#### LET'S LIFT LYNN COUNTY OUT OF THE MUD

The rains and snow over this county this winter and early spring have put some of the roads and he streets of Tahoka in a pretty bad condition. In the natural corse of events there will be more rains herethis year, and the traffic this fall will be twice that of the season just passed. The result is plain, if the roads are not improved this summer, they will be impassable in places this fall. One Uncle Bob Montgomery has been stretch of road especialy that needs farm, seven miles east of town,

There are two ways of building a system of county roads.

The one is to judicially expend a bill exempting cotton and wool- the cash in the road and bridge road work required of the citizens where it is most needed, and also to see that the road is worked, not torn up and left in a worse condition than it was to begin with.

> This method requires the work of years and each overseer must be interested in making the most im provments with the force at his command and not in fulling the letter of the law by staying on the road the reqrired length of time

> The other way is to neglect our roads untsl such a time that we will be forced to pass a large bond issue to put them in a passable

> The first mentioned method de pends on the co-operation of the road over-seers and the commissioners- Each commissioner is aliowed a stipulated fee to go over the roads of his precinct and report the condition of the same It is intended that these reports be used by over seers when selecting places for improment in the roads they are instructed to work.

OUTLINE OF A METHOD FOR SECURING COMMUNITY CO-OP-ERATION IN BUSINESS AND SOCIAL AFFAIRS

A scheme for the organization of rural sommunities for both busmess and social purposes is work ed out in an article which is to appear in the forthcoming Yearbook of the Department of Agriculture as a pamphlet for the use of the department's Office of Markets

The scheme calls for 10 committees, 5 of which are to deal with business needs and 5 with social needs. Every member of the organization is to serve on some one of these committees. In addition there is to be a central or executive composed of the president of the organization, it's secretary, it's treasurer and the chairman of the 10 other committees. This central body is to direct the general policy of the organization, raise all tunds and control their expenditures,

The committee that are to deal with the business interests of the om nunity are as follows:

1. Committee on 1arm produc-

- 2. Committee on marketing.
- 3. Committee on securing tarm
- 4. Committee on farm finance and accounting. 5 Committee on communication
- and transportation.

Similarly, the five committees hat attend to the community's ocial interests will deal with:

- 1. Education.
- 2. Sanitation.
- 3. Recreation. 4. Beautification.
- 5. Household economics.

The work of these committees s indicated sufficiently clearly by their titles. For example, the committee on production can do much good by improving the breeds of live stock in a community thru

males. It can encourage the formmation of corn, poultry, pig, cattle canning, and gardening rinbs, which have already demonstra their value in the sections where they have been established, and it can carry on useful studies of the type of agriculture best fitted to local conditions.

In the same way the committee on marketing can secure the standardization of the community's products, and thus obtain better





To increase the farmers income is not the only thing needed to

make Iural life what it should be. As a matter of fact, says this article, it is the prospecous farmer

who is more inclined to move to town than his less forutnate neighbor. Having accumulated a competence he wishes to enjoy it, and there are five principal reasons which lead him to believe that be can do this better in the city:

First, there are usually better facilities foa educating his children; second the sanitary conditions are frequently much detter in towns, and the time does not seem to be far distant when the cities will be actually more healihful than the country. Again, household con veniences such as hot and cold water, heating and lighting system etc., are more abundant in towns and add greatly to the comrort of living. Finally, there is more opportunity for recleation in the city, and frequently, strange as it may appeal to the sense of beauty that is inherent in praotically

Cooperation on the part of rural communities can do as much to alter these conditions as it can to increase the average cash income.

The committees that have these matters in charge should, therefore, be regarded as quite as important as those which deal with business questions and they should recieve he same support from the entire community they are endeavoring to benefit. The result will be a community spirit which, in its way, is as capable of producing as valu. able results as the national spirit. In fact, says the rich articls in closing, "Patriotism, like charity begins at home; that is, in the neighborhood,"




