The train will stop in O'Donnell at 10:45 A. M. and Tahoka at 12:45 P. M. It will be worth your time many times over to see and hear these specialists in their lines. It will be both educational and entertaining. The News hopes that a large crowd will attend the demonstration which will be held on the Santa Fe tracks near the depot.

CITY ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING THAT PREMISES IN THE CITY LIMITS OF THE CITY OF TAHOKA BE KEPT IN A SANITARY CONDITION AND PROVIDING FOR THE CREATION OF THE OFFICE OF CITY SCAVENGER AND PROVIDING FOR THE APPOINTMENT, QUALIFICATION AND BOND FOR THE CITY SCAVENGER, AND PROVIDING PENALTY FOR THE VIOLATION OF THIS ORDINANCE OR ANY PART THEREOF AND DECLARING CERTAIN CONDITIONS THAT NOW EXIST, OR MAY HEREAFTER EXIST ON PREMISES IN TAHOKA TO BE A NUISANCE, AND PROVIDING FOR THE LEVYING AND COLLECTING OF A SANITARY TAX.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Tahoka:

Article No. 1.
SEC. 1. It shall be unlawful for any person, or persons, to permit or to have on his premises the following unsanitary conditions.

All animal manure of more than two weeks deposit, and all of said manure as deposited each day, shall be collected in one pile and sprinkled with lime, and said pile of manure shall be removed from said premises as hereinafter provided; also all privies, vaults, cesspools, and other like places which are not securely protected from flies; also all garbage, trash and other litter or anything else in which flies may breed and multiply and all of such shall be removed as hereinafter provided.

SEC. 2. It shall be unlawful for any person in the City of Tahoka to have or maintain on his premises a pit privy; or cess pool for purpose of retaining water from the kitchen sink or bath tub unless such pit or cesspool or sink shall be closed airtight.

Article No. 2.

SEC. 1. That the office of City Scavenger is hereby created, which office shall be filled by appointment of the City Council at a regular meeting of said Council and such officer so appointed by said Council shall hold this office for a term of six months from the date of his appointment, or until his successor shall have been selected and qualified by giving bond as hereinafter provided.

SEC. 2. That the city scavenger shall within ten days after his appointment enter into a good and sufficient bond in the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars, payable to the Mayor of the City of Tahoka, or his successor in office. Be approved by the Mayor of said city and conditioned by the faithful performance of the duties of said office as is in this ordinance defined.

SEC. 3. It shall be the duty of the City Scavenger of the City of Tahoka, to remove all refused matter from every resident privy in the city of Tahoka twice each month and to remove all refused matter from each privy belonging to each business house or hotel in the city of Tahoka once each week, and all refused garbage or trash removed or collected from said privy shall be by said scavenger dumped in the dumping ground of said city.

SEC. 4. That for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of this ordinance, it is further provided that each owner or occupant of a residence or place to live, shall once every two weeks thoroughly clean out, or have same to be done, all deposits in the privy on said premises, and after said privy is so cleaned out such owner or occupant shall sprinkle said cleaned out place with lime and the deposit so removed from said privy together with all animal manure collected on said premises for the last two preceding weeks as well as all garbage, trash and other litter in which flies may breed or multiply shall be removed from said premises once every two weeks and hauled and dumped on the city dumping grounds.

SEC. 5. And it is further provided that each owner or occupant of any hotel, livery stable, blacksmith shop, machine shop, garage, store, filling station, gin, mill, bank, post office, cafe, restaurant, feed store, wagon yard, repair shop, theatre, bakery, lumber yard, coal yard or bins, coal & grain store, poultry houses, poultry and produce houses, meat market, tin shop, plumbers, shop, paint shop, creamery depot, oil station, printing office, barber shop, hamburger joints, junk store or place of business and other like places of business shall once each week thoroughly clean out or cause same to be done, all deposits in the privy on said premises, and after same is so cleaned out such owner or occupant shall sprinkle said cleaned out place with lime, and the deposits so removed from said privy, together with all animal manure collected on said premises for the last preceding week as well as all garbage, trash and other litter in which flies may breed or multiply, shall be removed once each week from said premises and hauled and dumped same on the city dumping ground.

