

Screwworm prevention is everybody's business, says County Agent Bill Griffin. The County Screwworm Eradication Committee calls your attention to the seriousness of the screwworm threat this year. Collection kits and vials for collection of worm samples may be obtained at Tatum Bros., G and M Grain. and County Agents Office.

No ranch in Texas is im mune to the threat of screwworms this years, says Dolph Briscoe, Jr., of Uvalde. rancher and president of the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation. He em phasizezd that Texas reported 9.268 screwworm cases last year, and that the fall epidemic also claimed the life of a South Texas woman.

music. The Junior High group also played four selections, ranging from marches to novelty numbers.


