## Lyntegar Meet Big Event In Tahoka

### 4,900 Attend This Year

Lyntegar Electric held its 31 Annual Meeting Tuesday, Aug. 12, with 4,900 attending the get-together at the Tahoka Bulldog Football Field. This event brings more people to Tahoka than probably any other event of the year.

Calloway Huffaker was master of ceremonies with the Rev. Jim Turner giving the invocation. Harold Reynolds gave the welcoming address.

Registration for the meeting began at 7:00 p.m. and the serving of barbecue started at 7:30.

The Business Meeting got underway at 8:30 and was called to order by President Frank Harris. The President said that it was again his pleasure to report that the affairs of your cooperative continue in excellent condition.

Checks will be in the mail soon to refund 1968 Capital Credits in the amount of \$292,203.24.

In the election of Directors Howard Moore was re-elected. Lyntegar Electric is now serving parts of 13 counties with 5,012 miles of line.

### Lynn Countians To Elect Director

Lynn County cotton producers and businessmen will elect a businessman director to Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. for the coming two-year period at 8 p.m. August 21 in the Lyntegar Room, Tahoka.

The announcement of the election meeting was made jointly by Ardis Pace of O'Donnell, current businessman director, and Joe D. Unfred of New Home, producer director from Lynn County.

The 25-county cotton producer organization, with headquarters in Lubbock, has two directors from each county, one a businessman and the other a cotton producer. Businessman directors are elected on odd-numbered years and producer directors on even years, each for a two year term.

Both farmers and businessmen participate in the election of all directors.

Urging that all interested parties make an effort to attend, Unfred said "The future of cotton on the Plains is dependent on better production practices, better markets and better cotton programs, and PCG is the regional organization that works to bring these

things to pass."

He emphasized that directors to PCG are the men who set the organization's policy on legislative, research, promotion, financial and other activities which help to build a better economy on the Plains.

A representative of the PCG staff will be on hand to conduct the meeting, review PCG activities on behalf of Plains cotton and answer any questions which may be raised, Unfred said.

### Conference Of County Bureau Presidents To Be Held In Austin

Howard Moore, president of the Lynn County Farm Bureau has announced that he will attend a statewide conference of county Farm Bureau presidents to be held Aug. 18 at the Terrace Motor Hotel in Austin.

Purpose of the conference is to consider recommendations of a special Study Committee appointed earlier this year by Texas Farm Bureau President Sidney Dean to study the state organization's structure and operating procedure. The committee completed its work last month and made its report to the TFB board of directors July 29 in Waco. The board accepted the report and set the Aug. 18 meeting so that the recommendations of the six-member Study Committee could be explained in detail to county leaders. Following the Austin meeting, the county presidents are expected to take the proposals back to their home coun-

ties to be considered in the Farm Bureau's policy development process which begins on the county level. After consideration at county conventions in October, the counties' recommendations on the proposals will be submitted to the state convention which will be held in November in San Antonio. Voting delegates from County FBs adopt policies for the Texas Farm Bureau.

Gordon Morrow, San Benito, Cameron County, is chairman of the special committee which was appointed by President Dean in April. Other members are Alton Adams, Ferris, Ellis County; Frank Dailey, Grapeland, Houston County; Lawrence Hartman, Fredericksburg, Gillespie County; Everett Miller, Tulia, Swisher County; and John Huebner, Jr., Matagorda County. All are either presidents or past presidents of their county FBs.

(Editor's note: The Sandhills Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm examines inflation a little bit this week.)

Dear editor:

According to a newspaper I was reading this morning to get my mind off the last line on my July bank statement, the United States treasury is amazed to find it has a 3 billion-dollar budget surplus, and a lot of economists are worrying about it.

The reason they're worried is that they're afraid the surplus will produce more inflation.

At a time when the more a man makes the harder it is to make a living, the last thing we need is more inflation, but the economists who are worrying about the surplus just don't have enough confidence in the government.

While it's true the government was caught off-guard, you might say is temporarily embarrassed, by the surplus, I believe it will get hold of itself, come to its senses, and emerge in a few months with some plan to achieve an over-draft.

