Highway Patrol Investigate Seven Accidents In Aug.

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated seven accidents on rural highways in Lynn County during the month of August, according to Sergeant Hale E. Pirtle, Highway Patrol supervisor of the area.

These crashes resulted in eight persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$6,735.00.

The rural accident summary for this county during the first eight months of 1969 shows a total of 49 accidents resulting in four persons killed, 47 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$50,727.00.

"The driver of a vehicle upon a highway outside of the limits of any incorporated city or town upon meeting or overtaking from either direction any school bus which has stopped on the highway for the purpose of receiving or discharging any school children shall stop the vehicle immediately before passing the school bus, but may then proceed past such school bus at a speed which is prudent, not exceeding ten (10) miles per hour, and with due caution for the safety of such children."

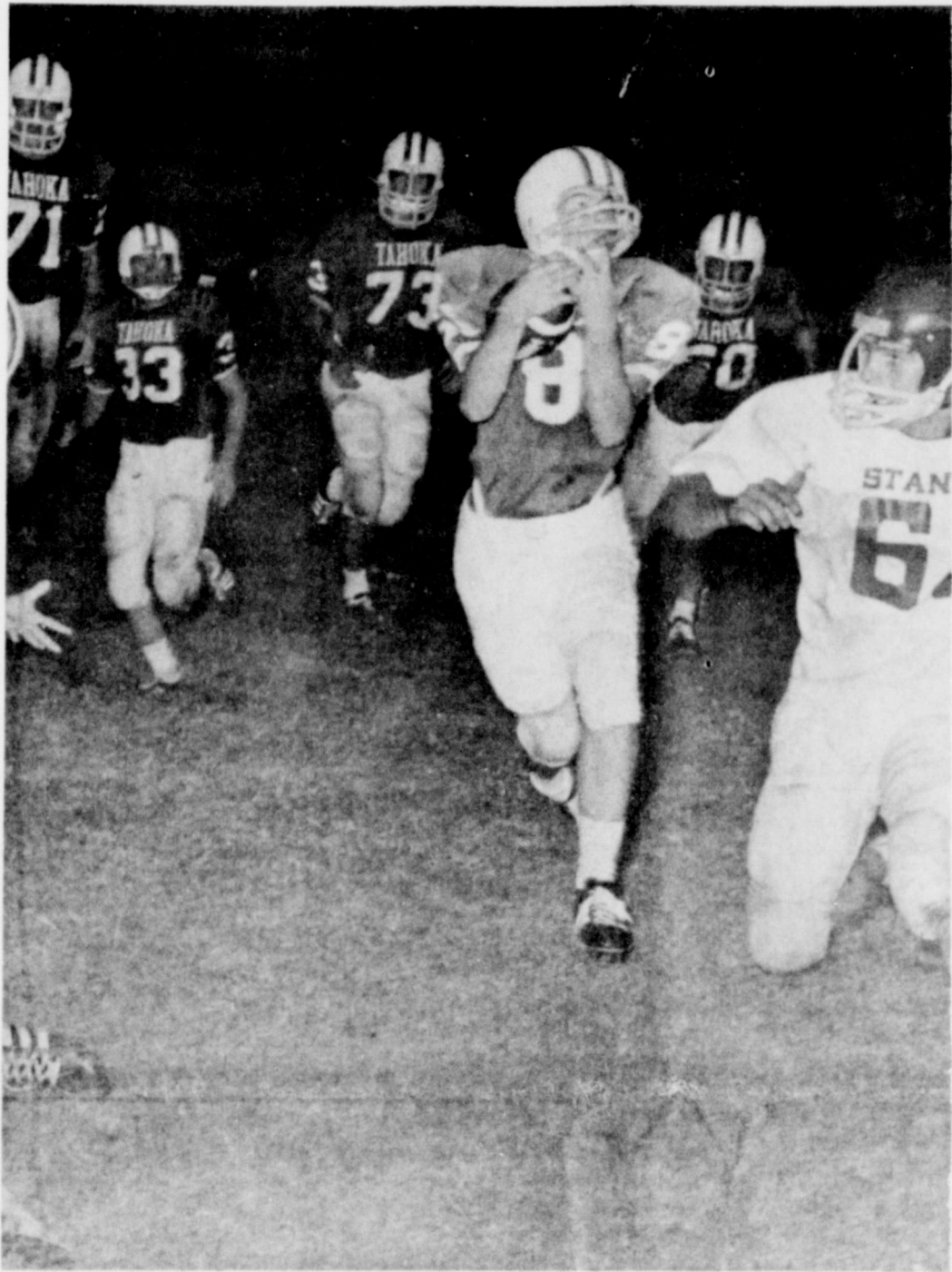
Thunderbirds To Be At Reese Air Force Base

