TEXAS animals are being plagued with disease, according to the Texas Veterinary Medical Association, in news releases this week. Findings of equine (horse) encephalomyelitis has been discovered in West Texas, near Seminole. The disease is sometimes called sleeping sickness and Blind Staggers.

The other disease, Anaplasmosis, a severe blood disease in cattle has been reported in wide-spread areas in Texas. The disease causes extreme anemia and death if not detected early. Owners of cattle and horses should check with their veterinarian about the disease and treatment of the same.

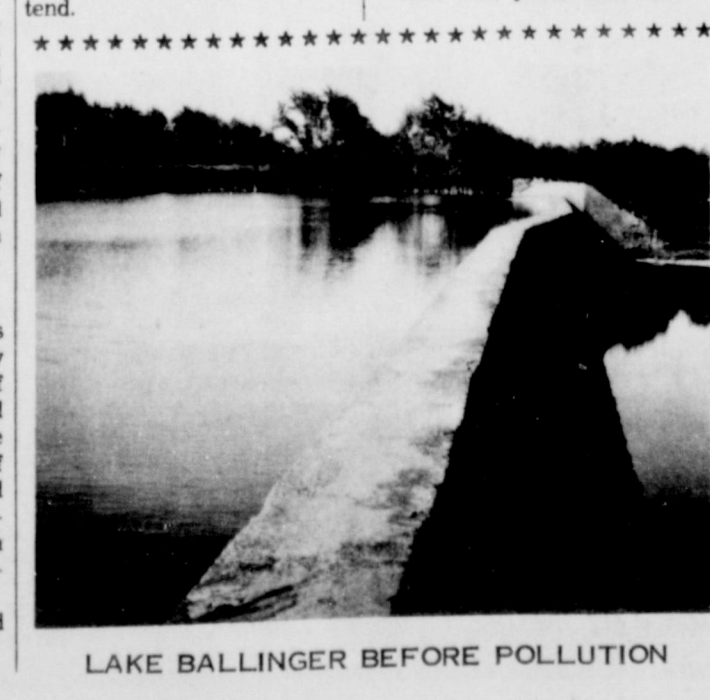

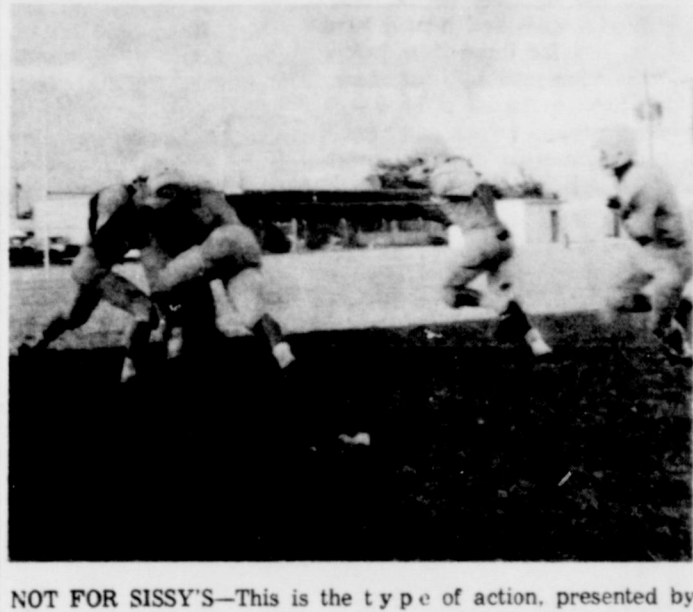
