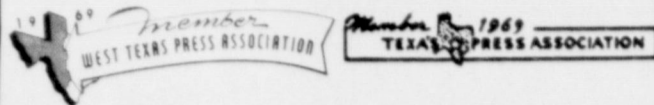

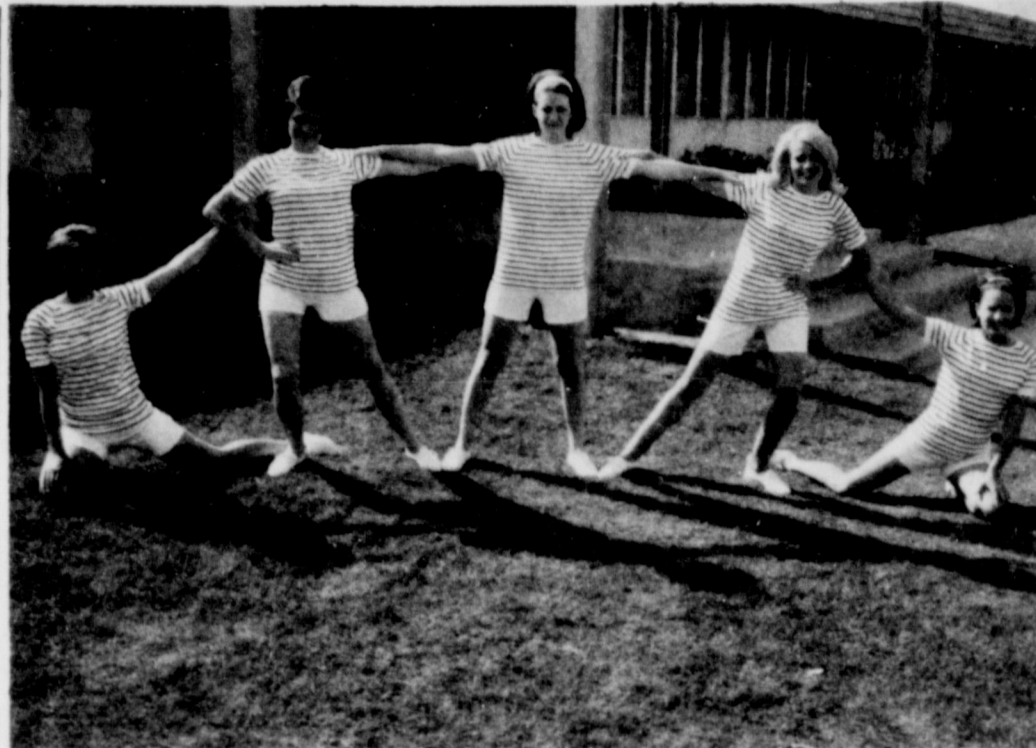

Red Raspberry Salad
By: Carol Pruitt of Austin
1 10 oz. pkg. frozen raspber- ries, thaw
2 3 oz. pkg. raspberry Jell-o.
2 cups boiling water
1 pt. vanilla ice cream
1 6 oz. can frozen pink lem- onade, thaw
1/4 cup chopped pecans
1. Drain raspberries, save syrup
2. Dissolve Jell-o in water, add ice cream by spoon- fuls, till melted
3. Stir lemonade and rasp- berry syrup into Jell-o mix- ture
4. Chill until partly set
5. Fold in raspberries and pecans and turn into 6 cup ring mold or oblong casserole
6. Chill until firm. Makes 8-10 servings.

