Voters To Decide Bond Issue Saturday

*** Vote At City Hall *** Polls Open At 8:00 ***

Two propositions of a bond issue will be voted upon this Saturday, by Tahoka voters. The issues include a \$50,000 General Obligation Sanitary Sewer System Bonds and issuance of \$15,000 General Obligation Municipal Airport Bonds.

Polls will open at 8:00 a. m., remaining open until 7:00 p. m., at the City Hall. Only persons owning taxable real estate within the Tahoka City limits are qualified to vote in this election.

The bond issue is a necessity according to city officials as the present sewer system was designed for approximately 1,300 persons and is now unable to meet the de-

mands of above 3,000 persons.

Total estimated cost of this project is approximately \$74,900 and the city has made application to the Federal Water Pollution Control Board for a grant of 30% of the total cost. This will amount to around \$22,000. The board has been assured of that grant leaving the cost to the city of approximately \$50,000.

The \$15,000 issue asked for airport improvement is approximately \$10,000 short of the needed \$25,000 to match a state grant that is available.

Present runways include a lighted 30'x2,599', running east and west, and a north-south unpaved runway, ex-

tending 60'x1,825'. The proposed improvement will require purchase of a land tract of 450'x1,955'. This will accommodate a 50'x3,200' runway, which is the minimum required for executive type aircraft and car parking facilities.

The \$25,000 state grant is not from public taxes, but is unclaimed gasoline tax paid by state and interstate pilots. The \$10,000 difference between the bond issue and grant will be made up from city furnished labor and materials.

Any airport, according to information from the Texas Industrial Commission and various Chamber of Commerce, should be able to

meet the needs of executive aircraft, before trying to compete for any type of industry. The present facilities are valued at approximately \$12,000 to \$14,000.

The city council deemed it necessary for local citizens to voice their approval of such airport improvements.

This bond issue, if passed, will not increase taxes in the city. The issue can be included in our present tax bonds, which will necessitate putting more of our tax dollar in the Interest and Sinking Fund, which would cut our income in the General Fund. However, the One Percent Sales Tax will more than offset the General Fund loss.

County Soil Conservation District Enters Competition

Lynn County Soil and Water Conservation District has entered the 22nd annual Goodyear competition to select the nation's top 53 conservation districts, according to Jiggs Swan, Wilson, district chairman.

Activities of the district will be weighed against the per-

formance of other districts in the state in determining the outstanding district in the annual event sponsored by The Goodyear Tire and Rubber Co. of Akron, Ohio.

Key agricultural leaders will serve as judges and will select the state winner. Soil conservation efforts from

January 1, 1968, through December 31, 1968, will be considered.

Grand award for the 53 districts selected nationally will be an expense-paid, work-study trip to Arizona in December, 1969, for one member of the district's governing body and the outstanding farmer-cooperator in each winning district. The 106 men selected will be guests at Goodyear Farms, 14,000-acre general farm operation near Phoenix.

District supervisors are Swan, Howard Moore of Wells, Lit H. Moore of New Home, Boyd Barnes of Draw, and Elmer Owens of Tahoka.

Swan said the district's outstanding cooperator will be selected from over 950 farm operators enrolled in the district program. Nationally, over 2,000,000 farmers in over 2,950 districts have signed cooperative agreements with local Soil and Water Conservation Districts.

Highway Projects Scheduled In County

The Texas Highway Commission today approved a \$214 million supplement to the 1969-1970 Consolidated Highway Program for Texas. The supplementary program includes construction and re-

construction of 1511.3 miles of roads and highways to cost \$205.8 million, with additional funds being devoted to purchase of right of way.

H. M. Ables is the engineer in charge of the Lynn County projects involving US 380 and US 87. Work will begin at the Terry County line, progressing east to the railroad tracks in the east edge of Tahoka, with reconstruction, grading and surfacing.

The second project will begin at the north edge of Tahoka to the south edge of the city, on US 87 involving reconstruction, grading, base, and surfacing.

US 87 Named Business Route

The Texas Highway Commission today designated the old route of US Highway 87 through Tahoka, Lynn County, as a business route.

US 87 has been reconstructed through Tahoka on a new location. The Commission said retention of the old route as part of the State highway system would be of benefit to the traveling public.

The business route will be eligible for normal maintenance in accordance with policies of the Texas Highway Department. But the State does not obligate itself to participate in its reconstruction or in major improvements.