Wilson Stomps Anton Bulldogs

The Wilson Mustangs, who are rated to be second in 6-B competition this year, stomped the Anton Bulldogs, Friday night 14-0.

The opening kickoff by the Mustangs was returned to Anton's 22 yard line by Williams. After three incomplete passes, Anton was forced to punt. Wilson took possession of the ball on the 38 yard line and drove for a touchdown in seven plays. This touchdown was made by Woody Follis on an off tackle play from nine yards out. The try for extra points was unsuccessful. The first quarter ended with a 6-0 lead by Wilson.

In the second quarter, the Mustangs took possession of the ball on their own 31 yard line and drove 69 yards for their second touchdown. Gaining the yardage were Steven Briger, Woody Follis and Steve Meador, with Briger taking it over for the touchdown. Quarterback John Earl Fields fooled the entire Anton defense to score the extra points. Making the score 14-0 Wilson's favor at the end of the half.

Wilson's defense limited Anton's offense to 29 yards total gain in the first half to Wilson offensive gains of 148 yards. The third quarter was scoreless. Again the Wilson defense stood firm allowing Anton's offense to gain 12 yards while the Mustangs gained 60 yards. In the final quarter the Mustang defense set the Bulldogs back for a 6 yard total rushing and passing. The fourth quarter ended with the score remaining 14-0 Wilson's favor.

Steven Briger led the Mustang offense with 145 yards on 23 carries followed by Woody Follis' 104 yards in 23 carries. Wingback Steve Meador

made the longest run for Wilson as he scampered 19 yards on a reverse.

Dan Lee Stone led the Wilson defense as he was in on 17 tackles. He was followed by Steve Meador, Steve Bednarz, Wayland Peterson, Woody Follis, Mike Koslan and Frank Lopez.

Treasury Commends Local Postmaster

WASHINGTON -- Postmaster Charles Townes today received commendations from Elmer L. Rustad, National Director of the U. S. Savings Bonds Division of the Department of the Treasury, for his outstanding service to the School Savings Program.

In his letter to the Postmaster, Mr. Rustad said, "You are indeed an important ally, as we work together to promote the sale of U. S. Savings Bonds and Stamps. . . We are again counting on your leadership in creating widespread acceptance of the program throughout your community".

Most of the schools in Lynn County offer School Savings, as part of the nationwide U. S. Savings Bonds Program. Savings Stamps are available in five denominations, from 10c to \$5, and are on sale at all times in Post Offices and on Stamp Days in the schools.

Pupils are provided stamp albums at no cost and, when they are filled, the albums of Savings Stamps may be exchanged for Savings Bonds at the family bank.

Postmaster Townes said, "My

associates and I are pleased and proud to continue this service to the young people of our community. The School Savings Program has been teaching thrift and good citizenship to our youngsters for 28 years. I know of no better way to encourage them to get started with the savings habit".

School Board Takes Action At Regular Meeting

The Board of Education met Thursday, September 11, for its regular monthly meeting. The minutes of the August meeting were approved and also the monthly bills were approved, and the 1969 tax rolls in the amount of \$13,858,275.

The board also renewed agreement with the firm of Pritchard and Abbott, Tax Valuation Engineers, to assist in the assessment of oil and utility properties for tax purposes. They also approved the firm of Douglas and Associates, of Lubbock, to make the annual audit of funds. The board approved participation in the Neighborhood Youth Corps Program for the current school year.

