The committee can also contracts on a large scale which will be more favorable than any ndividual can secure for himsel a:d in many other ways economiz ine selling of the community' eting is not actually resorted to the information that the committe collects can hardly help but be of great assistance to the individua shippers.Just as the committee on mark eftng crn facilitate selling, theCom mittee on farm supplies can economize on bulying. Farmers are warned hovever not to underesti mate the cost of running a store or commercial agency, and not ov estimate the saving which this
can effect. The cooperative society does away with the neccessit! of the store's making a profit, bu somebody must manage the store and that somebody must be paic for histime. His salary, therefor corresponds in a way to the ordinary store's profit, and it is not man for less than he would be able
to make in business for himself. There are, however, several meth ods of purchasing farm supplies cosperatively which will be found to be of advantage. The simplest to be of advantage. The simplest
is the joint order, in which a group of farmers can buy a given article n large quantities, thereby effect expenses of handing, commission tc. Sometimes when this method is adopted a warehouse is added whichy, and in which the goods are stored unt them,
sers need the
If these two methods have bee ried and found successful, it ma heir iogical devely them out duct a cooperative store which enders the same service to its customers that a private enterprise would. This, however, inevitably leads to complications and shonld only be undertaken after some ex perience with simpler methods
cooperation. With the committee on farm fin-
ance the first duty is to ascertain ance the first duty is to ascertain what farm enterprises can be safe-
ly tinanced. This is only possible ly tinanced. This is only possible
when accurate accounts are kep when accurate accounts are kept

difficult if the committee has rougnly mastered the subject and is able to put it clearly betore local

able rate of intertst, the commitiee mu t consider ways of securing