Once you let Congress understand it has an inflationary surplus on hand, you'll see more anti-inflationary legislation thought up than we've got the road construction equipment to build it with, or the dam construction equipment, etc.

Up to now, fighting inflation has been a worrisome thing because nobody knew where to start, but once you convince Congress the way to do it is to eliminate a surplus and we'll have it whipped faster than that snowball melts you know where.

Provided, of course, the economists are right. You've got to remember though that the economists themselves were caught

off-guard by the surplus, as they'd predicted just the opposite.

I have long contended that economists are like weather forecasters. They're good at telling you what happened yesterday but a little shaky about what's going to happen tomorrow.

By and large, the law says his wife comes first. Take this case: A man was haled into court by his wife for non-support. In his defense, he explained: "I give every nickel I make to my elderly parents. I just feel they need the money more than we do." But the court decided this was no excuse, and ordered him to start



taking care of his wife. The judge said she had first claim on his earnings. A similar principle applies to the family domicile. A man accused his wife of desertion, after she walked out on him. But in court, she pointed out that she had good reason for leaving: her husband allowed his mother not only to live with them but also to run the household with an iron hand. court said: "When a man marries and founds a new family, he assumes new duties. When these conflict with his former ties, they must be held paramount. The very existence of the family depends on this principle. Whatever his filial obligations may be, a man may not bring his mother to reside in his new home. That place belongs to the wife." Nevertheless, the law does not insist on total estrangement of a husband from his parents. In another case, a man brought

his ailing, elderly mother into his home—partly for the sake of sentiment, partly for the sake of economy. However, it was his wife, not his mother, who had full charge of managing the household. Was this husband falling down on his marital obligations? This time, a court said no. The judge said that, although a wife does rank as Number One, she still must make fair and reasonable adjustments to reality—to make the marriage work. © 1969 American Bar Association

