FASHIONS FOR BABIES.

"Perhaps the young mother may think that when she comes to make clothes for her baby she won't have to worry her head very much as to what's the fashion of the day," says Grace Margaret Gould in the Woman's Home Companion for March. "Perhaps she thinks that baby clothes are always the same. If she does, she is a very mistaken little lady, for clothes for the littlest folks show from time to time many of the innovations which make the garments for grown-ups in the mode. This is especially so this spring. Even the long dresses for infants show the princess and Empire lines, and sleeves have diminished greatly in size. The vogue for hand embroidery is also emphasized in baby clothes; not only is it used on the little dresses, but on the long cloaks and the dainty little flannel wrappers and saques.

"It goes without saying that if baby's mother is the sensible little woman that she is quite sure to be, baby will have no frills and furbelows on his clothes. Simplicity is the fashion to-day. And baby clothes reflect the trend of the modes. Generally speaking, the distinction between baby's every-day clothes and his dresses for best wear is merely in the quality of the fabric. When baby is expected to look his finest his dress is of the sheerest of nainsook lawn or longcloth, and sometimes washable cotton chiffon."

A Matter of Business.

The railroad mass meeting in Gail was quite an important event in the history of the town. Important, not so much because of the interest manifested and the unanimity of expression, in favor of a road, as in the action that may follow, as a result of the meeting. Railroads are built strictly in accordance with business principles. Ordinarily two or three preliminary lines are run and the best one selected with reference to cheapness of construction and of expense of maintaining. Whatever is contributed by those who are benefited by the building of the road, to that extent, lessens the cost of construction. Railroad companies are composed of independent capitalists and are influenced by self interest, rather than by sentiment. YOU ARE HEREBY COMMANDED to summon Millie B. Farris, whose place of residence is unknown, by making publication of this Citation once in each week for four successive weeks previous to the return day hereof, in some newspaper published in your County, if there be a newspaper published therein, but if not, then in any newspaper published in the 64th Judicial District; but if there be no newspaper published in said Judicial District, then in a newspaper published in the nearest District to said 64th Judicial District, to appear at the next regular term of the District Court of Lynn County, to be holden at the Court House thereof, in Tahoka, on the fifth Monday in May A. D. 1909, the same being the 31st day of May A. D. 1909, then and there to answer a petition filed in said Court on the 15th day of March A. D. 1909 in a suit, numbered on the docket of said Court No. 48, wherein W. J. Farris is Plaintiff, and Millie B. Farris is Defendant, and said petition alleging that Plaintiff and Defendant were married on the 8th day of August A. D. 1906, in Nolan County, Texas, that Plaintiff met Defendant in the early part of the year 1906, that she, defendant was going by the name of Sells, and represented herself to be the widow of one, John Sells, that Defendant was receiving company, as a single and marriagable woman.

That Defendant represented herself to be single, and that her former husband was dead, and that he believed her statement, to be true and that he believed her to be the surviving widow of John Sells, deceased, and as such widow married her, while in fact and truth, she had just merely absented herself from her former husband.

Plaintiff shows the court, that they lived together and cohabited as husband and wife, but a very short time. They located in Lynn County, about the third day after their marriage, and lived together there about three weeks when plaintiff says he ascertained that the woman that he married was not a widow but had a living husband, and as soon as he learned these facts, he took Defendant to the nearest Rail Road point and paid her expenses to Tennessee.

Plaintiff shows to the Court that his marriage to Defendant was illegal and invalid, that he had no means of learning these facts of Defeneants marriage except by her statement.

Premises considered, Plaintiff asks that Defendant be cited, by publication, to answer this petition, that the marriage be declared null and void and held for naught, and the bonds of matrimony be dissolved, that he have his judgement for costs and for such other and further relief as may be, in law and equity entitled.

HEREIN FAIL NOT, but have before said Court, at its aforesaid next regular term, this writ with your return thereon showing how you have executed the same.

LAND AGENT'S LETTER.

Navajoe City, Utah, March 5, 1909.
Dear Friend:
We have a high grade of people out here; some are thoroughbreds. We are not annoyed by thieves and pick-pockets as there is very little here to steal. A drunk man is a very rare sight in our town as only the well-to-do can afford a sufficient quantity of liquor at one time. Our jail has never held a prisoner, and probably never will, unless our county officers can raise enough money to make it secure. None of our citizens have ever gone to the penitentiary. The officers of that institution do not want them there and have on several occasions made liberal contributions to assist in securing able counsel to defend them. Our people are very particular about what they wear. Those who wish to be up-to-date wear the Savage automatic, though a few Colt 45's are still worn by the old moss-backs who don't try to keep up with the styles.

Although this is a healthy country, we have several doctors and they get a lot of practice. But accepting the axiom that practice makes perfect, they do not get near as much practice as they need. A few days ago one of our doctors treated a patient who was suffering from a swollen condition of the spondiunctic gland. The doctor promptly relieved him by pulling his leg.

You ought to come out to this country before the railroad gets here; if you don't, you may be too old to travel when it does. This country offers a splendid opportunity to any young man who wants to rise in the world, as the elevation of our town is a trifle over 3000 feet; which is several notches above your present location. Land is going up here all the time. The last time the wind blew, some of the sorriest in the county went clear to the top of the court house and at last accounts was going still higher. If a volcano should suddenly break out here some of our choicest land would go sky-high. I am satisfied if you and some of your friends were to come out here right away, you could make a great deal of money in a short time if you only had the proper tools and material and a good quiet place to do the work. Hoping to see you out our way at your earliest convenience, or sooner if the grand jury holds an irregular session, I am