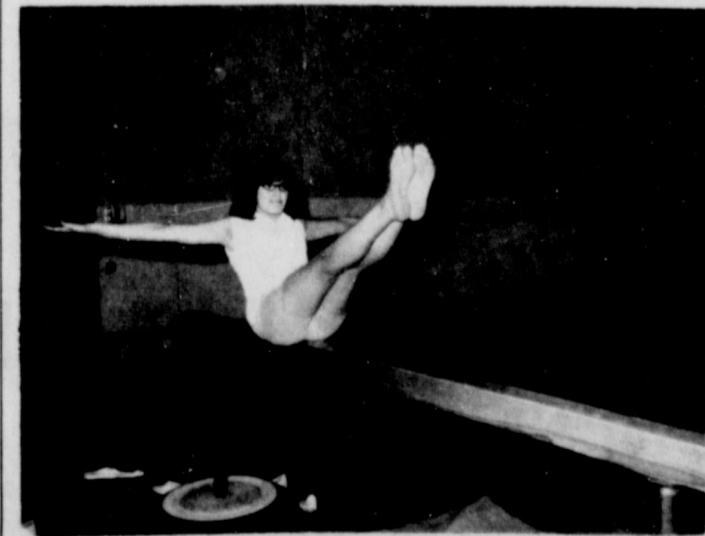
First quarter score showed

the Bulldogs leading 16-12, ending the half at 3 points difference, 30-27. The local team pulled a good lead in the third, beginning the fourth period 53-36.

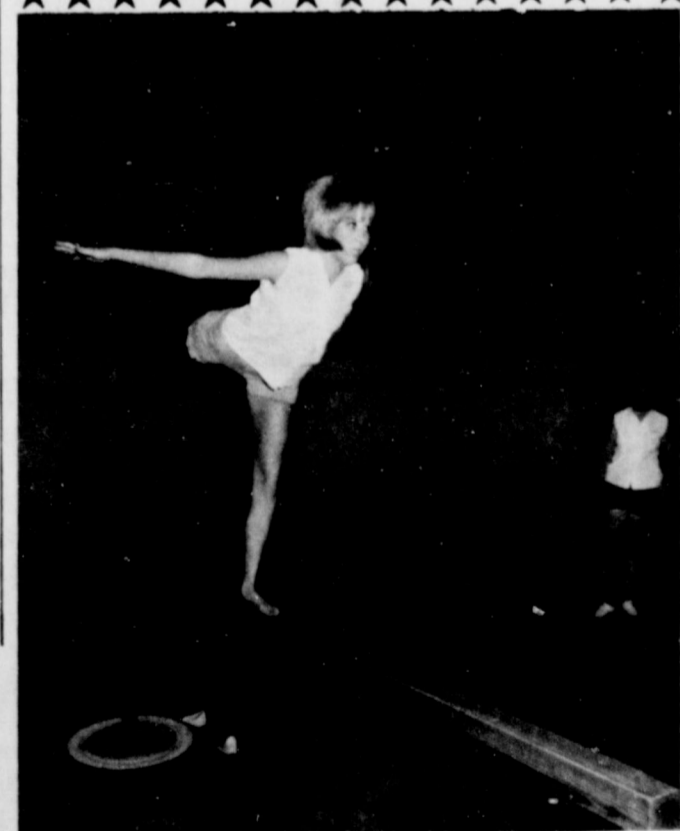
Gene Walker, Mitch Browning and George Pena also took their toll in scoring with Walker dumping in 9 and Browning 7. Pena hit for five points.

MYPNA BARTLEY shows excellent form on balance beam, getting ready for gymnastic program. NEWS Photo

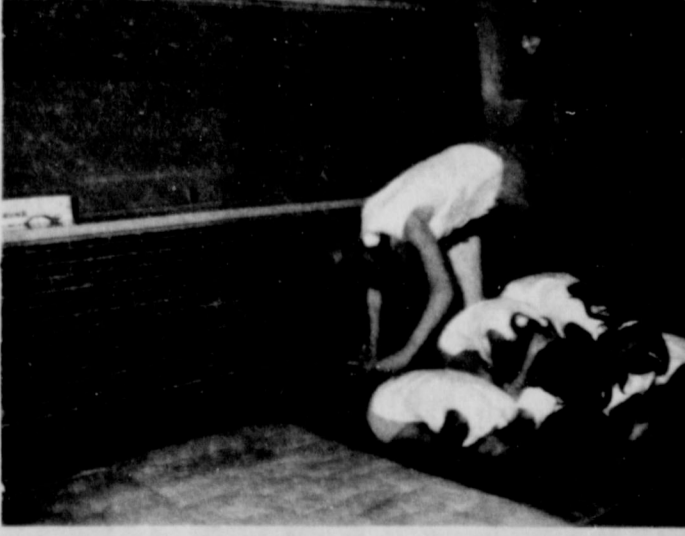
Gymnastic Program Scheduled

Services Held For Vietnam Casualty

Services were held Monday for Spec. 4 Antonio Reyes, Jr. 20 of O'Donnell, who was killed in Vietnam combat January 21.

