THE EDITOR VISITS A PRACTICAL FARMER

THOMAS BROS. OPEN BRANCH AT O'DONNELL

Last Saturday, Sam Montgomery took the editor in company with his father and Henry White in the latter's car to his farm two miles north of Tahoka on an inspection visit to see his recently imported registered Holstein cattle of the World Record family of Segis-Fayne strain:

Sam's motto is less stock and better stock. He contends that a farm animal that will pay for its keep and its self every year is a good investment for the farmer. And in introducing his Holstein cows he makes the farmer this proposition: If said farmer will take one of his cows, tend to her according to his instructions and feed her according to his schedule of rations, he will pay for the feed and give the farmer the cow at the end of the year for the proceeds of the milk and butter fat the cow produces. This is not an experimental venture, as breeders of these cattle have proved that cows sold on this plan have netted them larger profit than straight sales. Mr. Montgomery has a male of this breed of cattle whose sire sold for \$12,500 in New York.

Sam next showed us a pen of registered Durock Jersey pigs, he is also going in for fine chickens.

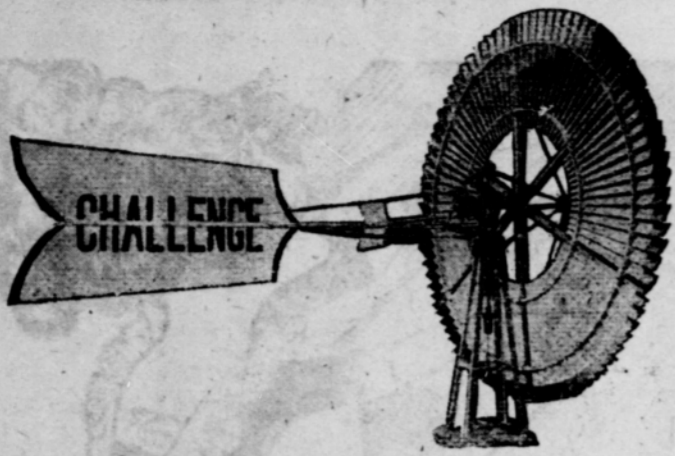

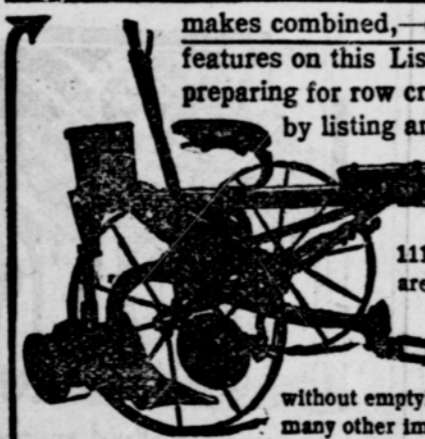

**YOUTH COMMITS
SUICIDE AT O'DONNELL**

Ed. Campbell, age 17, committed suicide near O'Donnell Tuesday night. Ed told his parents the first of the week that he intended to look for a job and when he failed to appear Wednesday morning they were not uneasy, thinking he had gone to Tahoka or New Mexico, at which places he has sisters.

Thursday afternoon about 3:30 a man plowing in the field about 200 yards east of Mr. Hester's house found the body of a youth with the top part of the face shot away. The alarm was given and when Mr. Campbell reached the scene of the tragedy he identified the body as that of his son, Ed.

Death was produced by the discharge of a 12 gauge shotgun in the mouth. Ed had tied one end of a string to the trigger and the other end to his toe, placed the muzzle in his mouth and pulled the trigger with his foot. Considering that the body had lain for two days and nights exposed to the weather it was in a good state of preservation.

Poor health and despondency are attributed as the cause of his action. Burial services were held at the O'Donnell cemetery today, Friday.

Ed Campbell was a brother of Mrs. J. A. Gamble, of Tahoka.

**CAR ACCIDENTS
ARE NUMEROUS**

Two Dodge cars met in a head-on collision at the top of the hill near the old Chisum place six miles south of Tahoka on the Tahoka-O'Donnell road Monday morning. Robt. Read, of Lamese, was driving one car, and Shed Weathers, - Montgomery, of the Montgomery Brothers tailor shop, Mr. Chauncy, a traveling man, and his chauffeur were in the other car. Both cars were driving at the rate of about thirty-five miles an hour when they went together, and it was indeed miraculous that the accident did not terminate seriously for some of the occupants. Each car lost a wheel and fender and sustained other minor bends and breaks. The occupants were not injured.

Two other collisions were reported this week. Ira Doak and a tourist collided Sunday, and Jim Keever and a car from a nearby town ran together on the O'Donnell road the first of the week.

These collisions are not the fault of the drivers in most instances but the fault of the roads. In most instances where the drivers should turn according to the law of the road, the roads are cut up by gullies or deep ruts to such an extent that it is more dangerous to try to turn out than to drive straight ahead.