1 4 oz. pkg. chocolate pud- ding and pie filling.
1/4 cup soft margarine
1 T water
1/2 cup chopped nuts
1 pkg. white frosting mix
1 can cherry pie filling
Mix pie crust, pudding, margarine, water and nuts until it forms a soft dough. Spread in bottom of a 9" sq. pan which has been greased. Cook for 10-15 minutes at 450 degrees F. Cool to luke warm. treated until healing is com- plete. Label directions on the product container should be closely followed, observed the county agent. Livestock should be spray- ed or dipped with a recom- mended insecticide to control external parasites and res- trictions dealing with the movement of livestock should be observed and followed. Be sure, adds the agent, that purchased livestock are free of screwworms at the point of origin. And most important, if worms are found in animal wounds, collect a sample and send it to the Mission Labor- atory for positive identifica- tion. Kits for mailing the worm samples are available at my office along with mail- ing instructions. Finally, the program and Foundation officials are ask- ing each livestock producer to talk with his neighbors about the seriousness of the screw- worm situation and to follow the recommended manage- ment practices.

spray a herd than to battle screwworm cases -- for it costs about \$800 to produce enough sterile flies to treat a single case of worms." Bris- coe added. "We all need to be screw- worm vigilantes this years," he emphasized. When cases of worms are found, a representative sam- ple of all worms in a wound, or from six to ten larvae, should be collected and sent to the Mission Screwworm Laboratory for identification. Only positive screwworm cases can be treated with the sterile flies, Briscoe added. The area where the positive screwworm case has been identified will be "hot spot- ted."

Bill Griffin, County Agent, Says.....

Highly favorable weather conditions throughout much of Texas is expected to worsen the already serious screw worm situation, say officials of the Screwworm Eradica- tion Program. Suggestions coming from an April 30 meeting in San An- tonio involving the program officials, SW Animal Re- search Foundation, livestock producers, sportsmen and oth- ers are aimed at minimizing the threat which now exists. All Lynn County livestock producers are urged to co- operate in efforts to hold the destructive pest in check. County screwworm commit- tees have been reactivated to assist with the county pro- grams.

WEEK OF MAY 22
Screwworm prevention is everybody's business, says County Agent Bill Griffin. The County Screwworm Eradication Committee calls your attention to the serious- ness of the screwworm threat this year. Collection kits and vials for collection of worm samples may be obtained at Tatum Bros., G and M Grain, and County Agents Office. No ranch in Texas is im- mune to the threat of screw- worms this years, says Dolph Briscoe, Jr., of Uvalde, rancher and president of the Southwest Animal Health Re- search Foundation. He em- phasized that Texas reported 9,268 screwworm cases last year, and that the fall epidemic also claimed the life of a South Texas woman. "Preventive action is need- ed -- such as checking ani- mals regularly for wounds, treating all wounds and spraying herds with a pro- duct recommended for that purpose on the label. It is much more economical to

Livestock producers are asked to check their animals regularly for cuts, scratches, and wounds, and to manage them to reduce injuries. Surgery during warm weather should be avoided. When wounds are found, they should be treated with an approved product. Wounds should be reinspected and re-

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (HJR7)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 64 to read as follows: "Section 64. All other provisions of the Constitution notwithstanding, bonds issued pursuant to constitutional authority shall bear such rates of interest as shall be prescribed by the issuing agency, subject to limitations as may be imposed by the legislature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to remove the constitutional interest rate limitations, subject to limits imposed by the Legislature, for bonds issued pursuant to constitutional authority."

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (HJR9)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section 49-d-1 to read as follows: "Section 49-d-1. (a) In addition to Texas Water Development Bonds heretofore authorized to be issued by Sections 49-c and 49-d of Article III of the Constitution, the Texas Water Development Board is hereby authorized to issue \$3,500,000,000 in aggregate principal amount of bonds. No part of such additional bonds shall be issued prior to approval thereof by the vote of two-thirds of the elected members of both houses of the Legislature. (b) The proceeds from the sale of such bonds shall be deposited in the Texas Water Development Fund. (c) The bonds herein authorized and all bonds authorized by such Sections 49-c and 49-d of Article III shall bear such interest and mature as the Texas Water Development Board shall prescribe subject to the limitations as may be imposed by the Legislature. (d) The Texas Water Development Fund shall be used for the purposes heretofore permitted by and subject to the limitations in said Sections 49-c and 49-d in addition thereto for the purposes of developing water resources and facilities for the State of Texas, both within the State and without the