They approved amendment to the Capital Outlay Portion of the Current Budget and received reports such as financial statements, current enrollments, etc.

Sew It With Cotton Contest

Sponsored by the Lynn County Cotton Club to be held at Wilson High School, Monday, October 6, 1969, 7:30 p.m.

GENERAL RULES:
 A. Seamstress must be at least 9 years of age by date of contest.
 B. Model must be 6 yrs. of age or older.
 C. An original design or commercial pattern may be used.
 D. Items must be made especially for this contest.
 E. Not more than 2 garments per model.
 F. Model gets the prize.

MATERIALS:
 A. All cotton materials must be 100 percent domestic cotton. (not imported).
 B. All parts of the outer garment or garments, except trimming, must be 100 percent cotton.
 C. Trimming of rhinestones, fur, sequins, etc., will be accepted.
 D. Lining, innerlining and inner facings may be your choice of fabric.
 E. Cotton bonded to a synthetic is not allowed.
 F. A portion of your ensemble may not be bought ready-made. (For instance, if a blouse, skirt or similar item is needed, a ready-made one will not be accepted.)

JUDGING:
 A. Appearance - 100 percent
 1. Fit - 25 percent
 2. Eye Appeal - 25 percent
 3. Suitability of style, fabric, and color to model - 25 percent
 B. Contestants modeling ability will not be judged.
 C. Impartial judges will be chosen.
 D. One outstanding garment from combined categories will be chosen.
 E. Detailed workmanship will be considered in case of a tie and for outstanding garment.
 F. Prizes will be given in each category.

ENTRANTS:
 A. This contest is not limited to Cotton Club or Cotton Promotion Association members.
 B. Professional seamstresses MAY NOT enter. (currently employed Home Economics Instructors, Home Demonstration Agents, etc., who, through their profession come in constant contact with the 4 judging points

listed under appearance.) C. Women who sew for the public ARE NOT considered professionals and may enter garments for themselves or make garments for others.
 D. First place winners in each category or designated alternate form county contests will enter the district contest to be held at Levelland, October 11, 1969.

To be sure of purchasing U. S. manufactured materials, keep in mind that all reputable textile mills have the brand, location and name of the mill printed on the end of the bolt or on a tag attached to the end of the bolt. Extra entry blanks may be picked up at the stores within the county which handle patterns and dress fabric.

CATEGORIES. COUNTY AND DISTRICT CONTEST:
 The garment described in the first 4 categories may be made by any qualified seamstress. The garments in categories 5, 6, and 7 must be MODELED by the SEAMSTRESS.

1. Sugar Plum: Model, ages 6 through 12... better dress.
2. Sports: Model, ages 16 and over... short suits, pant dress, pants and tops, and western suits. (Long pants may include regular or bell bottoms...party pant suits not included.)
3. At Home Wear: Model, ages 16 and over... coffee coats, robes, hostess pajamas and sleep wear... (The At Home Wear must be garments not worn outside the home, which can be decently modeled.)
4. School Time: Model, ages 6 through 12... school dress or pant dress.
5. Junior Miss: Ages 9 through 13... one or two piece school dress. (Pant dress not included)
6. Teen Time: Ages 14 through 18... street dress or school dress. (Pant dress not included.)
7. Make and Model: Ages 19 and over... better dress, suit

or ensemble.
CATEGORIES. County Contest only. Not eligible for district contest:

1. Sports Wear-Make and Model: Ages 14-16 (In elementary or Junior High) short suits, pant dresses, pants and tops, and western suits. (Long pants may include regular or bell bottoms... party pant suits not included.)
2. At Home Wear- Make and Model: Ages 14-16 (In elementary or Junior High) coffee coats, robes, hostess pajamas and sleep wear... (The At Home Wear must be garments not worn outside the home, which can be decently modeled.)

