Once in a while a man will tell us he "don't know that it pays to advertise." Of course he does not mean just what he says, for every man knows that advertising pays. Many men, however, do not stop to think how much their business depends on advertising, or what advertising consists of.

When a customer comes in and takes up an hour of your time showing goods and finally buys a nickel's worth, why do you ask them to come again? Do you realize that you have expended an hour advertising your goods to, and soliciting another visit from only one customer in the hope that at their next call they may buy a bill that will pay for both calls?

When a man comes in and buys a bill and you give him a cigar when a woman comes in and buy: a nice bill of dry goods and you throw in a lace handkerchief or a nice fan; when a child of one of your customers comes in and you give it a piece of candy, do you charge it up to advertising? if it is not advertising, and good advertising, too, what is it?

To make a success of your business you must use the above and many other kinds of advertising more or less expensive.

MORE RAILROAD RUMBLINGS.

BIG SPRINGS' PROPOSITION.

Col. J. H. Ransom, vice president of the Panhandle Short Line was in our city Saturday to make a proposition in reference to building a north and south railroad through Big Springs.

A meeting was held at the West Texas Bank Saturday night at which a large number were present to consider the proposition Col, Rausom had to offer As we understand it, the proposition is about as follows: The citizens of this county must raise a bonus of \$75, ooo, obtain a right-of-way through the county, and secure depot grounds. The \$75,000 was to be expended in building ten miles of road north from this point. When this was completed it was to be turned over to Col. Ransom, who would bond same and continue building the line on to Lamesa.

A lengthy discussion was in oring a proposition of this character. North and South railroad, and were willing to go their part in raising mer. How many 'cussins' would the bonus, but prefer a proposition where a bonus is not required until the railroad is completed. contend that the arrangement proposed would not insure a road and therefore are not in favor of giving a bonus until the road is completed As no final decision could be arrived at during the meeting, it was decided to refer the question to the Commercial Club which was to meet Wednesday, Jan. 22.

At the meeting of the Commercial Club the question was not discussed but was referred to the railroad committee who have power to act on this matter.

Since the proposition presented does not meet with the approval of the majority of the people, it would be well for our citizeus to raise a bonus of \$50,000 or \$75,000 to be given to the first railroad that will build a north and south line thru this city. With such an assured inducement in sight, a railroad company prepared to build a road through this section would know that the citizens here meant business and would be more likely to accept the terms than to go elsewhere and go to the trouble of trying to have a bonus raised.

STANTON TO AMARILLO.

Stauton, Tex., Jan. 22 .--Thousands of cross-ties are being received here by S. G. Bon Durant to be used on the West Texas and Northern Railway, This road is building from San Angelo to Amarillo. Over twenty-five cars have already been received here and as many more have been loaded at the mills in East Texas for shipment here. It is said that a large shipment of steel rails is now enroute here and track laying will begin some time between now and Feb. 15th.-Hereford Democrat.




