Some complaints are coming in from the ladies; some say that they will have to order their goods, as it is not safe to come to town; some have come near being struck several times by balls. The business men should see to this or loose business.

The above came to us a few days ago through the mail, and we will say that whoever the writer may be, that they are exactly right. A word for and to the young men and boys who have been playing ball on the streets. First; we are sure that they have never once considered the danger that their play placed the women and children in, and second; after having this danger pointed out to them, that there will no longer be ball playing around the public square in our city. We are sure that after seeing this protest that they will go to the ball diamond for their practice.

Panhandle as a Dairy Country

How much does it cost in the Panhandle to feed a cow one year? 5 tons sorghum \$8.00, \$15.00, 1000 pounds corn, \$8.00, 1000 pounds cotton seeds, \$8.00; total, \$31.00, if you buy all the feed.

If a farmer will plant one acre in sorghum and one acre in corn add to this the seed from one bale of cotton, he will have sufficient feed to keep a cow one year.

His actual outlay will be \$6.00 for rent and \$8.00 for cotton seeds or a total of \$14.00. A Jersey cow ought to produce at a very low figure, \$60.00 worth of cream per year. Add to this the average value of a calf at once year old, and you have a total of \$80.00, leaving a net profit, if you buy all the feed, of \$49.00, and if you raise the feed, you will have a profit of \$66.

By comparing these figures with Central Texas or any other portion of Texas, for that matter we find the odds decidedly in favor of this country for dairy purposes.

Sorghum is the best and cheapest forage crop that can be produced for dairy cows and everybody knows that no other portion of Texas but the west will produce this crop of a quality that is first class besides when it is made in the lower portions of the state, on account of the moist condition of the atmosphere, it does not keep well, whereas in our high altitude it can be put up properly any time during the summer or fall, and it make first class till another crop is made and harvested. Compared with the other portions of the state we have much better climate for dairying as we have not wet chilly winters nor the hot oppressive summers. We have better grass than they; we can grow all the feed they do and our crops of sorghum, alfalfa and milo maize will be better fall and winter pastures.—Ex