4. School Wear-Make and Model: Ages 9-14. (No pants dresses).

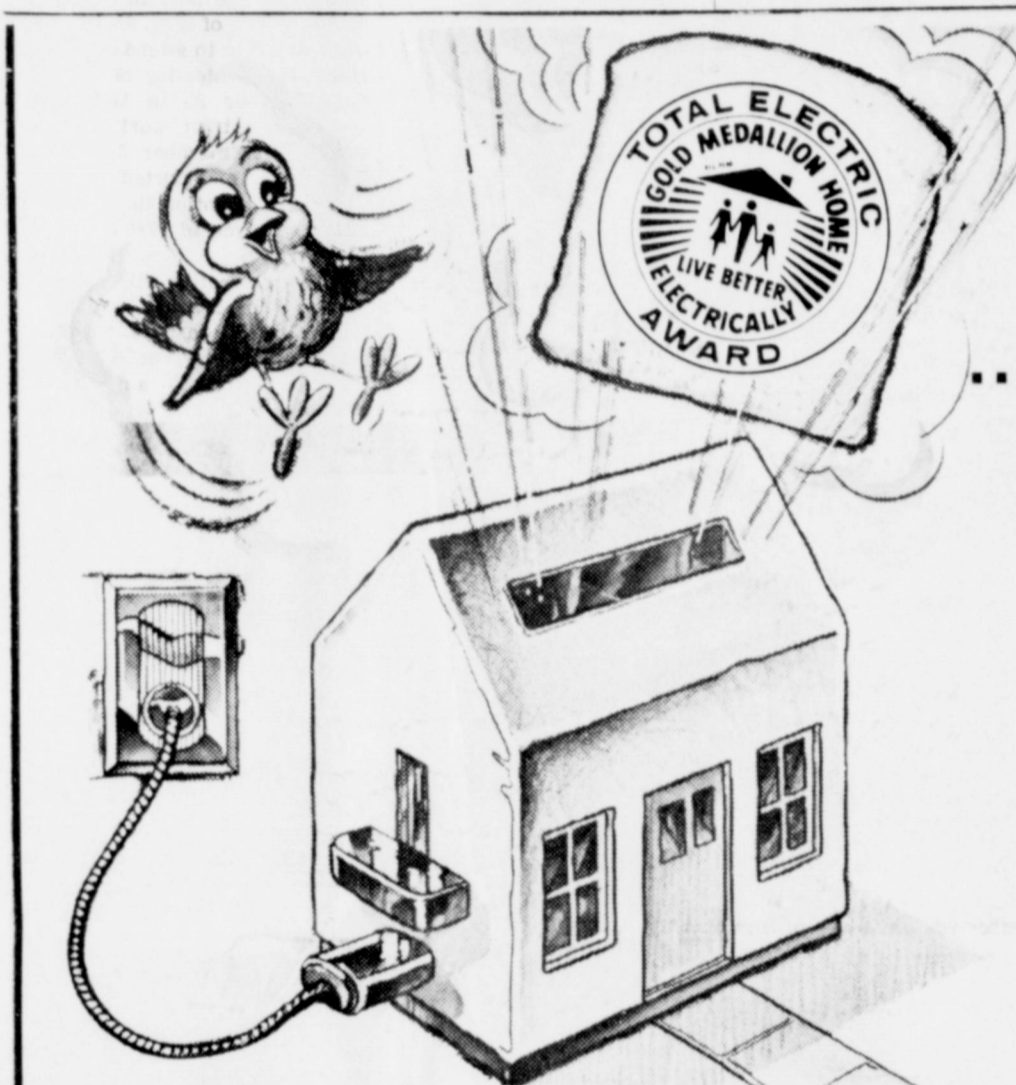

GIRL SCOUT PROGRAM TO STUDY CLUB

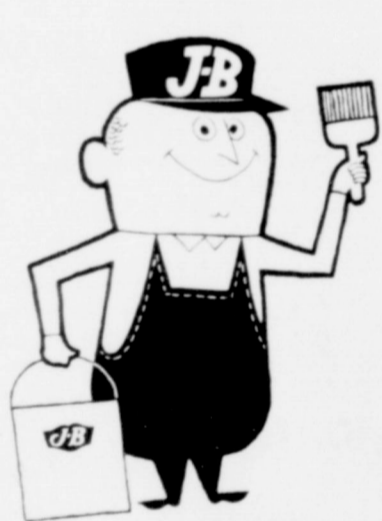

Prefabricated Will

Whether you are aware of it or not, a "will" has already been prepared for you. Known as the "statute of descent and distribution," it is a plan drawn up by your state legislature, to be used after your death in case you fail to make a will of your own.

