycee Bike Rodeo will be held this Saturday afternoon, with registration open from 9-10 a. m. at the Community Center. During registration, each contestant will be given a number for identification by contest officials.

Each contestant must furnish his bicycle, pay a 25c entry fee and have a parent to sign a liability release. The releases will be available at the Community Center or parents can sign the one published in the News. Three-speed bikes are prohibited in all races.

Following registration, an officer from the Department of Public Safety will give a talk on bike safety. The safety program is mandatory for all contestants.

Races will begin at 2 p. m. on the east side of the square. All racers will run in their age groups, 6 through 17 and over. Groups will be divided for boys and girls.

The Jaycees urge all kids to participate and invite the public to attend.

Tahoka Eastern Star Chapter will serve refreshments on the north side of the courthouse, in the Jaycee trailer.

## Bulldogs Lasso Cowboys In 58-7 Victory Friday

The Bulldogs lassoed the Plains Cowboys Friday night, roping in 58 points for their third win. The Cowboys grabbed off a touchdown and extra for seven points in the final 26 seconds of the game.

The rains came during the second period making for unsteady footing and slippery ball handling. However the soaker did not dampen the Bulldog's spirits, with the locals dominating the game.

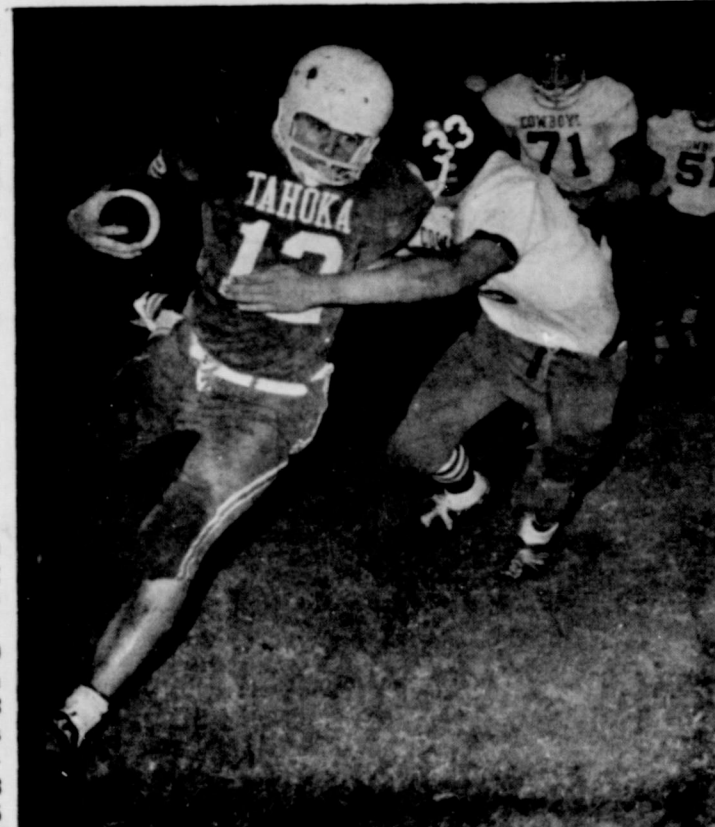
Larry Arnold tipped the pay scales for a TD during the first period, going in from one yard out. He found

Charlie Brown led off in the fourth from five yards out with McCord finding the up-rights again.

Greg Thomas jumped in from one yard out making the score 52-0. Brown found two more yards for pay dirt ending the Bulldog scoring.

Gary Liles, Cowboy tailback, scampered 79 yards for their TD, with John Lowe kicking the extra.

Stats show Tahoka earning 20 first downs and Plains 20. The Bulldogs piled up 384 yards net rushing and being penalized 12 times for 120 yards.