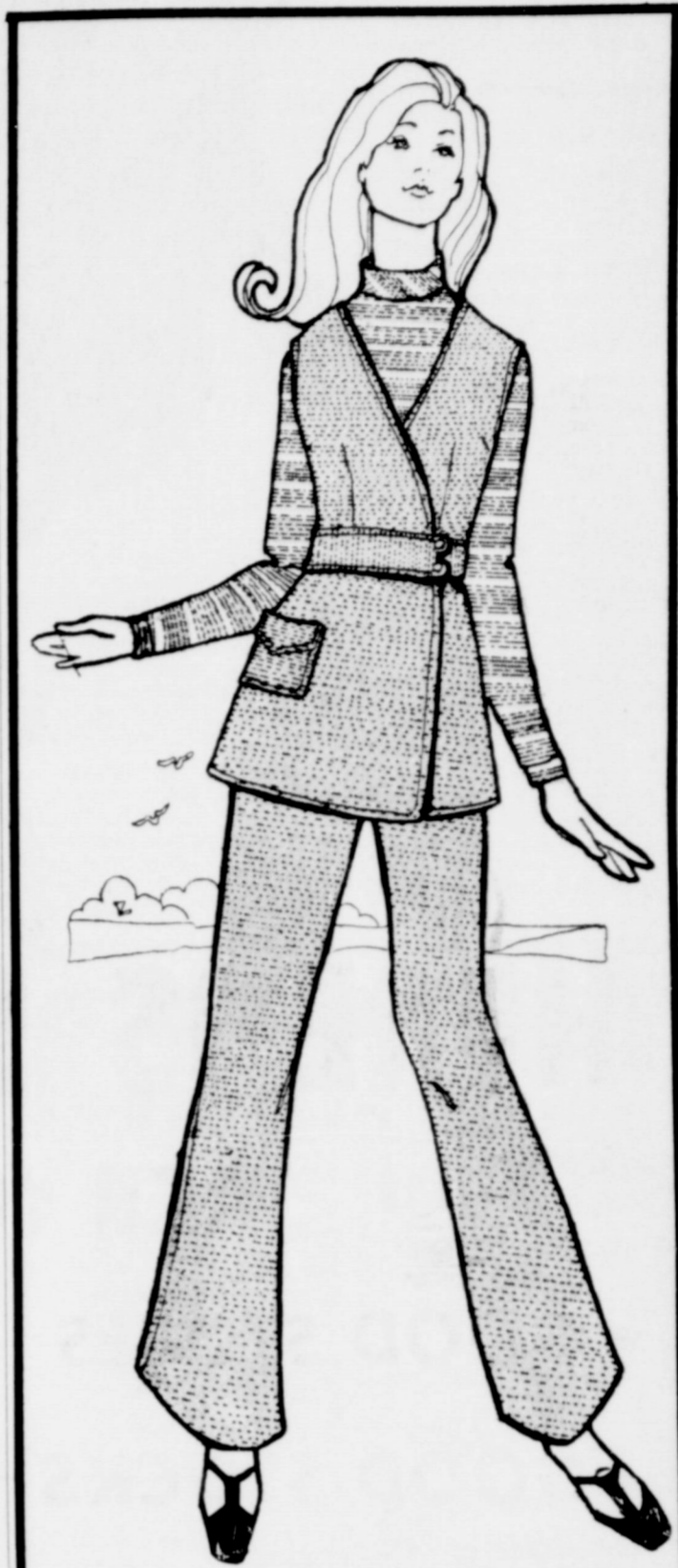

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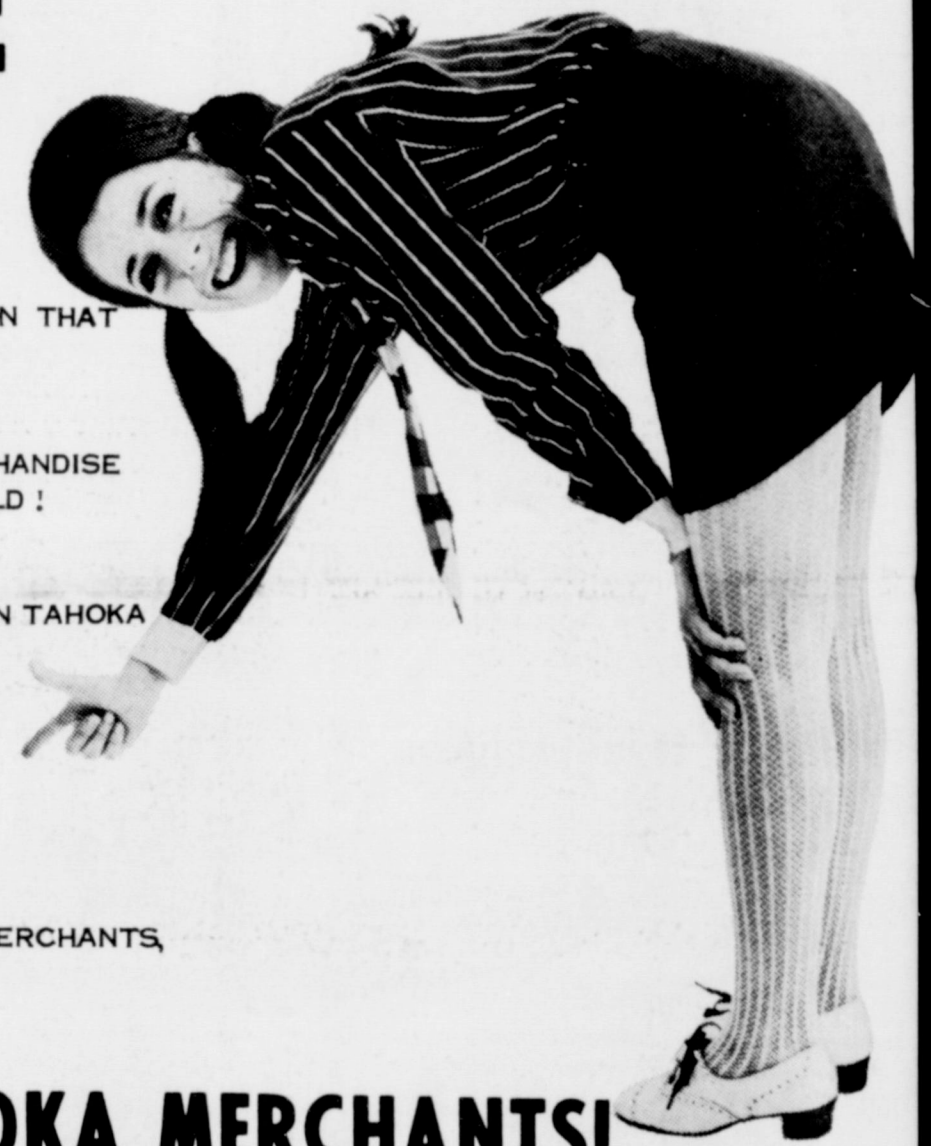