Reyes was born in Lamesa March 31, 1948 and moved to O'Donnell with his family in 1963. He was a May graduate of O'Donnell High School and entered the Army last fall. He had been in Vietnam almost six months.

Army officials reported he was killed by a land mine while riding in a Jeep. The services were held at

10 a. m. in St. Jude's Catholic Church, Tahoka. Officiating was the Rev. John Dillon, pastor. Burial, with military rites, was in Peaceful Garden Memorial Park at Lubbock under direction of White Funeral Home, Tahoka.

Survivors include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Antonio Reyes, Sr. of O'Donnell; two sisters, Mrs. Lydia Ortiz and Jesusita Reyes, both of O'Donnell; two brothers, Ruben and Vilsen, both of O'Donnell, and a grandmother, Mrs. Rosa Soliz of Lamesa.

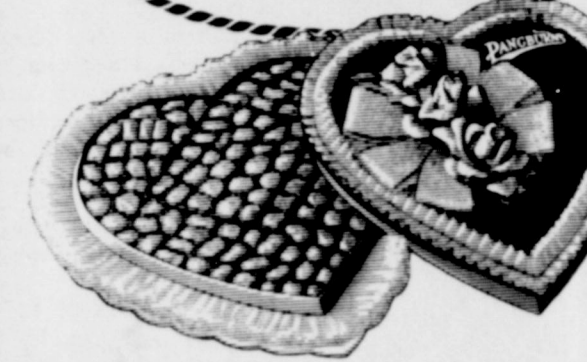

Bill Griffin, County Agent, Says.....

Hybrid tea roses may be pruned in Lynn County during late February or early March. If not severely pruned,

ed, roses will become large and difficult to care for, and the flowers will be small and of poor quality.

Cut back the top growth to 12 to 15 inches above the ground. Retain from 4 to 6 of the healthy canes arising from the bud union or within 4 to 6 inches above the union. Remove all dead, diseased, injured twigs and branches as well as all the thin spindly growth frequently found at the base of the plant.

Prune climbing roses after the big flush of spring bloom. On climbers any cane over 2 years old should be removed and last year's growth thinned.

The final step in pruning roses is to seal all cuts one-half inch or larger with a good tree wound paint containing an asphalt base. A new aerosol form of wound paint is available that is easy to use and is very effective as an aid in healing pruning cuts. Use of this material prevents entry of moisture and wood decay diseases, discourages entry of insects, and prevents drying of the exposed tissue.

Plant Gladiolus
February is an excellent time to begin planting gladiolus corms. For flower production over a long period, plant a portion of your corms every two weeks until mid-March. Pointers for successful gladiolus production includes: 1. Purchase only No. 1 sized corms for planting; 2. Select a new area for growing gladiolus each year if possible for disease control; 3. Prepare soil well in advance of planting; 4. For most soils, plant at a depth of 4 to 6 inches. If planted too shallow, the plants are easily blown over by wind; 5. Cut as little foliage as possible if corms are to be saved for the following year; 7. Allow foliage to die before digging corms for storage.

Plant Early
Now is the ideal time to plant bare root trees, shrubs, and vines in the landscape. There will be ample time for good root development before hot weather forces excessive top growth. Most nurseries have their finest selection of plants at this time of year. Make your selection early in order to get the best plants.

Spices and herbs lose their true flavor and aroma if kept for too long a period of time. Linda advises to check those tag ends of spices and herbs by giving them a sniff test. You'll probably find the remnants of their characteristic aroma. But compare the old supply with a newly purchased stock and you'll quickly become aware of the difference in freshness and strength. To keep all spices and herbs fresh longer, close containers promptly after each use and store away from heat and direct sunlight.

If a few drops of lemon juice are required for a recipe, just stick a fork in one end of a lemon and squeeze out the needed juice instead of cutting the whole lemon in half.

Add a cup of crushed cornflakes to a favorite chocolate chip cookie recipe for an extra crisp cookie.