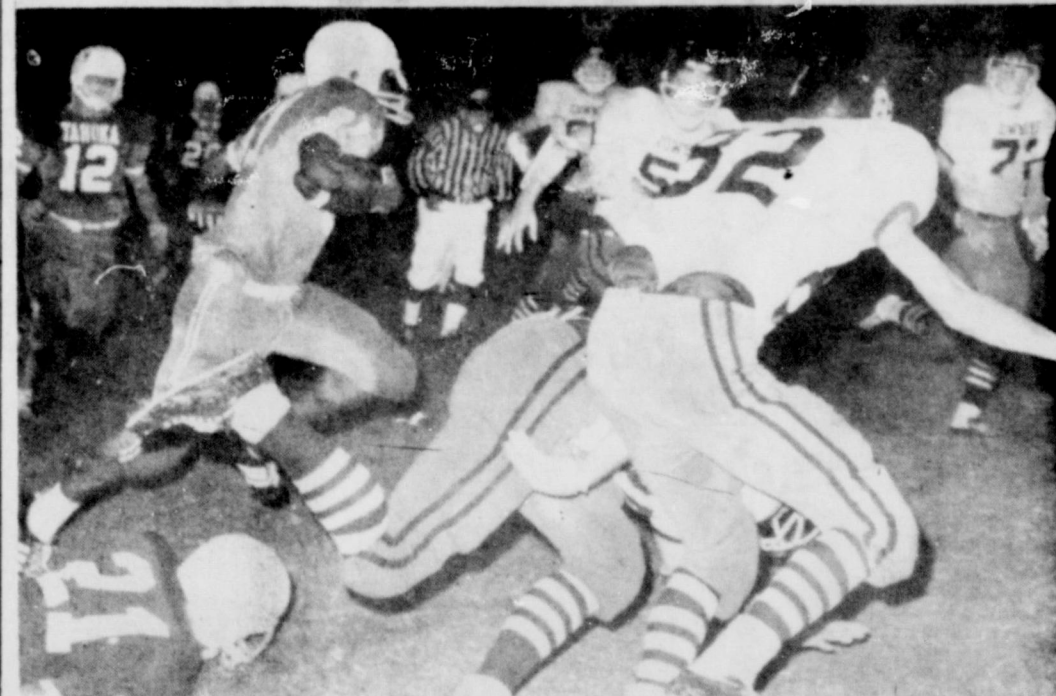


CHARLIE Brown was looking for wide open spaces as a Cowboy tries to fence him in. Redwine Photo

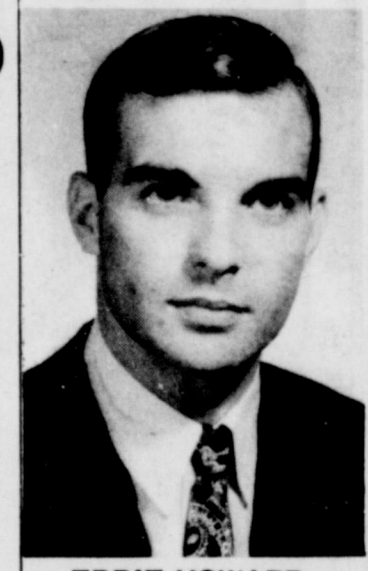
## Church Will Hold Ordination Service

## Lynn County Is Included In Plains Irrigation Survey

Farmers and businessmen in Lynn County will want to obtain a copy of the 1968 High Plains Irrigation Survey now available at the County Extension Office, reports County Agricultural Agent Bill Griffin. The survey contains loads of valuable information on irrigation in Lynn County as well as 41 other counties in the Panhandle and South Plains.

For instance, says Griffin, the survey gives the total number of irrigated farms, irrigation wells and current irrigated acreage for each county. It also shows the irrigated and dryland acreages for individual crops and pasture and sprinkler irrigation methods. Data on the kind of fuels used by the irrigation power units are also a part of the survey.

In addition, trends over the past 10 years in irrigated acreages of major crops are included in the report, points out Griffin. Other trends shown are pump capacities, pumping lifts and the number of wells required to supply water.

The survey is prepared annually by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, having been published since the early 1950's when irrigation in the High Plains really began to boom.