How does this prefabricated will divide up your estate? Generally speaking, it follows a kind of law of averages, dividing things up the way an average person probably would.

In theory, that makes sense. But in practice, the use of cut-and-dried rules can have some startling consequences. For example:

In one case, a youth who mur-



dered his father was held entitled to his estate. Under the state statute (since changed), a son's rights were automatic—no one having thought about the possibility of murder.

In another case, a woman was awarded her husband's estate even though she was living in adultery at the time of his death. To outraged objections by his relatives, the court replied:

"It is unnecessary to discuss wisdom or morality. It is sufficient that the legislature has declared the rules by which the rights of the parties must be determined." True, these are extreme cases. But the prefabricated will also works out badly in many everyday circumstances. Take the situation when a man dies, leaving small children and only a modest estate.

In most states, if he has not made a will of his own, only part of his estate would go to the widow—the balance going directly to the children. For the widow, this could mean years of going through court procedures, for permission to spend the children's money on the ordinary expenses of life.

The trouble is not that the lawmakers, in drawing up the prefabricated will, don't try to be fair. Rather, the trouble is that they cannot possibly foresee the particular needs of each individual family.


They cannot know, for instance, that one of your children needs more protection than the others, or that you would like to make a grateful bequest to an old friend, or that you want to lend your support to a favorite charity.

No prefabricated will can possibly take account of such things. In fact, nobody can but you.

School is already in full swing and with it comes nutritious breakfasts and after school snacks. There are several answers to the busy homemaker's problem of serving these important meals.

Peanuts can be one answer, nutritious, versatile peanuts can be a life saver. Aside from being good in cookies, cakes and a variety of main dishes. Peanuts and peanut butter are a rich source of protein. Four tablespoons of peanuts butter equal the protein in a serving of meat, fish, or poultry.

Peanuts are plentiful now so use them in many different ways. Below are a few ideas in using peanuts and peanut butter.

Here is a tasty bread that can be used as a dessert or in cream cheese sandwiches for an informal buffet lunch. Try PEANUT-BANANA BREAD.

1-3 cup shortening
2-3 cup sugar
2 eggs
1 cup chopped salted peanuts
1 cup mashed ripe bananas
1 & 3/4 cup flour
1 teaspoon soda

Cream shortening and sugar. Add unbeaten eggs one at a time, and beat thoroughly (one minute, med. speed with electric beater). Add the mashed bananas alternately with the flour and soda which have been sifted together twice. Mix lightly, being careful not to overbeat, turn into a greased 8-1/2 x 4-1/2 x 2-1/2 in. loaf pan. Bake in moderate oven (325 degrees F.) about an hour and 10 minutes or until done.

Use this easy recipe to make this nutritious treat for your kids. You'll never have a worry about them tiring of it either because children-peanuts and because it contains universal favorites of children, peanuts and chocolate.

Cooky Mixture:
1-3 cup butter or margarine
1-2 cup creamy-style peanut butter
1 pound marshmallows
1 Tablespoon milk
4 cups crisp puffed cereal

Topping:
2 (6oz.) packages milk chocolate bits
1-2 cup salted peanuts, chopped
3-4 cup of puffed cereal

Combine butter peanut butter, marshmallows and milk in a heavy skillet. Place over low heat and stir constantly until all ingredients are melted and smooth. Add cereal and stir until all cereal is coated with peanut butter mixture.

Says....**

Recent rains over much of the area have brought on regrowth of sorghums, sudangrass, sudan, sorghum hybrids and Johnsongrass that suffered from the dry weather this summer or that was recently harvested. And this situation may pose a threat to grazing livestock.