SEC. 6. And it is further provided that if any person or persons shall do and perform the things required of them under Sec. 4 and 5 of Art. 2, of this ordinance or cause same to be done and performed by any other person or persons other than by the city scavenger, then in that event it shall be a place described and defined in Sec. 4 of Art. 2 of this ordinance, the owner or occupant of such premises, shall cause such premises to be inspected by the city scavenger once every two weeks and if the city scavenger shall find that the things required to be done and performed, as required under Sec. 4, of Art. 2, of this ordinance, have been done and performed as required under said section of said article, then said city scavenger shall issue and deliver to such person or persons a clearance certificate signed and dated by him as such city scavenger showing that the things required to be done and performed under said section of said article have been done and performed as required therein for which certificate such person or persons shall pay the said city scavenger the sum of \$25 for each such certificate, and if it be a place described and defined in Sec. 5 of Art. 2 of this ordinance, the owner or occupant of such premises shall cause said premises to be inspected by the city scavenger once each week, and if said city scavenger shall find

that the things required to be done and performed in Sec. 5 of Art. 2 of this ordinance, have been done and performed as required under said section of said article, then said city scavenger shall issue and deliver to such person or persons a clearance certificate showing that the things required to be done and performed under said section of said article, have been done and performed as therein required, for which certificate such persons or persons shall pay to said city scavenger the sum of 25 cents for each such certificate.

And it is further provided that the city scavenger shall, issue one certificate each time for each such place inspected as required under this section and such person or persons as herein defined shall pay for one certificate on each place inspected as required herein.

SEC. 7. In case any person or persons as described or defined in section 4 of this article 2 hereof, or as defined in section 5 of article 2, hereof, fails or refuses to do and perform the things required to be done and performed by him under said section and performed by him under said section of said article, then in that event the city scavenger of said city shall do and perform the things required to be done under said sections 4 and 5 of Art. 2, and if such person or persons as described and defined in section 4, or article 2 hereof, he shall pay to said city scavenger the sum of 50 cents on the first day of each month; and if such person or persons as described in Sec. 5, of article 2 hereof, he shall pay to said city scavenger the sum of \$1.00 on the first day of each month.

SEC. 8. If any person or persons described and defined in Sec. 4 and 5 of Art. 2, of this ordinance fails or refuses to do or perform the things required to be done and performed by him or them under Articles 4, 5, 6, and 7 of Article 2 hereof at the time same or required to be done and performed, or fails or refuses to pay any fee provided for in section 7, article 2 hereof, that may become due, within five days after same is due, then in that event it shall be the duty of the city scavenger to securely fasten or lock the door on said privy on said premises so that no one may enter and it shall be unlawful for any person to unfasten, break into, unlock or enter said privy without the consent of the city scavenger.

SEC. 9. It shall be the duty of the City Health Officer to regularly inspect all premises in the city of Tahoka, at least once every 60 days, and if in his judgment any premises in said city is in an unsanitary condition, said health officer shall notify the owner or tenant of said unsanitary condition and request him to remove and abate such unsanitary condition within five days after receiving such notice and for each separate place of business or premises so inspected by said city health officer the city shall pay the sum of \$ for each such place of business or place so inspected by him.

SEC. 10. That all pit privies and cess pools which are not closed airtight, and all privies which are now in an unsanitary condition are hereby declared a nuisance and such nuisances are to be abated by the provisions of this ordinance.

SEC. 11. That if any section of this ordinance shall be held by the courts invalid then all other sections that are held valid are not in anywise affected by such sections as are declared invalid.

SEC. 12. That the city scavenger shall be paid the sum of sixty dollars per month, payable the first day of each month by warrant issued by the city secretary, approved by the mayor and drawn on the city treasurer, and the city scavenger shall on the first day of each month turn into the city treasury all money collected by him on account of the sanitary tax.

SEC. 13. That it shall also be the duty of the city scavenger at the time he is cleaning out said privy to take away any and all garbage and trash, rags, cans and other refuse matter that may be placed at or near said privy by occupant of said premises.

SEC. 14. That it shall be unlawful for any person in the City of Tahoka to allow any garbage of every character, including all tin cans, rags, paper and other refused matter to remain on their premises, and it shall be the duty of every person to collect all such garbage and refused matter about his premises and he is hereby required to collect such garbage and refused matter and pile or place the same at or near the privy on his premises so the same can be removed by the city scavenger.

SEC. 15. That any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not less than five dollars, nor more than twenty-five dollars.

SEC. 16. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby expressly repealed.

SEC. 17. This ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage and

Origin of The Public School

BY PHEBE K. WARNER

Our public school, like every other great institution, was conceived in sorrow; born of poverty and has been reared in the cradle of tribulation. If we would get a real view of the birth and the growth and the present life of our public school system we must take a look backward. Not a month or a year but a hundred years. Yes, a thousand years.

