

Thursday a5ternoon about 3:30 a man plowing in the field about 200 yards east of Mr. Hester's house found the body of a youth with the top part of the face shot away. The alarm was given about thirty-five miles an hour and when Mr. Campbell reached the scene of the tradgedy he identified the body as that of his son, Ed.

Death was produced by the discharge of a 12 gauge shotgun in the mouth. Ed had tied one end of a string to the trigger and the other end to his toe, placed the muzzle in his mouth and pulled the trieger with his foot. Considering that the body had lain for two days and nights exposed to the weather it was in a good state of prerervation.

Poor health and despondency are atteibuted as the cause of his action.

Burial services were held at the O'Donnell cemetery today, Friday.



The House Reliable March 31 to April 7 Dress up Week



Raise More Food



POOR FORM OF RELIGION.


Many a man thinks he is religious because he prays to the Lord to relieve him from the consequences of his own misdeeds.

No need to go to the expense of fen ceing them. If there is a road running across your vacant lot, just put a barracade across it. break up your lot and plant it. Further along in his statement he says: "It is the patriotic duty of every city boy of girl who can to transform his or her yard, or some nearby vacant lot into a garben, each square foot of which will grow two or three crops during the coming summer.