New growth on sorghums sometimes develops a high prussic acid content and becomes a hazard to grazing animals. The same situation develops when the growth of these sorghums is stopped by a freeze or frost. So farmers are urged to keep an eye on their stock for the next few months if their animals are grazing any of the different sorghum types.

Prussic acid acts quickly in the digestive tract of an animal, it can kill an animal within a very short time after the plant is eaten. Whether or not a poisoned animal can be saved depends on how soon a veterinarian can get to it.

Animals that have been poisoned may stagger and act sleepy before suddenly dropping dead. Severe muscular twitching is sometimes seen. Labored breathing and frothing from a wide-open mouth are common symptoms. An animal may grind its teeth and turn its head into its flank. The breath usually has an almond like odor, and mucous membranes appear congested but not cyanotic and bluish. The blood is often cherry red.

Death results from suffocation, since the poison prevents the exchange of oxygen from the blood to the tissue.

Forage containing prussic acid can be fed safely if it is cut and allowed to cure completely in the field, or if it is put up as silage and not fed for several months. Mature plants with few suckers are seldom dangerous if growth has been normal. Grain sorghum or sudan stubble regrowth graded in late fall can be very dangerous.

A good way to check grazing safety is to turn one or two low-quality animals into a suspect field and watch them for a day or two. Be sure water is available to them or the symptoms may be delayed.

If poisoning is suspected, consult your local veterinarian at once. However, good grazing management is the best preventive against animal losses due to prussic acid poisoning.

The session of the public school just closing, under the superintendency of Prof. H.P. Caveness, assisted by an efficient corps of teachers, has been one of the most successful terms ever taught in Lynn County, and it is hoped that the entire faculty will be re-elected to fill their respective positions next year, for it would be

hard to find a set of teachers that would take more interest and could take hold and carry out the work as successfully as those who have been in charge during the present term.

