

Vehicle Registration Laws Are Confusing To Many Local Persons

Many persons are still confused about changes and requirements in the 1968 vehicle registration, causing unnecessary delay in purchasing vehicle tags. George McCracken, Lynn

County Tax Assessor-Collector emphasises the importance of remembering to bring your certificate of title and 1967 tag receipt when buying 1968 tags. "Under no circumstances can we register your vehicle and sell tags without these two items," says McCracken. Also needed is your correct address and Zip Code.

Tags must be purchased in the county in which you reside. Registration will be continued until April 1. which is deadline for displaying new tags.

Crop Program Deadline Is Fri. March 15

Producers are reminded that March 15 is the last day for filing applications to take part in the 1968 cotton, feed grain, and wheat programs. Bertice Askew. Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee, points out that only producers who sign up and then participate in the program will be eligible for price support and diversion payments if applicable to the

program. As of 2-29-68, 593 cotton farms had signed up to divert 18.033 acres or 23.48% of their allotment. The maximum cotton acres that could be diverted is 35%

Functions And Services Of County Presented At Rotary

Lynn County is in sound financial condition, Judge V. F. Jones, told Rotarians Thursday in a talk in which he explained some of the functions and services of the county government.

Theoretically. Lynn County property has a value of \$85 million, but County and State value taxable property in this county at 20 percent of its actual value, or \$17 million for tax purposes.

Lynn's tax rate is \$1.15 per \$100 valuation, compared to a state average of \$1.06. Duval County has the highest rate, \$2.10, and Kendall County, the lowest, 55 cents. In Lynn, 20 cents goes to retire bonded indebtedness, which has now been reduced to \$203,000, and 95 cents of the \$1.15 goes for

This year's county budget

is \$374,000. Of the total funds required for operation. \$180,000 comes from taxes on real and personal property. The county gets the first \$50,000 from auto registrations, and half of the next amounts up to \$175,000, then progressively less of greater amount, with the remainder going to the State.

Funds from car registrations, plus about \$34,000 lateral road funds rebated by State of Texas from the gasoline tax fund, are divided amoung the four commissioners' precincts, each receiving about \$34,000 for road maintenance.

Other county funds include about \$20,000 annually from the Justice of the Peace courts and \$18,000 to \$20,000 from the County Clerk from fees, fines, etc.

Mr. Jones explained the Commissioners Court is actually an administrative body. requiring good business judgment, as well as ability to look after rural roads. He says each commissioner

has about \$100,000 worth of road machinery. All is now free of debt, but each must be looking to the future in order to make machinery re-

Right now, the State is | spending about \$1.8 million of road improvements here. including the bypass of downtown Tahoka which will be completed this summer and the rebuilding of the farm road from US 380 south to the Midway area.