**March 31 to April
7 Dress up Week**

H. L. Bently of the State Dept of Agriculture was in the News office Wednesday on his way to Post City to hold a farmers meeting and while here talked to the editor about conditions of the roads in this immediate vicinity. He and Mr. Marks, also of the department have covered the counties of Lubbock, Terry, Dawson and Lynn during the past week in an automobile, and he says there is a world of work that needs to be done on the roads of these counties. Long time bonds are the only solution of our road problem he tells us speaking of good roads in particular and other improvements in general. He remarked that little could be accomplished without co-operation, and co-operation was not possible without efficient organization.

Raise More Food

Under date of March 24th, the assistant secretary of the United States Dept. of Agriculture, Carl Vroman, issued a statement urging that as a patriotic duty city residents transform their yards into gardens and farmers so diversify their crops so as to make each section self sustaining. The great need in time he said, would make a surplus of wheat with which we could feed our allies. He also declared acreage of soy beans and cow peas should be increased to argument the resources for proteins which in emergency could replace the meat for human consumption.

Two or three crops of some kind should be raised during the coming summer, he said, on every vacant square foot in the cities.

Not only as a matter of economic necessity, but for the reason of individual prosperity, in these times of high prices would the above policy be advantageous to the citizens of Tahoka. A garden will do more to solve the high cost of living than any other one thing.

Another reason that the vacant lots in Tahoka should be put into cultivation is that many of them have been defaced by road running across them and cultivation would make more desirable building places of them. No need to go to the expense of fencing them. If there is a road running across your vacant lot, just put a barricade across it, break up your lot and plant it.

Further along in his statement he says: "It is the patriotic duty of every city boy of girl who can to transform his or her yard, or some nearby vacant lot into a garden, each square foot of which will grow two or three crops during the coming summer.

"Moreover, the average small farmer and his family owe it to their country as well as themselves to raise at least 100 chickens and keep one or more cows at least enough eggs for home consumption and perhaps a bunch of sheep.

Thomas Andrew Brown

Thomas Andrew Brown, died March 27 at 12:25 a. m. at his home in the southwest part of Tahoka and was laid to rest in the Tahoka cemetery the same day at 3:30 p. m.

Uncle Tom, as Mr. Brown was known everyone, was born Aug. 2, 1840 in Jackson Tenn., and then moved to Pontotoc, Miss., when a baby. At the age of seven his parents moved to Palestine, Texas, which place Uncle Tom made his home for 60 years he came to Lynn county in Oct. 1907 and lived here until death claimed him.

In 1866 T. A. Brown and Miss Nancy Aiken were united in matrimony to which union one son was born. C. E. Brown of Tahoka. Mrs. Nancy Brown died about 1887 and in 1890 Mr. Brown married Miss Dora Cox. To this union three children were born a girl and two boys. The boys P. G. and J. C. Brown, both of Tahoka, survive. The girl died in childhood.

Uncle Tom served four years in the Texas Cavalry under Krum and Hood. He has always been a staunch Democrat and for the past 25 years a member of the Methodist Church.

At the time death overtook him, Uncle Tom had attained the age of 76 years, seven months and 25 days; honored and respected by all who knew him, he has been intimately associated with the development of Lynn county since he made his home here. Another of the Southern sons who wore the grey so nobly thru the four years of suffering has answered the last call of mortal man and is now bivouacked with the fast increasing host on the other side of the river.

The whole community suffered severe loss in the death of Uncle Tom and The News joins them in extending our heartfelt sympathy to the bereaved family in the dark hour of their parting.

Should Future Generations Pay?

In all large public undertakings where permanent improvements were sought to be made it has become a custom to issue long-time bonds in order to secure the money with which to finance the work.

Probably nine-tenths of the counties of nine-tenths of the states of the union are bonded to a greater or less extent, and scarcely a city or town of any importance in the land but carries its bonded debt that has gone to pay for public utilities.

But in many cases the advocates of the bond issue have had hard fights to carry their projects through. One of the most serious objections has always been from the man who

"doesn't believe in saddling a debt on future generations."

Now let us see about this. Suppose, for instance, our country had no railroad. For generations our ancestors, and we ourselves, have laboriously hauled in our supplies and hauled out our products, realizing, when all expenses were met, but a meagre pittance for our years work.

But a railroad is projected and we are told if we bond our county for a few hundred thousand dollars, it will be put to rest. This we do. Now arises the objection that we have placed a heavy debt on posterity. Have we?

Yes. But at the same time we have given posterity the means to pay that debt and then be in-

initely better off than we and our fathers were.

Compare for a moment the difference in their condition, and ours before the road was built.

The average country is about twenty five miles wide. Supposing that represented the distance to the nearest shipping point. Do you see the enormous saving we have effected for posterity in bringing the road to their doors?

Again; take the question of pikes. The same reasoning will hold good there. Whereas we and our fathers toiled through mud and mire to drag fifteen or

twenty bushels of grain to market, our sons can crank up their truck and take a load of two or three thousand pounds with ease and in much less time than we needed.

And so on through the list of all permanent, or at least as nearly permanent as our best judgement can make it. When we have builded to the best of our ability and have lain a ground work on which our children can continue to build; we have not only benefited ourselves and not injured them, but we have benefited them, and made it possible to attain to conditions that were entirely beyond our reach.

A debt on posterity is just, provided it represents a tangible asset.