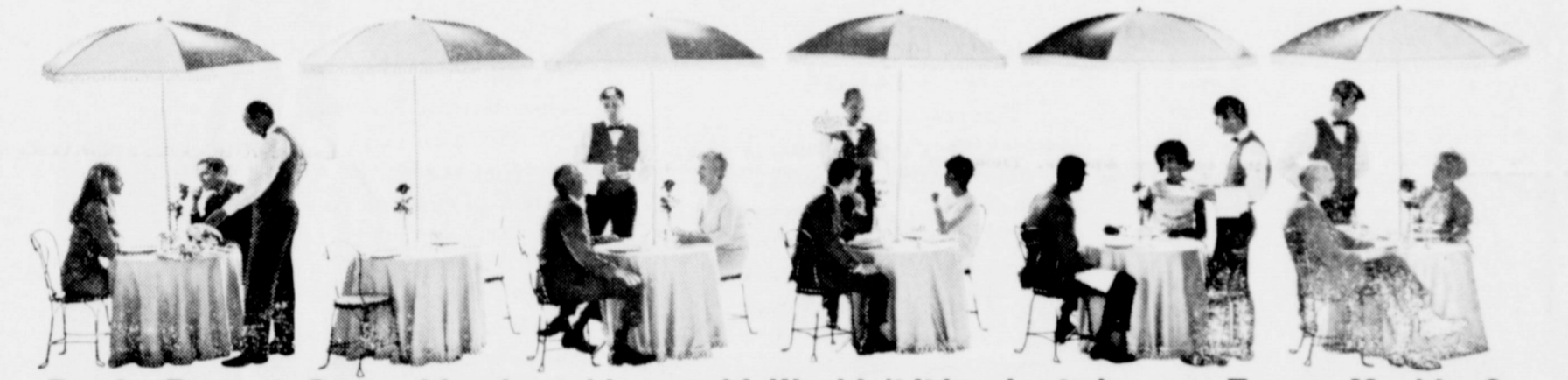

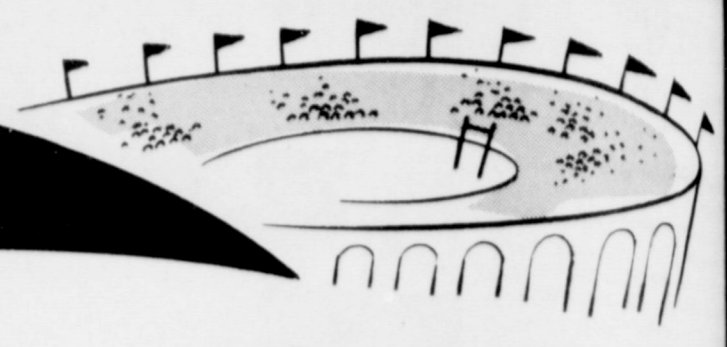

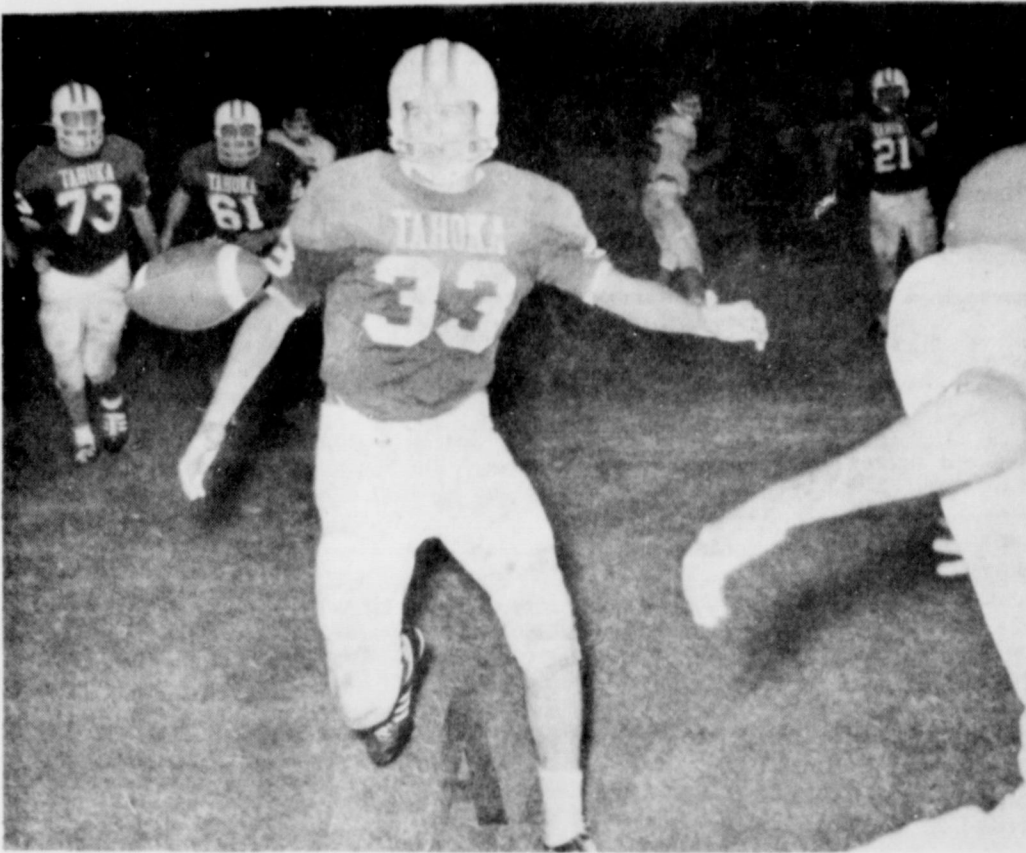

Dawson County kicked off its Community Carnival and Fiesta in Lamesa Monday, Sept. 15, and will continue thru Friday, Sept. 19.

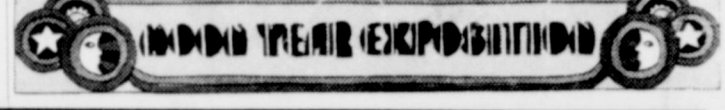
A unique Community Carnival staged by civil organizations, is being conducted from 5 p.m. to 10 p.m. daily during the week.