Try a new flavor for pot roasts or meat loaves by basting them during cooking with the spiced vinegar left over from canned sweet

pickles. Did you ever wonder what makes butter yellow? It's carotene. That's a yellow pigment that's very rich in vitamin A. Your body converts it into vitamin A and stores until needed. Vitamin A is an absolute "must" for growth, healthy eggs and skin, and the maintenance of healthy tissues for resistance to infection. And butter is especially rich in vitamin A because it contains the vitamin both in its natural form and in the form of the yellow pigment, carotene.

Fresh fruits and vegetables in good supply at the most economical prices include apples, oranges, grapefruit, bananas, avocados, potatoes, head lettuce, celery, cabbage, sweet potatoes, rutabagas, carrots, and dry yellow onions.

Is it more economical to buy convenience soups or to make your own? Both are equal in price if the same ingredients are used, answers Linda. Homemade soups tend to be more expensive because they use more expensive ingredients and a higher proportion of meat.

Recipe of the Week
Velvet Cherry Pie
1 (15 oz.) can sweetened condensed milk
1/3 cup lemon juice
1 can red tart pie cherries (drained)
1/2 cup chopped pecans
1 package whipped topping
1 prepared 10 inch crust (can be graham cracker)
Beat condensed milk and lemon juice until well blended. Fold in pecans and cherries. Pour in prepared crust. Whip topping according to package directions and swirl over cherry mixture. Chill overnight for best results. Serves 6 to 8.

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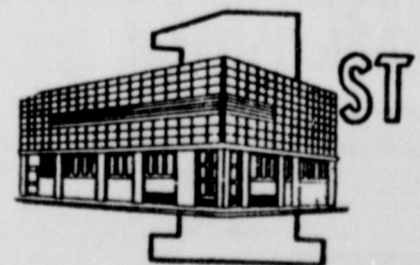

Summary Issued County Traffic

The Department of Public Safety issues monthly, a rural accident summary giving the county traffic statistics investigated by the Texas Highway Patrol.

According to the final statistics for the calendar year of 1968, the summary showed a total of 56 crashes resulting in seven persons killed, 39 persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$60,225.

Bond Sales Fall Short Of Quota

Total sales of United States Savings Bonds and Freedom Shares in Lynn County during 1968 amounted to \$100,954, according to a report received today from Mr. Hegi, Chairman of the Lynn County Savings Bonds Committee. The

1968 sales goal for the county was \$160,000 and 63 percent of the goal has been achieved.

Sales in Texas during 1968 amounted to \$177,371,504, an increase of 5.7 percent over sales during 1967. During the month of December sales totaled \$13,070,587 compared to \$12,353,888 during 1967.

Nationally, the sale of L and H Savings Bonds and Freedom Shares during 1968 amounted to \$4,972 Million which is 90 percent of the National goal of \$5,500 Million.

Railroad Taxes Paid To County

Current annual taxes paid to the various government agencies by Texas railroads in Lynn County totaled \$10,311. It is announced by the Texas Railroad Ass'n.

That amount was the county's share of the more than \$10,000,000 the railroads paid in Texas on their own right of way and other property.

The biggest railroad contribution was to the school systems throughout the state. Large sums were also distributed to city, village, and county governments and for road and bridge funds.

In addition, of course, was the large total in taxes the railroads' 30,840 Texas employees contributed on their own property. The vast majority of rail workers, many of whom live in Lynn County, own their own homes.

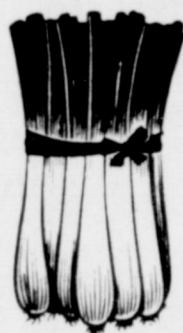

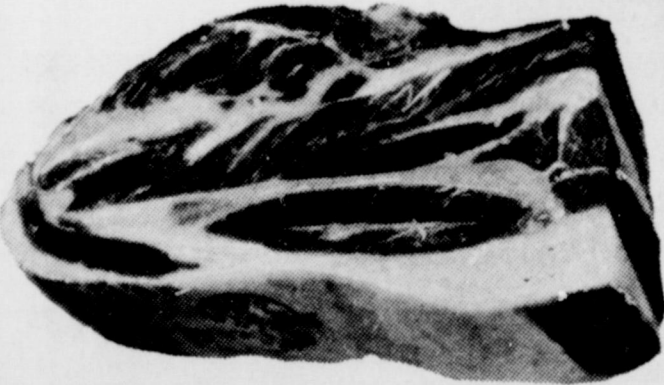