### CHAOS IN CONSTRUCTION

One of the greatest problems facing us today is adequate housing for American families within their financial ability to rent or buy.

There has been utter confusion as to where the housing responsibility lies. Some say, "Let Uncle Sam do it with public projects." But overburdened taxpayers, including those in need of housing, see the dangers of this approach.

Some earnest citizens blame zoning laws, others the building codes. These points are debatable. The basic answer may be found in a single word: money.

The National Association of Manufacturers has become concerned with the accelerating building costs and has published a study entitled, "Chaos in the Construction Industry."

The opening paragraph sums up the story: "Labor conditions in the \$90 billion construction industry have reached proportions which demand the urgent attention of both the private and public sectors. Aggravated by highly inflationary contract settlements, excessive work stoppages and stifling work practices, the labor problems in this industry present a dramatic threat to the national economy as well as to the industry in general."

While the private non-farm economy experienced a 2.9 per cent annual increase in productivity from 1959 to 1966, the construction industry experienced a .3 per cent annual decrease in productivity for the same period. The median wage increases in construction have gone up three times that of other industries.

Isn't it about time that labor leaders consider their responsibility to the public in this issue?

## Japan Launches Her First Atomic-Powered Ship



Using a silver axe to sever the launching rope while 5,000 people cheered, Japan's Crown Princess Michiko launched her nation's first nuclear-powered vessel, the "Mutsu," at a Tokyo shipyard recently.

Technicians are installing a reactor in the ship and testing will begin in March, 1971. The pressurized-water reactor, fueled by 2.8 tons of low-enriched uranium oxide (enough to take the ship seven times around the world without refueling), will operate a 10,000 horsepower steam turbine which will give the ship a cruising speed of 16.5 knots.

Fifteen crewmen are being readied to man the 8,350 ton Mutsu, which will be a training ship. She will also be used for hauling special cargoes such as nuclear fuels.

The Mutsu, the world's fourth atomic-powered merchant ship, follows the icebreaker, Lenin, of the Soviet Union, the freighter, Savannah, of the United States, and the ore-carrier, Otto Hahn, of the Federal Republic of Germany. Another nuclear ship is already on planning boards in Japan.

KNOW IT ALL FISHERMEN

Did you ever notice how the fisherman who "knows it all" is usually the one with the fewest and smallest fish at the end of the day? He's also the guy who doesn't ask any questions, and probably wouldn't accept advice no matter how well-meaning it is.

Our unfortunate angler's problem is that his knowledge gets in the way of his ability to observe and ask questions. For this is the way most successful anglers learn what's happening. They don't assume they know everything.

Fortunately, most good fishermen are eager to pass their knowledge onto others. This has special significance to anglers about to try out unfamiliar waters, say the fishing authorities at Mercury outdoors. One of the best ways to find what fish are biting, and when and where to go, is to be at the dock when fishing boats return from a day on the lake.

A few minutes spent conversing with today's lucky anglers may enrich your fishing tomorrow. Not that they'll tell all their secrets, of course, but you can usually pick up enough information to make tomorrow's trip more productive.

Also, since most anglers end the day fishing with the lure that's brought them the most success, you'll gain added information by noticing what plugs are still hanging from the rods.

Bait fishermen can take advantage of docks with fish cleaning stations by inspecting the fish caught that day and seeing what they've been eating.

The real knowledgeable fishermen, say the lads at Mercury, are those who know they don't know it all.