All the facts and figures on each county in the irrigation survey are obtained through the efforts of the county agricultural agent.

Winners of the county contest, Tuesday night at Tahoka, will be taking part in the district meet.

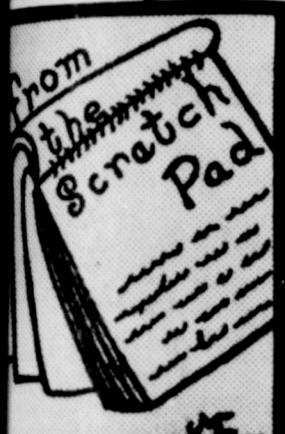

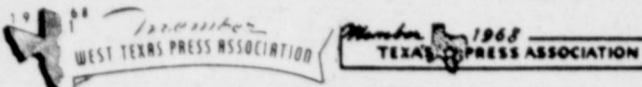

**The Y. O.-Top Texas Hunting**  
Some 30 odd miles north west of Kerrville, on highways 41 and 83 south of Junction sprawls the huge Y. O. Ranch.

This famous 73,000 acre ranch, owned by Charles Schreiner III and capably managed by Mr. Bobby Snow, has long been a hunting paradise not only for the elusive whitetail deer, but for turkey, quail, dove and now exotic game animals as well.

As their beautifully illustrated brochure points out, the Y. O. has long been an important producer of beef, sheep, goats, wool, and mohair since founded by Charles Schreiner I in 1880.

This writer and friend.

Carroll Best, visited the Y. O. on the first opening days of archery season to try our skill in bagging one of the big bucks, so numerous on the ranch.

Primarily, the Y. O. is set up for the avid gun hunter, guaranteeing hunters an 8 point or better buck or no pay! This policy has now been copied by others, but never have I seen bucks more plentiful nor more heavy antlered than on the Y. O.

Realizing the growing trend for bowhunting, the Y. O. has set aside a special archery pasture for archers with permanent stands built near well used game trails.

In three sessions of stand hunting, I saw 12 bucks, (most being just out of range), 17 does and 6 fawns and accounted for shots at three bucks.

In an afternoon attempt at stalking, we saw 5 more does and 2 fawns. The point to make here is that more deer were seen and more shots taken than on any previous bowhunting trip made within the last 5 years.

I personally guarantee any hunter a bad case of buck fever after completing the 8 mile drive to the ranch headquarters from highway 41.

Recently the Y. O. has opened pastures for the hunting of imported, exotic or toxic as they are known on the Y. O.) animals. It's common to see Fallow deer, Blackbuck antelope, Sika deer, Corsican Rams and Aoudad sheep on various parts of the ranch.

Others not available to hunters are: the Fringe Eared Oryx, Elands, Grants Zebras, Siberian Ibex, and an Asiatic antelope called the Nilgai. These animals have not grown in sufficient numbers to warrant hunting.

There are many delightful things to see and be a part of on the Y. O.

For example, four authentic log cabins have been restored on the ranch to house hunters in modern comfort. All date back to the 1800's with the earliest being the Sam Houston Cabin built in 1852 and which was the first school at Center Point, Texas. The other cabins date from 1858 to 1880 and are authentic in every detail. Two of the cabins are marked with Texas historical markers.

The Y. O. maintains a herd of more than 200 Texas Longhorn cattle, the first such herd ever registered in the world.

Guides and transportation are furnished each hunter on the ranch. Meals may be taken at the Y. O. Chuckwagon, and I might add, are quite delicious!

Hunting fees depend upon the value you place on your hunting. For trophy hunters the fees are in line, for you are guaranteed a trophy animal on the Y. O. An 8 point or better Whitetail buck will cost you \$150. The wild Corsican Ram will go for \$300 and all other exotic game runs \$400.

Bowhunters are charged \$15 per day for the Whitetail deer hunting, but regular rates apply on the toxic animals, gun and bows alike. A lawyer from Bryan bagged a beautiful Blackbuck antelope running at full speed and in the top of a leap with bow and arrow. Bowhunter kill average on the Y. O. runs about 10% compared to a national average of about 3%.