State of Texas. Provided, however, that financial assistance may be made pursuant to the provisions of such Sections 49-c and 49-d subject only to the availability of funds and without regard to the provisions in Section 49-c that such financial assistance shall terminate after December 31, 1982. (e) Under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe, the Texas Water Development Board may receive grants and, in addition, execute contracts with the United States or any of its agencies, other states of the United States, foreign governments and others, for the acquisition and development of such water resources and facilities for the State of Texas. Such contracts when executed may be secured by the general credit of the state, and if so secured shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas in the same manner and with the same effect as Texas Water Development Bonds. If facilities are acquired for a term of years, such contracts shall contain provisions for renewal that will protect the state's investment. The aggregate principal amount of Texas Water Development Bonds authorized herein and in said Sections 49-c and 49-d shall be reduced by the aggregate of principal payments committed under such contracts constituting general obligations of the state. The provisions hereof shall not be construed to limit the authority of the Texas

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (SJR8)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 51-a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows: "Section 51-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by general laws, to provide, subject to limitations herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be deemed expedient, for assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and other services to: (1) Needy aged persons who are citizens of the United States or non-citizens who shall have resided within the boundaries of the United States for at least twenty-five (25) years; (2) Needy individuals who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps; (3) Needy blind persons; (4) Needy dependent children and the caretakers of such children. The Legislature may prescribe such other eligibility requirements for participation in these programs as it deems appropriate. The Legislature shall have authority to enact appropriate legislation which will enable the State of Texas to cooperate with the Government of the United States in providing assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of needy persons, in providing rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT (HJR50)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 50b-1 to read as follows: "Section 50b-1. (a) The Legislature may provide that the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System, or its successor or successors, shall have authority to provide for, issue and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) in addition to those heretofore authorized to be issued pursuant to Section 50b of the Constitution. The bonds authorized herein shall be executed in such form, upon such terms and be in such denomination as may be prescribed by law and shall bear interest, and be issued in such installments as shall be prescribed by the Board provided that the maximum net effective interest rate to be borne by such bonds may be fixed by law. (b) The moneys received from the sale of such bonds shall be deposited to the credit of the Texas Opportunity Plan Fund created by Section 50b of the Constitution and shall otherwise be handled as provided in Section 50b of the

Constitution and the laws enacted pursuant thereto. (c) The said bonds shall be general obligations of the state and shall be payable in the same manner and from the same sources as bonds heretofore authorized pursuant to Section 50b. (d) All bonds issued hereunder shall, after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under this Constitution. (e) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment such acts shall be void because of their anticipatory nature. Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The Constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for additional loans to students at institutions of higher education under the Texas Opportunity Plan."

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT (HJR8)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 5, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, as amended, be amended to read as follows: "Section 5. The Legislature shall meet in regular session each year at such time as may be provided by law and at other times as convened by the Governor. When convened in odd-numbered years in regular session, the Legislature shall devote the first thirty days to the introduction of bills and resolutions, acting upon emergency appropriations, passing upon the confirmation of the recess appointees of the Governor and such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature. At each regular session, commencing in 1971, appropriations shall be made for the support of functions and activities of the state government for the next fiscal year. Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on August 5, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to provide for annual legislative sessions."

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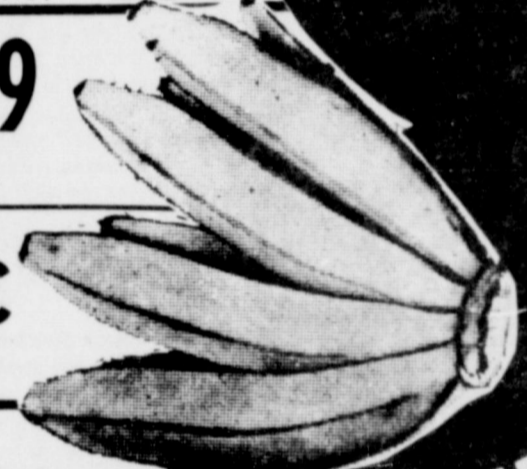