As far back as the year 1086, William the Conqueror took kind of census in England that he might know better just what kind of people his kingdom represented. The records of this investigation were filed in a book called the Domesday Book, and at that time showed that in England there were 44,300 free men and 284,000 unfree men, or about seven unfree men to one free man. Which means one man was free to think, to learn to own his home, to sell it if he pleased for every seven men who dare not think, who were not allowed to learn, who could not own a home or other property and who instead of being free to sell his property was sold with the property as part of the property.

In those days the clergy alone were the only educated men and they preached constantly to the tillers of the soil to remain "where God had placed them," comparing the ambitious to the worm that thought it had wings. Very few outside of the clergy ever dreamed of studying or even to learn to read or write for six or seven centuries after the overthrow of the Roman government in the West. Even in the thirteenth century if an offender wished to prove that he belonged to the clergy he had only to show that he could read a single line for it was the belief that no one unconnected with the church could read at all.

Thus it seems that for centuries education began and ended with the clergy. It would be an interesting study for any of us to follow up thru the centuries how Christianity and education have traveled thru the centuries together. And even to this day either is crippled without the other. Education without Christianity is dangerous. Christianity without education is helpless. And all through the years only as the love of men for God and their fellowmen has grown, has the way been paved for the education of all the people. And even to this day only as the principles of Christianity are implanted in the hearts and minds of men and women sanely and intelligently will the world be redeemed from sin and crime. The school and the church must work together hand in hand if the homes of the world are to be perfected. Christianity and education must be harmonized. And they will be when both are supported and both are used for the building up of every human being and the object of both is made the real business of living on this earth.

Even as late as 1670, Governor Berkley in his report on the condition of the Virginia colony said: "I thank God there are no free schools nor printing, and I hope we shall not have these for hundreds of years; for learning has brought disobedience into the world and printing has divulged them and libels against the best of government. God keep us from both." And the spirit of Berkley still lives. Berkley was afraid knowledge would disturb the political and social order of his day.

But even then people were beginning to discover that they had minds, and that their minds were given them for the purpose of thinking, and the little Dame School became one of the first elementary schools in the colonies. It was usually conducted in somebody's kitchen or living room by a woman who by some device had gained the rudiments of an education and who now wished to earn a few pennies. For a few pennies a week she would take the children of her neighbors into her home and explain the mysteries of learning and to read and spell and sometimes taught them to write their names and sometimes, but not often, the children were taught to count.

The seventeenth century saw the establishment of three types of schools in America. The first was the educational contribution of Calvinism to America. Out of it by the latter separation of Church and State our modern State school system was evolved. The Calvinistic conception of religion was that the State as a religious institution should support a system of common schools. Here we see the germ of Christianity in a religious sect awakening to its responsibility to the people.

But in the early days of the United States education then as now seemed to be a matter of finances. When the people had little money they sent their children to private schools. Poor people, if their children were educated at all, had to send their children to the Pauper School. In 1830 a committee of working men in Pennsylvania made an investigation of school conditions and reported that outside the cities of Lancaster and Pittsburgh it appears that the entire State is destitute of any provisions for public instruction. It seems that even then there were three distinct classes of children in America. The children of the moneyed class, who were sent to private schools, the children of the Pauper school. But there were no children of the middle poor who went to the class who were neither rich nor poor and the parents of such children could not send their children to the private schools and they would not lower their social standing by sending them to the Pauper School, so it developed that after all the masses of the children from the common class had no school.

But through all these years the sentiment for education was growing. George Washington believed in

educating all the people. Samuel Adams believed in it. John Adams believed in it. John Jay, Chief Justice of the United States, said: "I believe knowledge to be the soul of a Republic." Thomas Jefferson believed in education and Benjamin Franklin believed in LIGHT for the mind the same as light for the world. And step by step, year by year, and life by life, these great characters were working out a plan of education for all the people and a way to support it.

Between 1885 and 1850 a wave of interest in education swept over the country. History tells us it was the breaking down of class lines in the New West that caused the awakening. People from all sections of the country had moved into the new regions of the new west. Everybody was struggling for a start and a home. Men saw themselves as equals. Democracy developed, and education for all, or education for none became the demand. This broke up the Pauper School and admitted the children of the poor to the common school which had been developed.

One of the most outstanding characters in the fight for public schools was De Witt Clinton, for eight years Governor of New York. From 1805 until his death in 1828 he worked unceasingly for the ideals of free public school education. As a result of his efforts 600,000 children had been educated and 1200 teachers trained for service by the year 1853, when the school plant originated by De Witt Clinton was turned over to the public school department of New York City. The spirit of De Witt Clinton still lives in the Masonic Lodge and again this year this lodge is conducting another educational campaign in the same spirit as that of their illustrious educational leader. Equal education for all the children of the country.