Personally, I intend to return to the Y. O. for a chance at another "big one". The facilities are excellent, the game plentiful and the people are courteous and friendly. They work in every way possible to assure the hunter a good hunt and a trophy if he has the needed skill.

Ranch biologist, Charlie Land and guide, Pat Flenniken were especially courteous and helpful to the group of bowhunters there on opening day.

I appreciate these kind of people and will recommend them and the Y. O. highly.

where there is fire is extremely dangerous. 5. When the house is clear of people, notify the fire department. Know how to do it quickly and correctly, from a neighbor's phone or a street alarm box.

**Linda Cribbs,

What is the newest, most fashionable in fabrics for fall? Leather-like materials. The leather-like fabrics duplicate many of the new looks in real leather.

Three types of this new fabric are available by the yard. One is a vinyl surface with cotton knit backing. It comes in light to heavy weight with smooth or a tiqued finish in a variety of colors. Some are machine washable but should not be ironed.

The cotton canvas has a resin or polyurethane coated outer surface. This type may be ironed carefully on the wrong side and washed and dry cleaned.

The third, nylon knit, has a soft, sleek kid-like surface which may be washed and pressed lightly.

Leather-like materials are showing up in skirts, vests, jackets and jumpers as well as rainwear and accessory items such as tote bags, hats and belts.

Sewing techniques used on leather-like fabrics are similar to those for vinyl and real leather.

Select a pattern with simple lines. Raglan and kimono sleeves are easier than set in sleeves.

In cutting the fabric, pin pattern to seam allowances only. Use sharp shears and cut accurately. To mark the pattern, Linda suggests dressmakers' carbon and a smooth edge tracing wheel to mark from the wrong side.

Stitch a test seam on the sewing machine before beginning. From this determine correct pressure and tension. It should be medium tension and light pressure. Linda recommends 8 to 12 stitches per inch for stitch length; a 14 size needle for medium weight fabrics and 16 for heavy weights; and heavy duty mercerized cotton thread for construction.

Plain seams will roll and they cannot be ironed flat. Flatten seams with rubber cement or adhesive.

Taper darts to a very fine point. The last three to four stitches should be on the fold. Don't backstitch.

Linda recommends using a tailor's hem, picking up one or two threads in backing. Don't pull the stitches tight or the garment will pucker on the right side.

Another tip: do not baste the seams but pin them in the seam allowances.

If the leather sticks to the machine's metal surface when sewing, use a strip of tissue paper between them.

She also suggests to use reinforcement in buttons and neckline areas to prevent stretching.

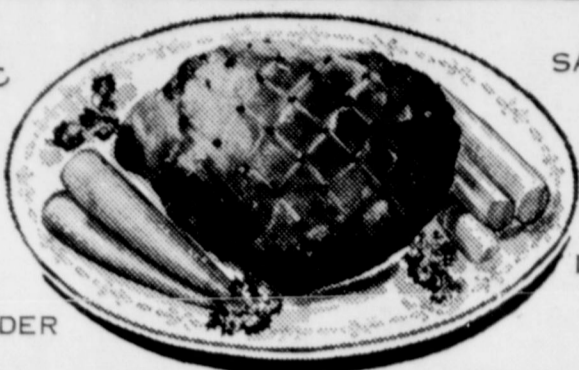

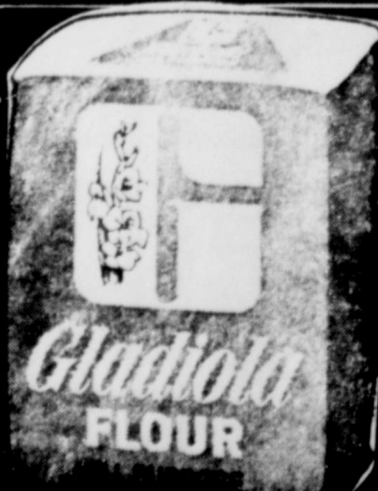
